

MINORS QUALIFY FOR MUNSTER SEMI
Convincing Win Over Clare

Waterford 8-7; Clare 2-2

Waterford minors are through in the Munster semi-final in which they meet Tipperary at Cork on Sunday, June 30th.

At Thurles on Sunday last they put up a really fine show when they had a more than convincing 23 points win (8-7 to 2-2) over Clare, and despite the fact that while the ball was being played the Waterford's devastating form showed that they stand a very good chance of taking the first Munster title since 1942.

From start to finish last Sunday's game was dominated by a display of forward hurling for which Clare had absolutely no answer.

The winners had vital goals in the first quarter and by the interval had built up a 4-4 lead. Even at this stage it was obvious that Waterford were on their way to a clear-cut win and even though the Clare side improved in the second half, early on they were again in the lead and so the first half pattern was continued with Waterford running out easy and convincing winners.

FLAWLESS SIDE

In a flawless Waterford side the team was Jim Fleming, Jimmy Goulding, Pat Morrissey, Tom Doyle and Francis Reid, they completely overran the Clare defence.

Tullow's Liam Frazer had a very good hour at midfield and here with Pat Kelly won undisputedly back which marked him as a very lively prospect for the senior side.

In defence, great assistance was given by Jim Clancy and Tom Coffey of De La Salle.

TOP CLASS PERFORMANCE

It is certain, however, that they would have chalked up a far bigger margin but for the top class performance of Clare's goalkeeper, Tom O'Donnell.

Despite the fact that he conceded eight goals some of his saves, with no cover whatsoever, were only magnificent and it is a credit to his great ability that he didn't give up trying until the final whistle.

However, Clare didn't have a single player outside to match Waterford in any sector.

U.S. VISITORS FOR DUNGARVAN

Practically four years in the day after Mayor Richard Daley of Chicago was elected to the position in Dungarvan while on his way to visit relatives in Old Parish, another group of U.S. visitors will visit the town and the local Urban Council are planning to give them a real Irish welcome to the Old Bore.

Mayor Daley's visit to Dungarvan took place in Dungharvan, May 18, 1964, and on next Sunday week, June 8th, a similar group of U.S. visitors will arrive in the town during the afternoon bearing greetings from their State and from the Urban Council.

The Urban Council will hold a special meeting to make their welcome plans on Wednesday night, but as the time is so short I think that this meeting could be held as a semi-public meeting with representatives from the town's Junior Chamber of Commerce, Musical and Choral Society, and local bands being invited to attend. In this way people whose organs and societies can contribute a great deal to the type of welcome Dungarvan gives should be on the spot to cooperate.

WAGE INCREASE FOR COUNCIL WORKMEN

On the proposal of Mr. J. Conroy, seconded by Mr. J. Conroy, the Council approved an order by the County Manager increasing the wages of Council Workmen (not builders) by 17 1/2 per cent as from January 1, 1968 and 12 1/2 per cent as from January 1, 1969 and waterworks caretaker by 27 1/2 per cent from January 1, 1968 and 17 1/2 per cent as from January 1, 1969.

The Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson said that the men's basic wage was 110/6 excluding service pay and the present increase.

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TROUBLE AT A WATER SPOUT

Injunction Claim At Dungarvan Circuit Court

Two farmers, next door neighbours, in Dungarvan, were parties to a case heard by Judge Fawcitt at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

Three times during the hearing the Lordship adjourned the case in unsuccessful efforts to bring the parties together and eventually he went to see the plaintiff himself before deciding the issue.

James J. Walsh brought a claim for £200 damages against David Murray, senior, and sought an injunction to stop the defendant from interfering with his rights to draw water from a well on the defendant's lands.

The defence denied that the plaintiff had any rights to take the water.

Mr. M. P. Walsh, B.E., instructed by J. P. Walsh, G.S. Solicitor, was for Mr. Walsh and Mr. E. Conroy, B.L. instructed by J. P. Walsh, G.S. Solicitor, was for Mr. Murray.

James Walsh in evidence claimed that he bought a plot of 40 acres at Ballylough Lower, the property of the late Miss McCann in 1922. He married in 1940 and from the beginning he drew the water for domestic purposes from a well in Egan's land which was now owned by the Murrys. He found in a few years that his water supply had been cut off and he was in possession of their land since 1948.

The first trouble about the water occurred in October, 1966, when David Murray, Junior, advised that he had bought the land which was brought down to the road on a spout. He consulted his solicitor who wrote a number of letters to the defendant's solicitor complaining that the water had been diverted, which he had been attacked and abused and requesting that the water be restored to its original course. There was a reply from Messrs Williams on October 24, stating that the water had been diverted and the Murrys and a number of other neighbours used the water. It was being diverted to the other side of the road on plain pipe fence directly opposite the existing stand. Witness said he objected as there was no need for the new stand and it meant that it was being diverted down. It was erected without his permission and he asked the Murrys to take it away. It was removed in August 1966.

Witness said that everything was then alright until July last year but then the churns were pushed in under the spout and this made it difficult to get at the water without moving the churns. He found it hard to move the churns because he had only one arm. On September 9 he found a chain around the churns and a steel rope tying them to an overhanging tree and this meant that in order to get his bucket in to the spout and move the churns he had to untie the rope. This proved very exhausting.

CHILDISH MANNER

At this stage his Lordship rose for the first time to give the parties a chance to come together and settle the case.

Judge Fawcitt said that while he knew great principles could be involved in the case, he believed the parties were behaving in a very childish manner. It was obvious, he said, that the churns were not in the way in the case and they were going to be removed. He would rise to give them a chance to settle and said he would be available in his rooms if he could be of any assistance in bringing about a settlement.

The Court then rose but after half an hour resumed when it was announced that the settlement could not be reached.

OTHER OBSTRUCTIONS
