SUCCESS OF KNOCK MARRIAGE INTRODUCTION BUREAU

A Spokesman for The Marriage Introduction Bureau at Knock, Co. Mayo says in an annual report that after one year in operation there have been 1,506 Enquiries, 618 men and 462 women have completed and returned the questionnaire and 302 introductions have been effected. 68 introductions are now in progress and three engagements. There has been one marriage between the first enquiry and the filling up of documents and returning them with a photograph. This accounts for the discrepancy between 1,506 enquiries completed and returned questionnaires.

Applications have come from every county in Ireland, from New South Wales, Queensland, Philippines and India. Country-South in the States have applied for the occupations of the applicants are very diverse—Secretaries, Nurses, Accountants, Civil Servants, Teachers, Clerks, Shopkeepers, Receptionists, Sales Assistants. Business people; there are many farmers in the 35-45 age group and also many over that age. By far the majority of farmers have over 40 acres of land and many have up to 80 or 90 acres.

It is felt that enough of attention has not been given to people in this age group who are desirous of marrying and in a position to do so. The normal run of dances have become over-run by teenagers. While teenagers are an important part of the community and should be catered for it is felt that they are getting too much attention to the detriment of a more important section of the community.

Any help from proprietors of hotels in this matter would be appreciated. It could be a very profitable proposition for them. The atmosphere of a hotel if it fell would be more suitable for the above age group.

The Bureau at Knock has up until January made all the introductions free of charge. £1,506 subscribers by The Marriage Introduction Bureau has so far financed the annual meeting. January the Bureau has asked applicants to make a voluntary subscription from now on. Until the next meeting it was decided to defer the question of charging an initial fixed fee. Anyone who feels they have benefited from the service of the Bureau would like to make a voluntary subscription it would be appreciated.

A few words of advice to applicants. It would be appreciated if they paid more attention to the photograph. Forward a recent, well taken, post card size, full length photograph. First impressions are important. A lot of care is taken in the making of an introduction. It would be a commitment to one care if at all possible meet. A person's meeting can be so different to just seeing a person in a photograph. However there is no obligation on you to meet or if you meet there is no commitment. 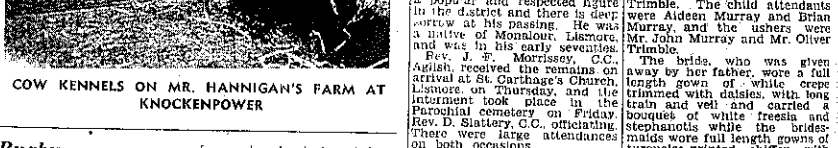
DEVELOPING THE SMALL FARM

Almost one hundred farmers attended demonstrations which were held by the staff of the County Committee of Agriculture in the Colligan area last week. Mr. A. Fenton, Agricultural Instructor for the district, outlined the steps which are necessary in developing holdings around the 40-50 acre mark.

He laid special emphasis on the importance of prudent investment of limited capital. Money put into stock and fertilisers gives a much better and quicker return than that put into buildings or machinery.

The farm of Mr. Tom Wall, Colligan, was demonstrated as a well developed small farm. He has an excellent 1,000-gallon average herd and rears his own replacements. His stocking rate is 1.2 acres per cow. 37 cows equivalent are run on 45 adjusted acres. Mr. Wall uses the self-feed silage cubicle system.
