MR. MAHER'S IMPORTANT ADDRESS IN ENNIS

In his first major policy speech since his unanimous re-election as President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher spoke in Ennis about the problems created by the sharp changes taking place in rural Ireland today.

People, their economic and social well-being and the future of their families must be the overriding consideration in any approach to solving these problems, said Mr. Maher.

Mr. Maher was speaking to a paper on 'The Future of Irish Agriculture' delivered by Dr. Tom Walsh, Director of the Agricultural Institute at the 32nd Annual Rural Week of Muir na Tire, said that attitudes and policies that fitted the situation that obtained thirty years ago would not suffice today or in the decades ahead.

Ireland cannot stand aside from the mainstream of world events now sweeping the Continent. We will soon discover that the influence of these ideas will be felt here anyway.

Better, therefore, to analyse them fully now in light of the conditions obtaining here and not dismiss them even though they may seem unpalatable at first sight, said Mr. Maher.

No Government or farm organisation could choose to ignore the revolutionary ideas on farming structures advanced recently whether they agreed with them fully or not.

Mr. Maher went on to say that there was too great a tendency in this country to talk about a way of life in certain areas—the West in particular—as if it were sacred and that it was more important for the tourist to see a white-washed, thatched cottage than that a concerted effort be made to uplift the economic and social well-being of those who live in these houses.

"I believe that problems such as the special problems of Western-type areas must be tackled in terms of human values and not merely in terms of the preservation of a special life, which is a matter how successful it may appear to those who have not to live in unhabitable conditions or on a mere pittance.

"I do not say for one moment that the dweller on a small farm is not potentially viable or that the viable must be forced off the land against his will. What I do say, however, and say very clearly is that if a man believes that he can get a better livelihood for himself and his family and improve his way of living and social conditions in another walk of life, then every facility should be given to him to change, if he desires it. Farming in uneconomic conditions when there is no hope of ever breaking free of the chains that bind the small man in his surroundings in these days when urban dwellers are thinking in terms of a four-and-half or four-day working week and even longer holidays and still more time for leisure and recreation. I do not hold with conditions of slavery in this country in the seventies.

"We must be prepared to examine in a matured manner the philosophy of development here in relation to agriculture, particularly in the area of holdings patently un-economic and patently without hope of ever reaching a viable level, no matter what incentives of Government aid or incentives they receive. If voluntary re-training and transfer schemes result in a better way of life for these people and in the long-term bring a greater output from industries geared for export, then it will not only be for the betterment of the people concerned in the changing employment patterns but for the country itself. If we reject the philosophy because it appears politically inexpedient to discuss them we can be assured of continuing a system of hand-outs at the expense of a dynamic effort to uplift a community that sees other sectors moving forward every day to better standards of living.

"In conclusion, I believe that as people become better educated in the rural areas under the Government's free education policy, then they will be less and less prepared to accept a poorer standard of living and lack of proper time for recreation and leisure. The parents may be willing to live on in present conditions but their children certainly will not be.

Therefore, I do not hold with a static rural society, held down in un-economic circumstances against its will. People will pay a certain price to hold on to a traditional way of life, but they will not pay any price. There is a point beyond which we cannot expect

Cork Rail Study Group

Dungarvan is about to lose its variable rail link, according to official sources, as soon as engineering facilities are installed at Ballinacourty Magnesian Factory.

Yet, from Spring 1970, heavy rail traffic will run to within 24 miles of Dungarvan town, a case of 'to near, and yet so far'.

Before the closure of the Mal-low/Waterford line in 1967, Dungarvan business firms gave considerable support to the rail service.

Apart from the general merchandise, large quantities of fertilisers, cement, tar, and other bulk products were raised to Dungarvan.

Since the closure, this heavy traffic has been unloaded onto a waterford/Dungarvan road, while Dublin/Dungarvan merchandise is frequently relayed for days at Waterford railway awaiting freight delivery.

C.I.E. are opposed to re-opening the present Dungarvan Station on the grounds that to do so would involve staffing six level crossing gates as well as delaying rail traffic in Dungarvan by the passage of trains.

This difficulty could be overcome by building a small goods station at Abbeystead and dispensing with the line into the existing station.

The proposed new goods terminus would still be convenient to the town and could be utilised for passenger excursion trains when required.

The town level crossing gates between Abbeystead and Ballinacourty Junction (at the Coast Road and Clonon Road) could remain unstaffed and be opened and closed by the train crew.

It is hoped that Dungarvan business interests and local councillors will seek an immediate meeting with C.I.E. to save this short, but vital, rail link. If C.I.E. will agree to the re-opening, then the possibility should be explored of acquiring the line privately by local interests. Our group would be willing to assist in such a scheme.
