ELECTION FORECASTING: Forecasting the result of the forthcoming General Election has now become one of the main topics of interest in the Waterford constituency. Seven candidates, three Fianna Fail, two Fine Gael and two Labour, will be seeking election to the three seats and even here there is more than usual interest as to the outcome. Whether the support given to the various parties in the last General Election in 1965 can now be accepted as a criterion of what will happen on June 18 is debatable but the figures which should make the case for each party are as follows: The Party voting strength in the constituency in 1965 was as follows: Labour 13,507; Fine Gael 7,451; Fianna Fail 6,788 and the individual candidates polled as follows: W. Kennedy (F.F.) 7,444 (elected on first count); T. A. Kyne (Lab.) 6,694; T. Lynch (F.F.) 5,380; J. O'Rourke (F.F.) 5,652; R. Walsh (F.G.) 2,032.

Councillor's Challenge To Teachers

RECEIVED SEVERAL ANONYMOUS LETTERS SINCE CRITICISED STRIKE ACTION

While the Judges would make allowances for the normal election material prior to the date of election, fly-posting still present afterwards would be heavily marked. The Board accordingly makes a special appeal to election workers not to paste up posters but to tie them to poles for easy removal afterwards while it hopes that the painting of slogans on walls, bridge parapets and roadways will be completely discouraged. In this regard I see where the E.S.B. has put its foot down by issuing an order that no election literature be affixed to any E.S.B. poles and has instructed E.S.B. employees to remove at once any posters which may be so tied. I have noted in some areas where posters have appeared on some E.S.B. poles already. If election workers are to conform to Bord Failte's suggestion and then find themselves at odds with the E.S.B. it is hard for them to know what to do. Masses of display posters and literature are turned out by all parties at elections and must be displayed somewhere. I am inclined to the view that the final result will see no change in the party strength in the constituency with Fianna Fail, Fine Gael and Labour taking one seat each. The needle will rest between each of the Party candidates seeking these seats and it is this aspect which should make the June 18 election one of more than common interest in Waterford.

WAGE ROUNDS BECOMING LIKE HEAVYWEIGHT BOXING CHAMPIONSHIP

Remuneration and travelling expenses of members of the staff of the County Committee of Agriculture stated that in regard to the County Committee of Agriculture the subject of two letters read at the monthly meeting of the committee on June 4 last Tuesday. A letter from the Department of Agriculture stated that in regard to the 11th round wage increase, the Minister had now agreed that this should apply in the case of C.A.O.'s and instructors and he would make an order in due course granting the increase as from June 1, 1968. The second letter was from the General Council of Committees of Agriculture and this referred to travelling expenses in relation to the 10th round which the Committee had refused to approve. It stated that all other Committees of Agriculture in the country had granted this with the exception of Waterford and asked that the matter be reconsidered. Mr. G. T. Frost, C.A.O., said that provision for these increases had been made in the estimates approved last September. Mr. K. O'Riain said that he had voted against the increase all along the line and he was against these increases now. AGAINST A STONE WALL: In reply to a question by Mr. H. R. Dowd, the C.A.O. said that the increases had been agreed by Conciliation without Arbitration. They would cost an additional £2,000. Mr. G. Heekin — If they have been paid by all the other Committees why should we be odd man out? Mr. Dowd said that they would all feel more happy about the situation if the increases had been the outcome of Arbitration. At the same time he proposed that they be granted. Mr. P. Keenly side seconded. Mr. O'Riain — We may as well face up to the facts. We are only knocking our heads against a stone wall in refusing as they will be granted over our heads anyway. Mr. N. Walsh said his views coincided with Mr. O'Riain's. They could not be doing one thing one day and another the next. In saying this he said he had nothing personal against the staff. Mr. O'Riain — When will all these rounds stop? This is getting like the heavyweight championship of the world. It can go up to 15 rounds and maybe it won't stop at that. The C.A.O. said that there would be wage rounds as long as there was a general increase in living costs. Mr. O'Riain said that the farmers had to accept a cut of 2d. a gallon in their milk and they were the only section of the community in the country accepting a cut in their incomes. SO EASY FOR TIPPERARY

Waterford Collapse in Pool Munster Championship Game

Mr. Sean Whelan (F.P.) speaking at a Church meeting in Grange on Sunday, said: "As the only farmer candidate in the field, and as a member of the N.F.A., I look forward confidently to the support of the rural community on June 18. Our opponents constantly criticise us for neglecting agriculture, and I personally find it very strange that none of them offered a farmer for whom you could vote in this election. Fianna Fail alone has put forward a farmer candidate, and I feel that my presence with my City colleagues must give the voters of Waterford the best balanced choice of any Party.

One of the striking similarities about the Fine Gael and Labour documents on agriculture is that they are both in fundamental agreement on one thing, and that is that the small farmer must go, and that only big farm units will survive in our future. The theorists of the opposition parties have written off the small farmer.

In other words, both Fine Gael and Labour accept emigration from our rural areas. Of course, they do not put it as bluntly as Mr. Cosgrave did some time ago with his prophecy that we could only survive with the 400-cow farms. However you read them, the underlying theme of the agricultural policies these two parties have trotted out for the general election is that wholesale abandonment of land of Ireland by its people must be tacitly accepted."

CONCERNED WITH PLANS NOT PEOPLE

The trouble with Fine Gael and Labour when it comes to agriculture and the universal problem of the movement of people from the land, said Mr. Whelan, "is that each of them is concerned with plans rather than with people. This is the defeatist policy that the opposition parties have consistently preached during the last decade of steady and continued advancement under successive Fianna Fail Governments.

Fianna Fail on the other hand, have always believed in the people and particularly in the people of rural Ireland from Donegal to Waterford. We do not accept that our farm structures must be drastically overhauled or that small farmers should be given bribes or incentives, or whatever one wants to call them, to abandon their holdings and move out of agriculture.

What Fianna Fail does believe in is that every small farmer must be given opportunities to raise his earnings and to improve the living standards of his family. That is why the Party I represent have introduced such opportunities as the Small Farms (Incentive Bonuses) Scheme, the Beef Incentive Scheme, the scheme of grants for Farming Sows, the hill sheep subsidy and similar schemes—all designed to help the farmer help himself.

In addition to all this, the Government has fostered tourism, forestry and fishing as ways of providing supplementary income for those on small holdings, and under the Small Industries Scheme is encouraging steady growth in rural areas. The indications are that this policy is paying dividends."

CONCERN AT DROP IN DAIRY FARMERS INCOME

Reports from the dairying areas indicate increasing concern among creamery milk suppliers at the further reduction they have suffered in their income position in recent weeks.

Mr. R. V. Hourigan, Secretary of the N.F.A. National Dairy Committee said: "It is now clear that the increase in the Bord Bannie levy allied to rises in production and processing costs at the creameries themselves are really beginning to hit dairy farmers. The cuts are generally in the region of 2d. per gallon but in some areas they are down as much as 3d. a gallon. There has been a very strong reaction indeed to the cut in income in all areas and small and medium dairy farmers are up in arms at the losses they are suffering."

Mr. Hourigan added that dairy farmers do not accept the statement from the Minister for Agriculture that family income from dairying may show an appreciable increase this year over 1968. Indeed, they are adamant, he said, that their net position is now much worse and they claim that the Minister has so far ignored the comprehensive case for an increase in income outlined to him by the N.F.A. in the pre-Budget talks.

Mr. Hourigan, who spent some days visiting dairying counties in the South, gave a full assessment of the position to the N.F.A. President, Mr. T. J. Maher and meanwhile a meeting of the N.F.A. Special Planning Committee, set up by the National Council, was arranged to discuss the whole position on milk prices generally.

A joint working committee on wages and salaries in the public services has recommended increases for all grades when current agreements end on May 31st. Some workers would get as much as 25/- a week from June 1st and a further £1 a week from October 1st, if the recommendations are implemented.

Dairy farmers, however, got nothing in the Budget. Mr. Blaney in a recent statement said: "The Government appreciate the importance of the income from dairying as a constituent of total farm income and will give full consideration to trends in costs, production and receipts in the dairying sector in giving effect to its policy."

Action will speak louder than words to the country's 110,000 dairy farmers. Cleverly couched statements by Mr. Blaney, calculated to raise hopes without promising anything definite, will not satisfy the dairy farmers now as they get their monthly milk cheques and see how their incomes have been reduced.

One thing and one thing only will show whether Mr. Blaney realises the full extent of the cut that creamery milk suppliers have suffered—if he acts on the N.F.A.'s claim for an immediate increase in the basic price of milk and the introduction of a calf subsidy.

ATTITUDE OF MINISTER CRITICISED

The President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher expressed deep concern at Galway at the attitude that had been adopted by Mr. Blaney recently on the whole question of involvement by Department officials with organised farmers in discussing or tackling problems of mutual concern.

Mr. Maher revealed that when the N.F.A. invited the Minister to send representatives of his Department to a meeting in Athlone of the various interests connected with the sheep industry, Mr. Blaney had replied that participation in meetings of this kind by officials of his Department was not appropriate.

Mr. Maher said that Mr. Blaney in his letter said the function of Department officials was simply "to carry out policies approved and announced by the Minister." And Mr. Blaney had made the further point that in his view it was not the practice for an official to take part in outside discussions on matters which had a bearing on existing Ministerial policies which he (the official) was helping to administer.

Mr. Maher went on: "What happened in the case of the Athlone meeting is only one instance in a growing train of highly disturbing events. Before the Dail dissolved the Minister in replying to questions as to why he did not give organised farmers representation on the new Wool Council, said without any apology to anyone—I am empowered to set up this Board and nominate its members and I do not intend to hand over this power to any organisations no matter how meritorious."

Mr. Maher said that Mr. Blaney seemed to be guided by a philosophy of keeping the servants of the people apart from the people. This idea that the Civil Servants in the Department of Agriculture must not become involved with the people working in the

"I believe," said Mr. Maher, "in farmer, agricultural advisers and Civil Servants all working together for the common good of the industry. I believe in a direct line from the farmers to the advisers to the Minister taking organised farmers into his confidence, not working independently of them, not denying them a voice in the Boards and Councils that are established."

Mr. Maher said that in any re-organisation of the advisory services the approach must be on the basis of control by an autonomous body. The N.F.A. therefore recommended the setting up of an Agricultural Advisory Service Council to be financed from Central Funds and Local Authority Funds, but would not be answerable to any of these individually and would have a freedom in policy-making and implementation so vital to the provision of a streamlined service.

WANT FULL INCREASE ON BEEF PRICES

The N.F.A. National Livestock Committee is pursuing its attempt to have the full 15/- per cwt. increase in beef prices, as granted to British farmers, paid to Irish beef producers. The increase in Ireland is 5/- per cwt. under the British level.

A statement from the Association said that the N.F.A. Livestock Committee was totally satisfied with the Department's attitude towards their efforts to have the Irish rate of subsidy restored to full parity with the rate payable in Northern Ireland and in Britain following this year's increase of 15/- per live cwt. in the guaranteed price of fat cattle in the U.K.

MARTS SHOULD PROMOTE LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION

A call to the managements of marts to become actively engaged in promoting increased livestock production was made by the President of the N.F.A. in Carlow.

Mr. Maher suggested that in addition to this they should endeavour to devise schemes that would help the achievement of greater quality.

The N.F.A. President, who was opening an extension to Carlow Co-operative Livestock Mart, said that Carlow was a glowing example of what could be achieved by efficient management. Business had increased four-fold in three years and with the extensions now added, the mart was one of the finest in the country.

The new extension will cater specially for the sale of pigs and sheep, while the existing area for the sale of cattle (there is accommodation for 1,600 cattle) has been entirely covered.

Mr. Maher said that the marts system was today an integral part of the whole livestock industry. People tended to put a lot of stress on State investment in agriculture. Some talked as if the farmers themselves invested nothing in their own industry. But let us not forget, he said, that the success story represented in the development of the marts system in this country is a tribute in itself to the

LABOUR PARTY MEETING AT TOURANEENA

Speaking at a week-end meeting at Touraneena, Mr. T. A. Kyne (Lab.) said that the Special Committee set up on the 1st May to examine the position of the lower paid workers which has now reported that a wage increase of from 12.5-15 per cent downwards is justified is clear indication of the panic in the Government.

The Trade Union movement had already given notice to the Government that it intended to put forward a wage demand on behalf of these workers. The Government's response sought by accepting the recommendations of the Committee to pay the first instalment of 25/- on the 1st June to try to pose as the guardians of the workers' interests or to forestall a bigger demand by the Trade Unions. This was a move which the Government came strange when one remembered that only last March the Minister for Finance was appealing to Trade Unions not to press for increased wages as the economy of the country could not stand it. The increase from June 1st was the first bite of the carrot to lead the workers to vote for Fianna Fail on June 18th and the further increase after the election could be ignored by the Government if they came back to power.

LABOUR PARTY AIMS

"The scandal of the years of delay in sanctioning Local Authority plans for the building of working class houses, the provision of water and sewerage while at the same time publicly demanding these bodies to go ahead with these plans was," he said "well-known to all members of Local Authorities. Year after year the Government provides only token sums to meet the Council requirements."

"Now can anyone trust a Government who stoops to such tactics. Labour if elected will press on with full employment as their first task. Second will be houses for all who need them. Thirdly will be a free Health Service and a Social Welfare code that will meet the needs of the old, the sick the widow and orphan."

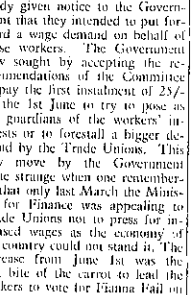
