FIREBALL—METEORITE

People all over Ireland and in parts of England and Wales reported seeing a strange object in the sky on last Friday night. The daily press, radio and television were full of reports of the strange sighting on Saturday and the object was variously described by meteorologists and astronomers as a fireball, a meteorite, and a Russian space vehicle re-entering the earth's atmosphere. There were others, however, who were satisfied to accept it as just another of the phenomena which are seen over Dungarvan roughly at 9 p.m. by a number of local people. One of these, teenager Alfred Ebanks, described how he was sitting watching television at about 9.10 p.m. when he saw the strange object in the sky. It was all colours but mostly red and green and had smoke coming from it. It travelled at terrific speed and seemed to turn over in the sky as it disappeared. He described its shape as being round with a tail out of it.

Unless Rating System Is Changed Many More Councils Will Be Dissolved Next Year

WARNING THAT RATES HAVE REACHED SATURATION POINT

It was also stated that unless the present rating system was changed before next year many other Councils throughout the country would go the same way as Dublin City Council went this year when they were dissolved by the Minister for Local Government for refusing to strike what he considered an inadequate rate.

STOLEN RING FOUND

SMASH AND GRAB RAID AT DUNGARVAN JEWELLERY SHOP

There was a daring smash and grab raid in which thieves got away with rings, watches, bracelets and other jewellery valued at about £750 from the Waterford Glass Shop at Main Street, Dungarvan, in the early hours of last Sunday morning. The shop is the property of Mr. Colm Moloney, a master of minutes. At about 12.45 a.m. residents in the Main Street heard a crash of glass and Mr. William Downey, publican, whose licensed premises is about 100 yards from Mr. Moloney's shop, came to his front door and looked up the street and saw two young men standing at the window of the shop. He at once alerted the Gardaí who were on the scene in a matter of minutes but the thieves had disappeared.

PLANNING MAKES PROFIT

Systems of husbandry vary, not only with different types of livestock, but also from area to area and from farmer to farmer. Nevertheless, there are certain basic principles which should be followed. Among these is that of planning ahead—preparing a pattern of management to help keep loss of time, materials, and money to a minimum.

GOOD PLANNING

1. Make regular worming part of your farming routine.
2. Take into account the conditions under which a given breed or flock are kept.
3. Worm all in-lamb ewes and in-pigs sows as standard procedure.
4. Worm young stock as necessary throughout the summer. This will depend on stocking rate, pasture condition, and weather.
5. If stock becomes heavily worm-infested, follow the first treatment with a second dose in 15 to 30 days.
6. Where possible, have "clean" pasture available for the stock to move to after dosing.
