OVER EXPOSED
Speaking at the official opening of the recent Peadar Cloughlin Memorial in Thurles, Mr. Cloughlin O'Murchu, resident of Comhata, Co. Tipperary, referred to the over exposure which the activities of lunatic fringe elements and unruly minorities receive.
Mr. O'Murchu stated that there was a tendency in Ireland to be more prompt with criticism than praise and as a result the many fine performances of traditional musicians and dancers were more or less ignored, while the antics of lunatic fringe elements were given widespread publicity.
I think that Mr. O'Murchu's criticisms hold good in many other fields too and can be said to hold good not only in this country but in many others well. This has been especially exemplified in recent weeks by the treatment given in the press television and radio to the near riots staged by University students in Dublin, Paris and other European cities.
I must again appeal to the leaders and shopkeepers of the town and to the townspeople in general with a special plea to the youngsters and school-leavers in the local schools to take up this aspect of the problem. I would like to see the best to reduce the litter problem and help to keep our town a clean and tidy place, a place we can be proud to live in and to show to our tourists and visitors.

REMOVING THE EYEBROWS
I was pleased to note during the week that the Co. Council are well advanced in removing the old derelict buildings which for many years have stood as an eyesore at the Youghal Road, one of the principal entrance roads to the town.
There is a one wide road to the town here but they have built a few hundred yards wide road on the side of the main road and this problem has been solved for years because of the difficulty of removing the derelict buildings which have been or are in the process of being removed since the road may be widened all the way in.

WAS IN PILTOWN AMBUSH
The recent death of Stephen Ryan recalls the days of the Irish independence struggle now more than forty years ago. Born in Knockina, Co. Limerick, 70 years ago he learned all about race horses as a young boy at the stables of Gus Hogan (uncle of P. J. Hogan) the young man he came to County Waterford and worked for Mr. M. Cunningham at Ballinacraig, Kinsalebeg, and while there he joined the Piltown Company West Waterford Brigade I.R.A. He took part in several engagements with Crown forces, notably the attack on a British Army Patrol at Piltown Cross. He later went to England and rode many winners and had mounts in two Grand Nationals in which he finished sixth on his second occasion. On his return to Ireland in 1931 he was employed as a stable hand at West Waterford and later as a driver at the Piltown Cross. He died of cancer in 1967.

JUDGE SENDS WITNESS FROM BOX
Criminal Appeal Fails
There was an unusual turn in a case at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday when Judge Fawcitt, having directed that a summons be issued for a State witness, later ordered her to leave the witness box when she was giving evidence.
The case was an appeal brought by Michael Duggan, labourer, Casoyville, Dungarvan, against conviction and sentence imposed on him at Dungarvan District Court on September 19th, 1967, for the offence of assaulting Oliver O'Riordan and his brother Richard at Sixton Street, Abbeyside, on Sunday night, August 6, 1967.
Dr. D. R. Conahan, State Solicitor, said that at about 10.30 p.m. on August 6, the O'Riordans were in a public house at Sixton Street, Abbeyside, when they were assaulted by Duggan. Duggan was having a conversation with another man about a debt when Duggan intervened and threw the contents of a glass of beer at the O'Riordans' faces, broke the glass and made an effort to stab O'Riordan with it.
Mr. E. Conyn, B.L. (instructed by P. Williams & Son, Solicitors) was for Duggan. Oliver O'Riordan, in evidence of the fact he was a pilsener and at about 11 o'clock on Sunday night, August 6, he was in the public house at Sixton Street, Abbeyside, and was talking to Joseph Egan about a £100 debt which Duggan had given him and said "the Egan witness said that he saw Duggan take a glass in his hand and push it down on him." Witness said that what they were talking about was Duggan's business with his head, took a glass and threw it at the O'Riordans and came at him with it. He pushed back and fell on a table and Duggan tried to push the glass down on him. Mrs. Kiely then put them all outside the door.
Cross-examined by Mr. Conyn, witness said that he was in the public house on the Patten day in Abbeyside and there was a celebration that night. Duggan appeared to have had a good deal of drink taken. He knew Duggan well but his interpretation was uncorrected for when Egan said he owed him the stout in his face and then Duggan came at him with the broken glass, said "I'll break your head" and fell back on a stool outside the door.
Witness said that when he saw the top of the glass in his hand and then "someone pulled him off."
Mr. Conyn further questioned witness and witness said he knew no reason why Duggan attacked him as they were friendly and spoke to each other. He agreed that since the friendly attack he had been evasive by saying that his brother had gone to England and he could get no work locally.
Margaret O'Riordan, wife of the previous witness, in evidence said that she was in the public house on the occasion but she could not remember what happened as it was so long ago. She was with her husband and Duggan and Mrs. Kiely told her to go out. She said that she could not remember the things her husband said.

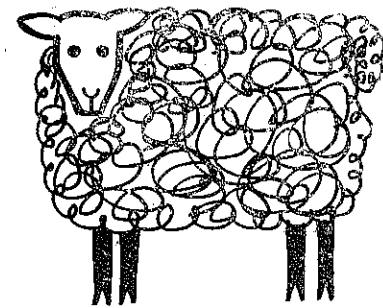
