A SHORT VIEW

I usually find myself in agreement with most of the major decisions of the N.F.A. but following the objections raised by a deputation from the County Council last Monday's meeting of the Council, the Committee to subsidise a railway supplement to the Committee had drawn up a letter to the Council for the new railway line through Ballinacourty, Dungarvan.

and twelve landowners in Ballinacourty came before last Monday's meeting of the County Council to protest against the proposed laying of a railway line through Coras Iompair Eireann to the site of the proposed Magnauste Industry.

The deputation was introduced by Councillor Kieran O'Ryan, Mr. Lavan, Solicitor, Dungarvan, representing two of the landowners involved.

In my issue of October 12th you referred to a decision of the County Waterford Council to proceed with the laying of a new railway line through Ballinacourty.
