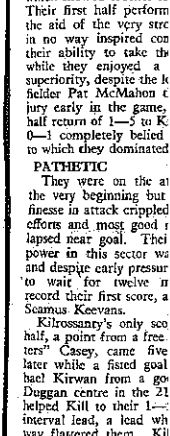

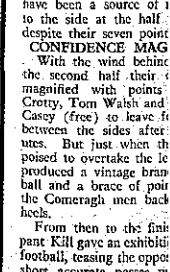

GRASS TETANY

Hypomagnesaemic Tetany is a disease of cattle and sheep. It is also referred to as grass staggers and most commonly grass tetany.

The condition occurs usually in cows recently transferred from winter and stall conditions to lush pasture grazing. It has been observed in recent years that single suckler out-cows are especially at risk...

Symptoms vary considerably. Usually in the early stages there is excitement, muscular twitching especially of the ears and sometimes aggressive behaviour.

CONCERN AT INCREASED FREIGHT RATES

The N.F.A. Livestock Committee has written to the B. & I. Shipping Company expressing concern at the Company's decision to implement an increase of 16/ per cent in the port-to-port rate for cattle on the Dublin/Birkenhead route as from April 21.

The Committee has also taken up the matter with the Department of Agriculture.

Age Pensioners will be hard hit too. The people won't be able to pay and that's all about it.

Mr. Kyne said that the County Council demand which accounted for 81/2% of the increase was mandatory and they could do nothing about it.

Mr. Whelan said this was due mainly to the Urban Council should take steps to see that they are demolished and the sites cleared.

One such place which comes to mind is the old house at the level crossing at Sunfield Street in Abbeyville. This was at one time owned by a gatekeeper and his family when trains were running on the Waterford-Mallow line but it has been uncared for for a considerable time now and has fallen into disrepair.

It is a dangerous building from the roofing slates have been partially stripped but children from the nearby housing estate have turned it into a playing place where they could easily be injured.

The building is apparently the property of C.I.E. but I think the Urban Council should make representations to the Railway authorities to have it demolished and cleared away as quickly as possible.

Mr. A. Deasy said that one of their primary duties as a Council was to strike a fair balance between the demands of industry and amenities.

Mr. Whelan said that no one was against housing as this was one of the most important duties they had but there were other things.

Mr. Deasy—I have gone through the Estimates with a fine comb and I can't see how we can reduce them.

Mr. Kyne then asked that if the Council agreed to an increase of 16% that reduction would have to be made to the rate of 16%.

The Manager said that rather than cut any estimate he thought it would be better to take credit in housing receipts for a further £775 and this would reduce the increase to 16%.

Besides this some of these old buildings are a menace to safety and health and the Urban Council should take steps to see that they are demolished and the sites cleared.

One such place which comes to mind is the old house at the level crossing at Sunfield Street in Abbeyville. This was at one time owned by a gatekeeper and his family when trains were running on the Waterford-Mallow line but it has been uncared for for a considerable time now and has fallen into disrepair.

It is a dangerous building from the roofing slates have been partially stripped but children from the nearby housing estate have turned it into a playing place where they could easily be injured.

The building is apparently the property of C.I.E. but I think the Urban Council should make representations to the Railway authorities to have it demolished and cleared away as quickly as possible.

Labour T.D. on the Status of Women

Dr. John E. O'Connell, T.D., (Lab.) in the course of a paper on "The Emerging Woman" read to a meeting of Sororipolans in the Towers Hotel in Waterford last Friday, said—

"On a broad scale one can see the improvement in the status of women in society when it is considered that only seventy years ago not only had women no economic status but they had no real opportunities for education or work and certainly had no rights even over their own children. When that formidable list of sins against humanity are listed, then it is easily seen that things aren't what they used to be."

"That however, still does not mean that there is room for self-congratulations. Discrimination against women in both overt and subtle forms, still remains. It probably hasn't become a major plank in public controversy because public life and important positions are dominated by men and because women, remain unaware of the extent of the discrimination. Even if it were more people were more aware, and there was greater controversy surrounding it, the injustice of it would be difficult to deal with by way of legislation because the root of the problem is cultural and psychological. But that does not mean that certain legislative and practical steps cannot be taken."

"There can be no doubt that discrimination based on prejudice is responsible for girls being discouraged or hindered in their pursuit of higher education and to women being excluded from the jobs further and higher education would normally lead them to."

"There is no equality in the public or local government service. In the public service a woman and a man can get forward for the same promotional opportunity. Even if the woman excels in the examination she is very often discriminated against when it comes to the interview on which the job will finally be decided. She will be turned down on the 'personality' test."

"The professions in this country have a disgraceful preponderance of male dominance."

POINTS OF DISCRIMINATION Dr. O'Connell went on to say that because there was no proper health service society discriminated against the woman who cannot allow her family to want while she buys to maintain her health.

Society discriminated against the woman who can be evicted with her young family just because her husband, when ever he wishes to desert, turns in the key of the house at the Corporation office.

Society discriminated against the widow who returns to her work in the Civil Service. Then she finds she is still a single girl and paid as such, even though her responsibilities may have increased enormously.

We proposed to discriminate against the widows of civil servants.

"Some of the Semi-State boards are so Christian," said Dr. O'Connell in conclusion, "that they would rather bring the widows of some of their company men back to work for a wage to supplement their pension, before they would pay a just and proper pension in line with the income of the husband."

"The whole spectrum of discrimination against women is so great that certainly women must show more militance in their own cause. The social welfare code is based on a concept of society in which the family, as a patriarchy, existed. If there is to be change it will have to be the women who ensure that the proper changes are made."
