OVER £21 MILLION PRIZE FUND FOR DERBY SWEEP
The draw for a £2,268,000 prize fund in the Irish Hospitals Sweep Derby, to be run at The Curragh on Saturday, was held in Ballsbridge, Dublin, on Wednesday. The total proceeds came to £4,392,544, a quarter of which goes to the hospitals fund which, after stamp duty of £207,984, leaves £4,184,560 for the hospitals.
Mr. Bart Assabale, Publicity Director, announced the amount before the draw began in the Irish Hospitals Sweepstakes centre in Ballsbridge.
The prize fund, he said, would be divided as follows: 18 first horse prizes of £50,000 each; 18 second horse prizes of £20,000 each; 18 third horse prizes of £10,000 each; and 50 residual prizes of £2,170 each.

ARE YOU LOOKING FORWARD TO YOUR HOLIDAYS THIS YEAR? In many homes holidays are considered a luxury which is only for the wealthy few. This, of course, is very wrong as everyone deserves at least one week away from the routine of day to day living. Many Credit Union members are availing of loans to enable them to enjoy the overdue holiday. Loans are available to members for any worthwhile purpose and indeed since it started over a year ago in Tallow, Credit Union loans have been granted for such worthwhile reasons as the purchase of electrical appliances, T.V. licences, Rates, Tax and insurance of motor cars, household furnishings, house repairs, honeymoon expenses, Christmas gifts and overdue electricity bills, seeds and gardening equipment, etc.
In time of need, which is better to withdraw your shares or to take a loan from your Credit Union?
Here is an example which is given in a Credit Union booklet written by Miss Nora Herlihy who started the Credit Union Movement in Ireland in 1938.
Jack and Joe both have saved £100 in the Credit Union since they joined. Now they both need £100 to buy motor-bikes which they need to use to and from work.
Jack withdrew his £100 from the Credit Union. Jack took the money out because he would not have to pay interest. On that he saved approx. £6-10/-.
Jack lost the dividend his savings would have earned for three months. But—Jack having taken out all his savings and spent them felt discouraged and he would never reach the £100 again so he didn't bother to save anymore. After one year Jack still had no savings and he had lost the good habit of saving each pay-day.
On the other hand Joe left his savings in the Credit Union and took a loan of £100. Joe determined to pay back the loan in one year so he knew the interest would be about £6-10/-, Joe still had his £100 in the Credit Union so it earned him a dividend of approx. £3-10/-. But—Joe by taking on the responsibility of saving each month to pay the loan back kept coming back to the Credit Union each pay-day. After one year Joe had paid back the loan and still had his £100 savings and still had the wonderful habit of saving something every pay-day.
But something different might have happened these two. Watch—Suppose Jack took his money, bought the bicycle and suddenly died.
His family has the bicycle—paid for, by his money. His savings all taken out from the Credit Union—no more savings or insurance from the Credit Union for his family. Total collected. Nothing.
Suppose Joe who took the loan of £100, bought the bicycle and suddenly died. His family has the bicycle paid for by Cuna Mutual Insurance. Debt cancelled. Family has to pay nothing. His family collects—(1) his savings £100, (2) his insurance (which may be £100). Total collected £200.
Moral—Far better to take a loan than to withdraw your savings from the Credit Union.

MR. DONAL DEMPSEY, CORK
It is with deep and sincere regret that we record the death of Mr. Donal Dempsey, which occurred at his residence, "Avoncliff," Bishops Avenue, in the early hours of last Sunday morning. Deceased who was a Divisional Inspector with the Department of Agriculture was eldest son of the late Daniel and Mrs. Dempsey, Shandon Farm, Dungarvan.
An outstanding official in the area in which he worked, the late Donal Dempsey started his career as an Assistant Manager under the management of the late Edmond Maher at the Dungarvan Co-operative Creamery in the early 1930's. Mr. Patrick (Fad) Browne (F.F.) who first became a T.D. in the 1966 By-election retained his seat after a close fight with Mr. Tom Kyne (Lab.) whom he ousted in the final count.

DAVERN HEADS POLL IN SOUTH TIPP-WEST WATERFORD. In the South Tipperary—West Waterford Constituency, Cashed Sales Representative, Noel Davern headed the poll and showed the big pulling power which the Davern name still has in the constituency. There was no change here as each of the outgoing deputies was re-elected.

FREE ELECTRICITY ALLOWANCE FOR CERTAIN BRITISH AND NORTHERN IRELAND RETIREMENT PENSIONERS WHO ARE AGED 70 AND OVER. The Minister for Social Welfare has decided to extend the scheme of free electricity allowances administered by his Department to include persons aged 70 and over who are resident in the State and who are receiving a Retirement Pension from the British Department of Health and Social Security, Newcastle upon Tyne, and the Northern Ireland Ministry of Health and Social Services. An eligible retirement pensioner must be a registered consumer of electricity with the Electricity Supply Board and must be living alone or with the following classes of person only—

- (a) his wife; (b) an invalid husband or other invalid person who ordinarily resides with the pensioner; (c) other British and Northern Ireland Retirement Pensioners aged 70 and over; (d) persons receiving old age or blind pension or, being aged 70 or over, widow's (contributory) pension from the Department of Social Welfare, Dublin; (e) a child or children under the age of 16 for whose maintenance the pensioner is ordinarily responsible or children over 16 who are attending school full time.

The scheme will come into operation on the 1st August, 1969, for those whose electricity accounts cover the August/September, two month period and from 1st September, 1969, for those whose electricity accounts cover the September/October period. Application forms and further details may be obtained from the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare, Free Electricity Section, Anas Mhic Dharmada, Dublin, 1.

FREE RADIO AND TELEVISION LICENCES. A retirement pensioner who has been awarded a free electricity allowance by the Department of Social Welfare will be eligible for a free radio and television licence from 1st August, 1969, and may obtain an application form at the Post Office at which he normally cashes his pension order. With the completed form he should produce at the Post Office. (a) his pension book and (b) a notification from the Department of Social Welfare that he has been awarded a free electricity allowance.

Retirement pensioners aged 70 and over who are not registered consumers of electricity but who otherwise would satisfy the conditions appropriate to the granting of a free electricity allowance may also obtain free licences. An eligible retirement pensioner who satisfies these conditions may obtain an application form (F.L.2) at the Post Office at which he normally cashes his pension order. The completed application form should be sent to Department of Posts and Telegraphs, General Branch, Hammam Buildings, O'Connell Street, Dublin, 1.

Refunds. Eligible pensioners who have current licences may obtain a refund on the unexpired portion on production of the unexpired licence at the Post Office. An Ruoin Leasa Shóisialaigh, Meitheamh, 1969.
