A FIGHT MUST BE MADE

operations against a hostile force. Lieut. Fleming distinguished himself when the fire support base his platoon was securing came under attack by an estimated enemy battalion reinforced by a company of enemy troops. The enemy attack was initiated by intense mortar, rocket, automatic weapons and small arms fire. Lieut. Fleming immediately realised the scale of the attack and began to call in his supporting fires and illumination. Completely disregarding his own personal safety and the murderous enemy fire, he moved outside the bunker to more effectively adjust his artillery and mortar fire. Noting an enemy strongpoint too close to his own lines to use artillery, Lieut. Fleming in a display of distinctive gallantry crossed twenty-two metres of open ground and directed the fire of the forty millimetre duster. While returning to his check point the duster was hit and destroyed by rocket fire. Lieut. Fleming spotted the enemy rocket position and silenced it with his own duster. He then repeatedly exposed himself to intense enemy fire while instructing, reorganising his men and re-securing the gaping hole in his defensive perimeter by the destruction of the duster. . . . Lieut. Fleming's personal bravery and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the Military Service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army. . . .

These circumstances point to the ever continuing need for a full and adequate, readily available sea rescue service around the coast. I mean "readily available" as this can mean the difference between life and death as in the case of those unfortunate West Cork men for whom a 2 hours delay meant death instead of rescue. This is what I think that the R.N.L.I. should have second thoughts about their decision to withdraw the lifeboat at Helwick. Such a move would leave a long stretch of coast line between Dunmore East and Youghal without a proper rescue craft. It might be good economics and conform to the modern idea of rationalisation to withdraw the lifeboat but can these be balanced off against the loss of even one life which might result just because such an exercise in rationalisation was carried out.

DECORATED FOR BRAVERY
The citation issued on November 15th 1968, by the Department of the Army (U.S.) Headquarters of the 173rd Airborne Brigade states: "Award of the Bronze Star Medal For Heroism: The following award is announced—Fleming, Michael F. Jr., First Lieutenant Infantry, United States Army, Company A, 3d Battalion (Airborne) 503d Infantry, Awarded Bronze Star Medal with 'V' Device. Date of Action: 21 August 1968 in Republic of Vietnam. Reason: For heroism in connection with military

their satisfaction from work. Many of those who have gone to the Waterford and Shannon Training centres had been unemployed, others went straight from Secondary and Vocational Schools, some had been doing farm work or unskilled labouring and there were those who felt they were in dead end jobs or jobs they did not feel happy in. During their training, which generally lasts about six months, the trainees are paid an allowance based on their age and family responsibility. This can vary from £4 a week for an 18 year old without family responsibility to £8-2-6 for a married man who also gets a further 8/- a week for each child. AnCo arranges lodgings for those away from home for which it charges a married man 10/- a week and a single man 4/2. When he opened the new training centre in Waterford early last month, the Minister for Labour, Dr. Hillery pointed out that it and the other similar centres would be used primarily for training adult workers. He added that it was important that nobody should lose sight of the fact that a major training programme was concerned with people and in the final analysis progress depended on the contributions of individual people. If through training we could improve the welfare of our people, he said, Dr. Hillery, we would have gone a long way towards achieving the primary objects of economic development.

More than 160 men are now being trained at the two new AnCo training centres at Shannon and Waterford, and this number will rise to more than 200 when a third centre opens at Galway shortly. The primary aim of these centres is to equip adults to handle semi-skilled work in industries and the courses include milling, turning, welding, electrical work and the assembly and repair of mechanical equipment. AnCo—short for An Comhairle Oiluna, the Industrial Training Authority—was set up under the Industrial Training Act of 1967 and has wide powers over training in all branches of industry and commerce. The aims of AnCo are to ensure that Irish workers at all levels of skills will be as good as comparable workers in other countries, that training here will at least keep pace with that elsewhere, and that workers may be able to acquire new skills to enable them move from declining industries to new ones and to improve their standards and increase their earning power and
