ELECTION ROUND UP
 Last week we took a look back at the result of the 1965 General Election in the Waterford Constituency and this week we will take a brief glance at the figures that emerged at that time in the South Tipperary Constituency in which a large part of West Waterford is contained and the Cork North-East Constituency.
 The Party vote in South Tipperary in 1965 was Fianna Fail 17,475; Fine Gael 12,522; Labour 7,005. The total valid poll was 36,832 and the quota was 7,367.
 The result of the first count was Mr. Don Davern (Fianna Fail) 8,540 (elected); Mr. Sean Treacy (Lab.) 7,005; Mr. John Fahy (Fianna Fail) 4,595; Mr. Denis Burke (Fine Gael) 4,433; Surgeon P. Hogan (Fine Gael) 4,359; Mr. Willie Ryan (Fianna Fail) 4,340; Mr. T. O'Donoghue (Fine Gael) 3,560.
 Mr. Treacy was elected in the third count. Mr. Fahy in the fourth count and Surgeon Hogan in the fifth leaving the state of the parties in the constituency unchanged with Fianna Fail 2; Fine Gael 1 and Labour 1.
 One of the tragedies for this constituency was the untimely and widely regretted death last year of Mr. Don Davern who had been making a great success of the Junior Ministry to which he had been appointed. His seat was never filled and remained vacant up to the time of the dissolution of the 18th Dail last month.

POST OFFICE SHUT DOWN IN DUNGARVAN

The Secretary, Dungarvan Branch Post Office, Officially announces that the following letter to the Editor: Dear Sir,

Close express outlines the cause of the 2 1/2 hour stoppage at this office on Tuesday the 10th inst.

"To-day by direction of the executive council 10 members of their labour from 3.30 to 5 p.m. in common with our colleagues throughout the country we are protesting against discriminatory practices being employed against members of the P.O.O.A. by the Department of Posts and Telegraphs. Contrary to what the Department has publicly stated we have one case in the fight to bring about justice for post office employees. Industrial peace cannot exist in the post office until victimisation ends and is seen to be ended.

We express regret for the inconvenience caused to the people of Dungarvan for the serious disruption of postal and telecommunication services. The blame for our situation does not rest with the Association but with the Department of Posts and Telegraphs, which by its campaign of victimisation and subsequent denial of such action has provoked this dispute."

WATERFORD WITHSTAND LATE TIPP. PRESSURE

NARROW WIN IN THRILLING REPLAY

Waterford 0-15; Tipperary 0-14

There was unprecedented excitement in a tension packed, rip-roaring final quarter when Waterford withstood the fury of a desperate Tipperary onslaught in a thrilling replay of their drawn first round Munster senior football championship game at a packed Fraher Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday night last.

Waterford survived by the narrowest of margins and go on to meet Kerry in the next round against Dungarvan but the issue hung in the balance right to the final whistle in a game which almost produced a similar finish to that of the drawn encounter. Waterford were ahead 0-9 to 0-5 at the interval and led 0-12 to 0-9 going into the final quarter.

The final fifteen minutes produced a real see-saw battle as fortunes fluctuated. Tipp, stormed the Waterford goal and with four minutes left Waterford were struggling to hold an 0-14 to 0-13 lead.

TREMENDOUS PRESSURE

The Waterford pointed and with three minutes left they were two points clear. Yet they were anything but safe as the Premier county men put on tremendous pressure.

Waterford were penalised for foul in defence and John Cummins' point from the free left Waterford a solitary point in front. But this led proved sufficient to see them through to the next round as their defence locked right to another fierce Tipp-pressure.

It was a fitting result to a game which although it did not produce a very high standard of football, was nonetheless packed with thrills and excitement throughout the hour.

Waterford deserved their win and it would have been a real travesty of justice had they succumbed to Tipp's pressure in the closing stages.

ON TOP

While the losers had their moments of supremacy Waterford were clearly on top for most of the game. The pair of Seamus Keavans and P. Walsh won most of the tussles in this sector.

Playing with the wind in the first half they got off to a great start as their speedy half forwards line played havoc with the Tipp defence. They were ahead 0-4 to nil after 9 minutes and still managed to shoot five wides in this opening period during which Tom Walsh missed what looked like a certain goal.

Tipperary came more into the game when Mick Keating moved from left corner forward to the centre-forward berth but still Waterford's 0-9 to 0-5 interval lead in no way flattered them.

Play swung from end to end in a fast second half. Vinny Kirwan stretched Waterford's lead with a point within a minute, but Tipp points by John Cummins and Pat Connell cut Waterford's lead to three. Tom Riordan had a Waterford point and Vinny Kirwan added another and was later unlucky with a great shot but two great saves from Mick Keating left three points between the sides and signalled the start of Tipperary's fighting rally going into the final quarter.

TACKLED TENACIOUSLY The victory must prove of tremendous importance to Waterford. Seldom, if ever, have they shown such spirit and determination as they fought for every ball. They tackled tenaciously in defence where Jim Wall at full-back gave very effective cover to the keeper. Wall won almost every duel in the air and got very good assistance from Noel Walsh, Tommy Mooney and Pat Clancy.

Seamus Keavans and both P. Walsh and Tom Riordan in the middle field area while Vinny Kirwan, Michael Power and Tom Riordan showed exceptionally good form in attack.

John O'Donoghue proved a sound keeper for Tipp, while M. McCormack, Mick Egan and Pat Dawson all played soundly in defence. Liam Myles tried hard for the hour at midfield while P. THE ELECTION

Wednesday, June 18 is Polling Day in what must be regarded as one of the most vital elections in our history.

And for an section of the community it is more vital than for the farming community.

Too often it is said of farmers: "They will vote the way their fathers voted."

This belief that farmers never change has led in a way to the conviction that there is no floating rural vote.

New faces have come to the front in all three parties in this election — many young faces among them.

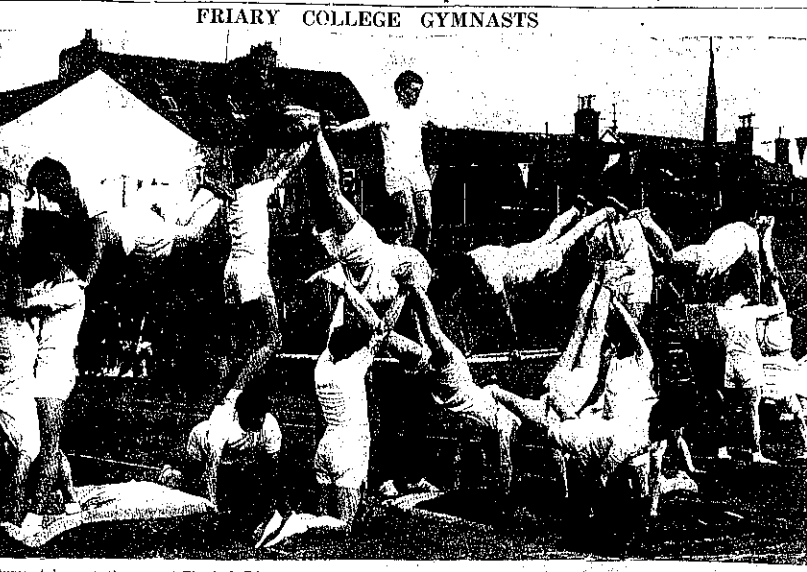

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RATE COLLECTOR RESIGNS

Council Decides On Office Collection In Future

When a letter of resignation was read from Mr. James Harty, Ballymacrack, Dungarvan, Rate Collector for the Dungarvan and Youghal Rural Areas, at last Monday's monthly meeting of Dungarvan County Council in Dungarvan it was stated that his warrant at over £88,000, was the biggest in the county of any collector.

Mr. E. J. O'Leary, Acting Secretary, told the Council that if they wished to arrange for the collection of the rates for these areas through the office for the future they would have to suspend standing orders in order to transfer the collection to Mr. P. Hogan who was in charge of the Council's Office collection in Dungarvan.

Mr. W. Kennedy pointed out that it was already agreed by the Council that as collectors resigned their collection should be taken over by the office.

Asked what the office collection was costing at present, Mr. O'Leary said that it was costing £5,551. He pointed out that if the Dungarvan and Youghal rural areas were now going to be added, additional accommodation and another Clerical Officer would be required as a total of 8 districts would then be collected from the office.

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, pointed to Mr. Harty, who, he said, was for years one of the most efficient rate collectors in the county who brought a great deal of humanity and understanding to his work.

Other members of the Council also joined in the tributes to Mr. Harty.

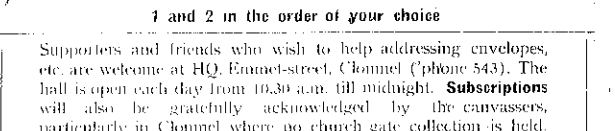
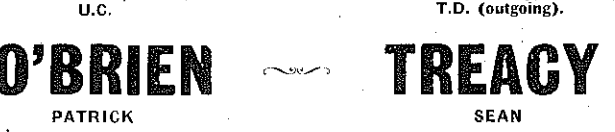
