## PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

### ELECTION ROUND UP

I am penning these lines on the eve of polling day but by the time you read them the ballot boxes will have been filled and opened and the counting of votes will be proceeding in all constituencies up and down the country. First results should be available from the "early" constituencies this evening but the general picture of the election will not show itself until late tonight or early tomorrow.

In the few days prior to polling the election "hotted" up a good deal and matters got quite dirty in Dublin where a lot of dirty linen was washed. Except for a couple of small incidents, the campaign in Waterford was fought cleanly. There was, however, a good deal of in-fighting as candidates, in a quiet way, sought, even within their own parties, to gain every bit of ground to keep them in front long enough to be there with a winning chance at the end.

One of the things which clearly emerged during the campaign was that the day of the mass public meetings has ended in rural areas and this was clearly shown by the small crowds which turned up at all public meetings held by all parties. This was particularly evident even in the case of a meeting addressed by a government Minister for which only a handful of people turned up in Dungarvan. Ten or fifteen years ago such a speaker would have drawn a big crowd.

The emphasis on this occasion was on the personal canvass and all candidates worked hard to cover as much of the constituency by personal calls as possible. Well known in the area and hand-shaking is done with and we await the outcome with more than usual interest.

In the meantime I would appeal to the Election Directors of all parties in the constituency to send out an urgent request to workers in all areas to remove the thousands of posters which have been tacked to poles and displayed in various places during the past couple of weeks. I equally appeal to the workers of all parties in all areas to co-operate by removing these posters as quickly as possible. In the weeks and days prior to the election we came to accept this as a part of the campaign and we have never had it so what harassed lies can be dressed as the Ireland stands, geographically in Western Europe, under a sun which has not shined for 25 years ago. Yet, the countries which stand in Europe, the rate of progress has been made in Ireland. All round us, progress has been made in some kind of shadow at Boom. For one thing, the price of milk is 9/9 per gallon on average in West 1/6 to 1/10 in Ireland—yet in other parts that you did not go good.

### DUNGARVAN'S BIG INTERNATIONAL SEA ANGLING VENTURE

Last week members of the Dungarvan Sea Angling Club and Junior Chamber of Commerce joined forces and travelled to Dublin where they held a special Press Conference to announce details of the big international 3-day sea-angling competition which will be the main feature of this year's "Shark and Shanty Week" in Dungarvan.

The Festival Week will commence on Sunday, July 13 and the Angling International will take place on July 18, 19 and 20. Olympic style gold medals will be the top awards for the winners and anglers from all over Ireland, Britain and the Continent are expected to converge on Dungarvan for this great new international event.

Mr. Michael Moloney, Chairman of the Angling Club, with Mr. Austin Hallahan, President of the Junior Chamber and Mr. John Coleman, Chairman, Festival Committee gave details and said that at the end of the contest, gold medals will be presented to the top anglers who capture the heaviest fish in the seven separate classes—shark, skate, ray, conger, gar fish, tope and pollack. There will also be silver and bronze medals for second and third in each class while further gold medal awards will go to the team of four with the heaviest total catch over the three days. In addition a National Trophy for the country gaining the highest number of points will be awarded. All the awards will be presented at a big ceremony to mark the end of the contest.

And while the anglers are at sea hunting the "big uns," the Junior Chamber have plans to ensure that their wives and families will not

be bored ashore. They have organised a wide variety of side events for this purpose and for the entertainment of non-angling visitors to the town during the week.

Many of these will have a nautical flavour and will include a water-skiing exhibition, rowing boat races, sailing events, swimming gala and water safety exhibition. For the youngsters there will be a crab fishing contest, children's sports and a children's art exhibition.

I hope that this great event will find a widespread appeal and attract anglers in record numbers not only from all over Ireland but from Britain, France, Germany, Belgium, Holland and as many other countries as possible to give it the real international flavour that it deserves.

### SHANNON ANGLERS COMING

The Shannon Airport Angling Club are paying a further compliment to Dungarvan as a sea-angling centre by again deciding to come here for their 20th Annual Deep Sea Angling Competition this year on Saturday and Sunday, July 5th and 6th.

The Club's genial Hon. Secretary, Con MacMahon has sent me a copy of the programme for the event which is bound to attract a big gathering of "flying folk" to the Old Bore. Last year on their initial visit, the weather was unkind so let us hope that the "Met." men will be able to arrange more suitable conditions this year for their flying friends.

Incidentally the men from Shannon and indeed sea anglers everywhere will be glad to hear that the first shark of the season to be caught off the south coast was landed in Dungarvan last Saturday. The honour fell to Mr. R. J. King, 16 Penery Road, Rainham, Essex. This augurs well for the rest of the season.

### NUMBERS ON DOORS

The need to have houses clearly numbered in streets and terraces was stressed to me recently by a member of the Medical Profession who told me of his recurring difficulty in finding houses to which he was called. This, he explained, was particularly so at night-time when it was almost impossible to locate houses he was seeking.

I understand that this problem was discussed at a recent meeting of the Waterford Branch of the Medical Association and doctors from all areas complained of a similar problem.

In Dungarvan where the Urban Council owns most of the houses I wonder could they arrange to have the house numbers painted clearly on the gate piers where these exist or otherwise on the doors or issue an appeal to the tenants to do so. In other towns where the County Council own numbers of houses perhaps they might do the same thing while tenants of privately owned houses might also co-operate in a similar manner. In the case of detached or semi-detached houses which have a name, it would be well if these were displayed as clearly as possible, also preferably on gate piers.

### THE BALLAD OF EDMOND POWER

In Dungarvan Park, overlooking Dungarvan harbour, stands an imposing monument which nowadays attracts little or no attention. The monument, topped by a Celtic Cross, bears an inscription, in Irish, which tells the story of its existence. The inscription also tells the fate of a noble Deise patriot who in 1798 gave his life for Ireland. Translated it reads: "In memory of Edmond Power, who was hanged in Dungarvan, for love of country in 1798. Also in memory of the other heroes of '98 who fought and shed their blood for

### DIRECT LINK

This new service has been introduced to meet a demand for a direct and speedy link between the important cities and towns of Wexford, New Ross, Waterford, Dungarvan and Cork. It is expected that the service will prove to be invaluable to holidaymakers, and indeed to local people wishing to make the through journey in Cork or to intermediate points served. A saving of almost one and a half hours between Wexford and Cork has been achieved, as compared with existing schedules, and the new service is being provided at attractive fares.

An express service commenced between Waterford and Galway in 1968, and support in the first year of operation was quite satisfactory. It has been found that our growing network of express services is proving to be extremely popular with tourists and holidaymakers who want to travel in a carefree and easy manner. These people often avail of our wide range of day and half-day trips which operate from the main tourist centres.

### N.F.A. CO. EXECUTIVE DISCUSSES WORSENING MILK PRICE

At a meeting held on 10th June, Waterford Co. Executive, N.F.A. discussed the worsening creamery milk price. Delegates pointed out that the decrease in price between April 1968 and April 1969 was just about 2d. per gallon. While it was obvious that farmers were at last becoming really concerned about the drop in their income Mr. D. Hourigan said to many farmers were being conditioned by propaganda into accepting that there was too much milk. This was a very dangerous position as it could lead to a lack of confidence in the dairy industry with a resulting drop in cattle numbers. Nobody could deny that the export of cattle both live and as dead meat was of vital importance to the economy of the country and likewise nobody could deny that the bulk of those cattle came from dairy farms.

Much was being made of the increased call prices this year but because of the severe spring weather this increase had covered the cost of extra feeding stuffs which every farmer had to buy. The meeting felt the situation now was that dairy farmers having had a decrease in income together with a rise in production were going to the stage where they would be prepared to take strong action in support of their justifiable claim for an increase in the price of milk.

### OWN INSURANCE COMPANY

The meeting was told that Farmer Business Developments expected to have their own Insurance Company operating in the very near future. This Company would cater in particular for the needs of farmers in the field of Insurance, and expected to pay a attractive dividend while providing a good service. The Chairman said that all members of N.F.A. should seriously consider becoming Shareholders in F.B.D.
