THE MINI MANSION ON THE SQUARE
To say the very least it must be agreed that there is a great divergence of opinion as to the suitability of the site on the square which the Regional Tourism Organisation picked in Dungarvan Square throughout last summer as a tourist information centre. One of the great deal of criticism voiced about the caravan last year and that criticism was revived at last year's meeting at Dungarvan Urban Council when a resolution was passed that the site should be put in a split vote only by a casting vote of the Chairman.

When the last of the permanent staff at the Mini Mansion, A. Moloney & Sons Ltd., left Dungarvan, they were paid off last Friday night, it meant the end of an era for them. The five men concerned, three of whom were also members of the staff of the firm, were chided up between them a grand total of 183 years work in the service of the firm which record of loyal and faithful service of the town since they first entered the firm as mere youths.

FACTS AND FIGURES

Morrow, refers to a survey carried out in Dungarvan last season and this is what his report states: "A deep sea survey was undertaken at Dungarvan to find out what was the best fishing spot in the area. The weather conditions were poor during the survey and there was a general scarcity of fish in the area, even on proven marks due to the aftermath of a storm. No new fishing was found during the survey. Dungarvan is an excellent venue for sea angling and is not getting the support it deserves from anglers. There is a very good variety of shore and inshore fishing in the area as well as excellent angling for shadling bass and also for blue sharks. There is a good variety of accommodation available locally and a Boat Company caters for the anglers' need."

DEATH OF RT. REV. DR. DE PAULEY
The Rev. Dr. William Cecil de Pauley, Bishop of Cashel, Emly, Waterford and Lismore, died in Waterford on Saturday. He was 75.
A native of Partrish, Co. Antrim, he was educated at the Catholic Archdiocesan Institute and Trinity College, Dublin. He was ordained in 1917 and in 1919 became a curate at Booterstown, Co. Dublin.
In 1920 he was appointed Professor of Theology in St. John's College, Waterford, and in 1922 became a Canon of St. John's Cathedral in Dublin. He returned to Waterford in 1926 and was made Rector of St. Peter's, Athlone, where he served for four years before going to St. John's, Dublin. Dr. de Pauley returned to Waterford in 1932 and became Professor of Systematic Theology and Assistant Chaplain in Trinity College, Dublin. When he again returned to Ireland in 1939 he became Rector of St. Matthias, Dublin, where he served until 1945 when he became Rector of Carrigrohane, Co. Dublin.
He became Assistant Lecturer in the Divinity School of T.C.D. in 1942 and was Examining Chaplain to the Archbishop of Dublin from 1942 to 1954. He became Dean of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin in 1954. He was consecrated Bishop in 1958.

E.S.B. SPECIAL SERVICE CHARGES A MATTER OF HARD ECONOMICS SAYS E.S.B. OFFICIAL
Call For Higher Subsidy To Relieve Hardships
When the members of the Waterford Committee of Agriculture further discussed at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday the hard-pressed areas of the county, the E.S.B. official said that the special service charges imposed by the E.S.B. were a matter of hard economics.

TRENDING DEMAND
In reply to questions by Mr. J. Faherty, District Manager, E.S.B. Waterford, he said that in the Waterford area there had been a loss of 25,000 sheep in the last year. This was due to a combination of factors, such as a lack of feed, a shortage of water, and a general decline in the wool market.

TREATED HARSHLY
Mr. Faherty said that several people in that area were treated harshly at the time in regard to the E.S.B. charges. He said that the E.S.B. charges were a matter of hard economics and that the Government should consider a higher subsidy to relieve the hardships.
