

MINORS QUALIFY FOR MUNSTER SEMI-FINALS

Convincing Win Over Clare

Waterford 8-7; Clare 2-2
Waterford minors through to the Munster semi-final after a three-point Tipperary win at Cork on Sunday last. At Thurles on Sunday last they put up a really fine show when they had a more than fair chance to win (8-7 to 2-2) over Clare, who deserved the fact that while the Munster County standard-bearers' Waterford's devastating form showed that they stand quite a good chance of taking their first Munster title since 1948 this year. From start to finish of last Sunday's game Waterford dominated with a display of vintage hurling to which Clare had absolutely no answer.

The winners had vital goals in the first quarter and the interval had built up 4-4 to 1-1 lead. Even at this stage it was obvious that Waterford were on their way to a clear win and, although the Clare side improved in the second half, early on the rearing Jimmy Goulding had two goals and the first half pattern was continued with Waterford running out easy and convincing winners.

FLAWLESS SIDE

In a flawless Waterford side the star performer was Jim Fleming who showed a tremendous defensive display at right half back which marked the game as very likely future prospect for senior status.

He received great assistance in defence from Dungarvan's John Clancy and Tom Coffey.

Talor's Liam Frazer had a very good hour at midfield and here with Pat Kelly won undisputed superiority for the hour.

The attacking efforts from the score line were in fifth-form and led by Jim Goulding who had 4-2 of his side's total. Murphy and Capponi when moved to the full line to the half line, Tom Doyle and Francis Reid, they doily over ran the Clare defence.

TOP CLASS PERFORMANCE

It is certain however that they would have chalked up a bigger margin but for the top class performance of Clare's Jim Kelly and his team. Still, despite the fact that he conceded eight goals some of his saves, with no cover whatsoever, from his defence were extremely good. It is a credit to his great ability that he didn't give up trying until his final whistle.

Sixty-four players didn't have a single player outdoled to match Waterford in any sector.
