There has been a tremendous response from all over the county for The Big, Big Charity Walk, organised by the Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland, which takes place on Sunday next, May 18. Forty centres throughout Ireland, among which are Dungarvan, Fermoy, Waterford, Cork and Clonnet will be coming under 'starters orders' and it is hoped that a big number of walkers will turn out to support the venture in each of these centres.

The national charities which will benefit from the proceeds are: Irish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, Central Remedial Clinic, Polio Fellowship, UNICEF and the National Association for the Mentally Handicapped in Ireland. Local charities in the counties where walks are taking place will also benefit and in the case of Dungarvan, the St. Vincent de Paul Conference in Dungarvan and Abbotside and St. John's Association for Mentally Handicapped Children will divide 50% of the proceeds between them.

The key to the real success of the walk is for each walker to be backed by as many sponsors as possible and this is the big job for all walkers before Sunday. Friends, relations, neighbours, work mates and clubmates should all be roped in to share in the undertaking.

Co. Council Finalises Ballinacourty Water Scheme Resolution

CAUTIOUS APPROACH TO SAFEGUARD COUNCIL'S INTERESTS

After a fairly protracted discussion during which several members expressed the need to safeguard the Council's interests in the event of any further expenditure, Waterford County Council at its quarterly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday decided by 17 votes to 4 to pass a resolution to finalise the financing of the £120,000 new water scheme to be provided at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan, to service the new Quigley-Magnesian factory, at present in the course of construction. The discussion had been deferred from the previous meeting of the Council to allow members an opportunity to further consider the revised costs of the scheme.

In a report to the last meeting, the County Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling, said that the original estimate for the scheme submitted by their Consulting Engineer amounted to £75,000. This was based on a daily demand from the Company of 1.2 million gallons. In granting planning permission for the factory, the Council made certain stipulations in the interests of local amenities and as a result the Company found that a 50% increase in the daily requirements of water would be needed. A revised estimate on this basis for £98,000 was then submitted by the Consultant.

The report went on to state that the Council then approved the raising of the loan for this sum and agreed that the loan charges should be borne equally by the Council and the Company.

The scheme went to tender and the tender accepted (submitted by Burke, Clancy & Co., Galway) was for £120,000. Fresh negotiations took place with the Company in regard to the financing of the revised total and as a result the Company agreed to make a capital contribution of 50% of the estimated £98,000, plus 75% of the excess of £22,000 to meet the total contract price. On this basis the share of capital to be contributed by the Company would be £65,000 (54.6%), while the County Council's share would be £33,000 (45.4%). If the total cost of the scheme were to exceed £120,000, there would be no further contribution by way of capital sum of loan charges by the Company.

The Company had further expressed their willingness to advance £10,000 immediately to the Council to enable work to start without delay and would be prepared to meet all further progress payments on the contract on a 50/50 basis.

On these figures the average annual impact on the rates to meet the Council's share would be about 3d.

Mr. A. Deasy said that it was quite likely that the income from rates on the factory would cover the Council's outlay on the water scheme.

Mr. O'Ryan — That seems a bit optimistic.

Mr. Kyne said that if the Company put up the entire cost of the scheme, the Council would get no money from water rates. He felt that the reason why the Company had asked the Council to do the scheme was that in this way no difficulties about wayleaves would arise.
