UNFORTUNATE DECISION
The decision of the Department of Local Government as conveyed to Waterford County Council at their meeting on Wednesday night is not to provide the normal 50% subsidy for the proposed water supply to Ballinacorney, Dungarvan, to say the least can only be termed unfortunate. Although the latter, concerning the Department's decision did not specifically say so, the reason for the refusal would appear to be that the scheme is not as planned to provide a permanent water supply to the area and not for domestic purposes. The scheme, which has already been approved in principle by the Council, is estimated to cost £262,000. The Department is prepared to sanction the scheme and the money necessary to finance it. It is the Council's duty to raise the money by way of loan and pay the loan costs themselves.
