### PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

#### THE LAW OF THE BATON

News reports and television  
shots of the police attack on the  
Civil Rights marchers in Derry  
last Saturday have left the  
country appalled and  
despite the repeated denials by  
the Stormont Minister for Home  
Affairs Mr. Craig, that the police  
used no more force than was  
absolutely necessary on the  
occasion and that in fact they  
showed a great deal of re-  
straint there is now no denying  
the fact that the members of  
the Northern Police Force  
acted in a most reprehens-  
ible manner in the role of  
law enforcement officers.

One news reporter who was on  
the spot sent this report to his  
paper: "For a quarter of an  
hour on Saturday afternoon  
in a Derry street, a man  
battered and pursued Civil  
Rights demonstrators in a  
hysterical manner, using a baton  
which stands at the  
very end of its handle. It is  
now in danger of  
being used for  
nothing but  
the destruction  
of the lives of  
the peaceful  
people who are  
trying to secure  
justice in a  
land where the  
law is not  
enforced." In  
the U.S.A. the  
baton is known  
as a "nightstick".

It is a well-known fact that the  
members of a force responsible for  
the enforcement of law and  
order must be given the  
opportunity to use their  
power. In this respect the  
police are no different from  
any other service. The  
difference lies in the  
nature of their duty.  
The police are not  
there to punish  
people but to  
maintain order  
and protect the  
rights of all  
citizens. It is  
not surprising  
that they should  
be given the  
right to use  
force when  
necessary. The  
question is not  
whether they  
should be  
allowed to use  
force but  
whether they  
should be  
allowed to use  
excessive  
force. The  
police in Derry  
acted in a  
most  
reprehensible  
manner and  
their actions  
have shocked  
the whole  
country.

are intelligent enough to realize  
what is at stake and are well  
enough aware of the issues to be  
decided. Much has been  
made about the complexities  
and difficulties of the existing  
system of P.R. but the records  
of the past almost 50 years  
has shown that an electoral  
system of P.R. has given us Governments  
which very truly reflect  
the choice of the majority of  
the people. The basic principle  
of P.R. is that the number of  
seats obtained by any party  
should correspond with the  
votes cast for it and in each  
constituency it gives the voter  
a choice between candidates of  
the party which he or she  
supports. These are two very  
important points.

It has been stated that the  
P.R. system operates in no other  
country outside of Ireland and  
that it is a divisive system  
which operates against the re-  
quirements of a "strong" govern-  
ment. It is interesting to note  
that the six European countries  
which constitute the Common  
Market area, which we are  
trying so hard to enter only  
have a party with an  
absolute majority in the  
other five. Not one is ruled  
by a single party and all have  
electoral systems which are  
more or less designed to secure  
proportional representation. And  
these six European countries are  
claimed by many to be the most  
civilized and dynamic area in  
the world. So much for the  
fallacy of the need for a "strong"  
government.

On the other hand they have  
the straight vote system in the  
North and it is interesting to  
note that in the Republic of  
Ireland the members of the  
Northern Police Force in Derry  
were writing in the previous  
article that they were not  
satisfied with the "tolerance"  
shown by the Government. In  
fact the only party which  
gets three-thirds of the  
votes in the Corporation  
while the Nationalist Party,  
which polls two-thirds of  
the votes gets only two-fifths of  
the seats. Or worse as I  
already have said Derry City  
has been subjected to the worst  
kind of gerrymandering. At the  
end result is one of victimisation  
for a big majority of the com-  
munity there.

However, the important thing  
is for every voter to make  
a special effort to go out  
and vote on Wednesday next.  
This is a vital important issue af-  
fecting the entire country and  
must therefore be the concern  
not of some but of all.

#### WHISPERING HOPE

It was a shame and a dis-  
grace said Mr. K. O'Riordan when

At the same time he felt that  
some blame would have to be  
borne by the organisers as they  
must have known what the re-  
sult would be when they march-  
ed in defiance of the ban.  
Mr. G. Curran said that Derry  
was a Nationalist stronghold  
and the people there had been  
driven to desperation. There  
was discrimination where hous-  
ing and schools were concerned  
and they were being treated  
worse than the negroes in South  
Africa. "What they did," he  
said, "they did in a sense of  
separation when they were de-  
prived of their rights and  
think we should all examine our  
conscience down here to see  
whether we are doing enough as  
all to help them in their fight.  
I think in the light of the week-  
end occurrences, that the men  
who crossed the border with  
guns were not too far wrong."  
The resolution was passed  
unanimously.

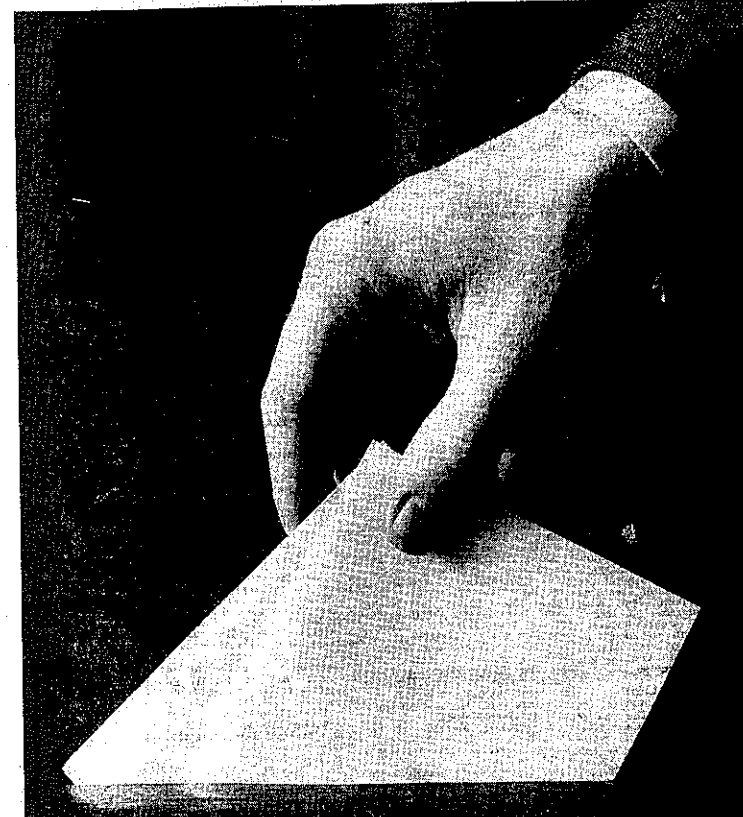

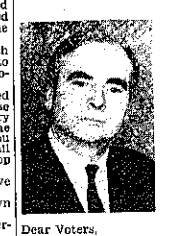
