TOUR OF IRELAND CYCLE RACE WAS BIG
ATTRACTION

MR. MAHER RE-ELECTED AS PRESIDENT

The President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher, has been re-elected unopposed to serve a further two-year term of office in the Presidency.

Mr. Maher was the unanimous nominee of County Executives in the Presidential election.

The election of Vice-Presidents for the three other regions is now under way. The Connaught candidates are Rev. Patrick Brady, C.C., Roscommon, (outgoing), and Mr. Jim Mullins, Wick, (incoming).

Any Branch Secretary in Connaught, Munster or South Leinster who is not in receipt of a ballot paper should write immediately to the Returning Officer, Mr. William Biffin, N.F.A. House.

To have a valid vote in this election a branch must be affiliated both to the County Executive and the National Executive and the instructions on the ballot paper must be complied with fully.

THE CHALLENGE OF A SECOND TERM

During his initial two-year term of office as President of the N.F.A., Mr. Maher has won nationwide acclaim for his balanced and successful leadership.

They have been a difficult two years. Difficult in the sense that more than once the pressing of the case for a better deal for Irish farmers brought the Association into conflict with the Government of the day and the enemies of the Association sought to read ulterior motives into decisions taken democratically by the good of farmers.

Mr. Maher's primary concern at all times is the interests of the farmers at large. If the facts of a meeting with the Taoiseach or the Minister for Agriculture will further this aim then he will act accordingly—the examines every side of a problem in a balanced, thoughtful manner and no one can read the mind of the ordinary farmer better. And no one has a more thorough knowledge of the problems of the dairy farmer.

Because Mr. Maher is a dairy farmer himself, milking 40 cows on his farm at Boherdun, Co. Tipperary. And he realises too the special problems of the small farmer as he was reared on a 30-acre farm himself.

In the chair of presidency, Mr. Maher has the authority that comes from knowing that he has been the unanimous choice of the rank-and-file. But when big decisions are being taken he will listen and assess, accepting the contrary view as well as the favourable one—knowing that through a full airing of all sides of an argument, the best decision is likely to be taken.

The job of President of the N.F.A. is tremendously exacting. The moments he gets on his farm, milking the cows or out on the fields are the moments he cherishes the best these days. But there is little relaxation. He is resigned now to the days spent in his office at N.F.A. Headquarters and so the continual travelling that attendance at meetings and functions during the country entails, especially during the winter months. Sometimes there can be a meeting or function every night of the week.

It calls for stamina and it calls for the sense of purpose and duty that only comes from knowing that he is serving the cause of his fellow-farmers.

Mr. Maher said that on pigs, grain and livestock, too, there were very urgent matters for discussion with the Minister. He asked Mr. Blaney to indicate dates and times suitable to him for meetings to discuss the current pressing problems.

Active steps are now being taken to organise turkey sales for next Christmas.

This effort is intended to remove the possibility of a collapse of the Christmas turkey market this year and to give producers a means to ensure a remunerative price.
