ABBESIDE PARK
At last week's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council reference was made to the suggestion originally made in this column several weeks ago about the possibility of trunking up Abbeyside Park to road level and converting it into a rest centre or small promenade. The Town Engineer advised that nothing should be done for the time being as the Park might be required for possible road widening at a later date.
I still think the idea of fitting in the field (for that is all the Park is) is a good one and even if it is required for road widening later on this will not prove a waste.

SUCCESSFUL APPEAL AGAINST DRUNK DRIVING CONVICTION

CIRCUIT JUDGE WARNS STATE WITNESS
A successful appeal was brought by Noel Kieley, Old Road, Kilmacthomas, at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday against a conviction on a charge of drunk driving and suspension of his driving licence for twelve months imposed on him at Dungarvan District Court on May 14. There was an unusual turn in the case while it was at hearing when one of the State witnesses, Michael Moore, Rusburns Old Parish, summoned to give evidence, failed to turn up and Judge Fawcett issued an order for his arrest and directed that he be brought before the court.
Dr. R. Counahan, State Solicitor, prosecuted and Mr. E. Conyn, B.L. (instructed by J. E. Williams & Co., Solicitors) was for the appellant.
Dr. Counahan outlining the case said that at Dungarvan District Court on May 14, the appellant was convicted on a charge of drunk driving at Bridge Street, Dungarvan, on Sunday night, April 20. He was fined £5 and his licence was suspended for 12 months. The charge arose from a small traffic collision which occurred shortly before midnight near the Devonshire Arms Hotel and which was drawn to the attention of two Garda. The appellant was driving one of the cars involved and the Garda arrested him and took him to the station.
Garda T. O'Donovan in evidence said that following a phone call he went with Garda Power to Bridge St. and saw two cars one of which had been slightly damaged when the other brushed against it. Noel Kieley was the driver of the car and witness said he appeared to be drowsy and unsteady and he got a strong smell of intoxicating liquor from him. Witness formed the opinion that Kieley was not fit to drive and they took him to the station.
Cross-examined by Mr. Conyn witness agreed that beyond being a bit slow in his speech Kieley was otherwise normal. He added that when he drew the defendant first he was very drowsy but he sobered up very quickly when he got to the station.
Garda W. Power said that when they came along Kieley was on the footpath and was very unsteady on his feet and he staggered. Witness spoke to Kieley who denied that he had moved his car at all from where it was parked or that he damaged the other car which was owned by Fritz Stoher.
Garda T. Holland said that he was Station Orderly that night and was present when the defendant was brought in at 12.10 a.m. Dr. O'Connell arrived at 1.40 a.m. and examined him and advised witness to let him home. Before doing so witness read out the charge to the defendant. The defendant replied that the charge was incorrect and said that he had not driven his car.
DOCTOR'S EVIDENCE
Dr. C. P. O'Connell said that he examined the defendant at the Barracks at 1.35 a.m. and put him through the usual tests all of which he performed very well. He formed the opinion that the defendant

INCREASES IN SOCIAL ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS AND OTHER IMPROVEMENTS IN SOCIAL WELFARE SCHEMES

The Social Welfare (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1969, makes provision for increases in the rates of payments and for other improvements in the Social Assistance Schemes as follows:

OLD AGE AND BLIND NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS: As from 1st August, 1969, all rates of pension as well as the addition of 45p. payable to certain incapacitated pensioners will be increased by 10p. a week. The increases will be paid as follows:—

Widow with one qualified child 1247. 15s. 0d.
Widow with two qualified children 1286. 15s. 0d.
The limit of 1286. 15s. 0d. is further increased for each qualified child in excess of two.

WIDOWS' NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS AND ORPHANS' NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS

As from 1st August, 1969, the weekly rate of non-contributory pension payable to a widow or non-contributory widow's pension or contributory pensioners has been increased by 10p. The means limit for receipt of widows' pension is being raised from 1882. 15s. 0d. yearly to 2208. 15s. 0d. and for widows with qualified children is being further increased as follows:—

Widow with one qualified child 1247. 15s. 0d.
Widow with two qualified children 1273. 15s. 0d.
The limit of 1273. 15s. 0d. is further increased for each qualified child in excess of two.

RAISING OF AGE LIMIT FOR INCREASE OF PENSION IN RESPECT OF CHILDREN OF WIDOWS AND FOR ORPHANS' ALLOWANCE AND PENSION

The limit of 1273. 15s. 0d. is further increased for each qualified child in receipt of a contributory or non-contributory widow's pension or contributory old age pension or non-contributory old age or blind pension in respect of children between the ages of 16 and 21 years who are receiving full-time instruction by day at any university, college, school or other educational establishment in the State or in a similar establishment in respect of orphans. Application for the increase should be made without delay to the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare, Area Office, Dublin 1. The application should state the type of pension being received and the pension number. Where a pension was reduced or terminated because a child attained 16 years application should be made if it is considered that the new provision applies.

UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE

As from 30th July, 1969, all weekly rates of Unemployment Assistance are being increased by:—

15p. in the personal rate;
20p. where the person has an adult dependant.

CHILDREN'S ALLOWANCES

Changes in the Children's Allowances Scheme will come into operation on 1st August, 1969. The rates of allowances are being increased as follows:—

Allowance of 15/6d. a month for the second qualified child in excess of 26/6d. a month for each subsequent child increased to 40p.

OCCUPATIONAL INJURIES INSURANCE - DEATH BENEFIT

The qualifying age for children undergoing full-time day education who receive orphan's pension or who are paid for as child dependants is being raised from 15 to 21 years as from 1st August, 1969. A claim should be made to the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare (S.I. 11) Area Office, Dublin 1, in respect of any orphan or child to whom this extension applies if a claim was not previously made for him or her.

CHEAP FUEL SCHEME

Under this scheme, which is operated by Local Authorities with Government assistance, regular supplies of fuel are made available for necessary householders in certain cities and towns. Up to now the scheme has operated from November to March. In future it will operate from October to April, inclusive.

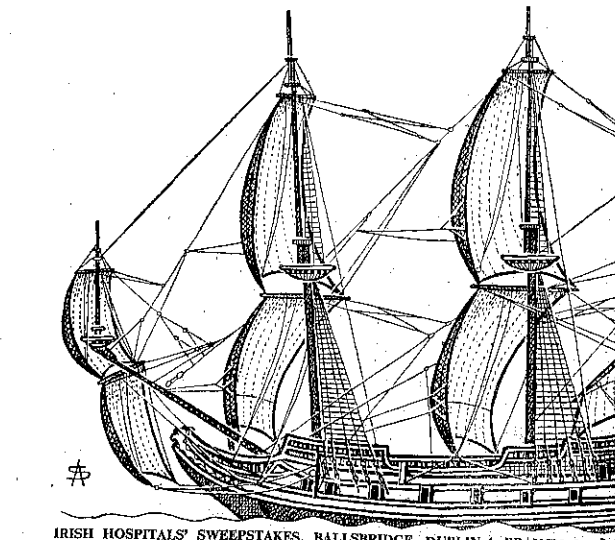
