**PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight**

**DRINK PRICES TOO HIGH**  
At last Monday night's meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. J. Wade complained that some licensed premises in the town were overcharging in their prices. He instanced as proof of his claim that as much as 1/8d. was being charged for a bottle of mineral in certain licensed houses.  
Mr. A. Deasy spoke in support of the point made by Mr. Wade and said that during the past summer he had met several tourists, many of whom complained to him about the high prices they were charged. "Some of these visitors," said Mr. Deasy, "went so far as to say that they would never again spend their holidays here and I believe that we are beginning to price ourselves out of the tourist market."  
The Council Chairman, Mr. T. Kynce, felt that he had to agree with the speaker and said that he was facing serious times. One of the main reasons for the big increase in the price of drink was, he said, that there were no price controls now and if a publican wished he could charge 10/- for a bottle of beer. Mr. Kynce also said that he had heard that an English or American accent was sufficient reason for pushing up prices.  
There can be no doubt that the price of drink, from the humble man's pint to the exotic cocktails and liqueurs of the affluent, has shown a sharp rise during the past year. In the case of soft drinks especially there seems to be a big gap in prices charged from place to place. I have never heard of 1/8 being charged but complaints have been made to me that prices of 1/2 were being charged for small bottles of orange. At this price the margin of profit must exceed 100 per cent.  
I think that the prices for the ordinary pints and also for soft drinks as they generally stand at present are excessive. What can be done to reduce them? Well, I suppose one thing is competition in general the solution is a matter for the people themselves.  
It only stands to reason that as long as high prices are accepted and paid they will continue to be charged.

**DUNGARVAN STILL HAS BIG LITTER PROBLEM**  
REPORT OF TIDY TOWNS JUDGES

Drastic measures will be necessary to solve the considerable litter problem which Dungarvan still has. This was one of the main conclusions in the report of the Judges on the condition of the town for the 1969 Tidy Towns Competition which was read at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night. The report showed that the town received a total of 83 (out of a possible 150) marks which was 3 less than last year. The report was noted and accepted by the Council as fair comment on the condition of the town.  
In the general markings, the totals awarded judges awarded 23 out of 35 for the Waterford approach. Some defects noted were: for general cleanliness, tidiness and absence of litter, 16 out of 35, a drop of 2 over last year. In each of five other markings, the totals awarded were the same as last year but there was a drop of one mark (from 5 to 4 out of a possible 10) in each of the markings for the standard of fences, paved and grassed areas and for the absence of unsightly objects.  
The following is a copy of the Adjudicator's remarks:—  
"The young trees planted on the left hand side, coming into Dungarvan from the Tramore direction, were noted. The town name sign here is rusted and requires replacing. The green verges where the young trees were planted were neglected and required cutting. On the right hand side, some of the presented properties with private gardens and lawns. While there was some litter on the pavements in this area it was not in any great quantity.  
"When one came to the 30 mph speed limit sign, however, on the left there was an untidy verge containing a lot of litter and weeds. There was also litter in the gutters of the roadway on the right hand side. A number of well kept private houses and gardens were noted. Quite a few of these were advertising holiday accommodation. The approach road referred to is from Mirrabally, and connects Tramore with Dungarvan by the coast road.

**SQUARE GAVE FAVOURABLE IMPRESSION**  
The report then went on to state: "Coming up towards the bridge here, one noticed the gutters badly choked with litter. The approach road in the Tramore area is reasonably well presented. The facades of most buildings are colourful and the overall impression of the square is favourable. While there was some litter about, it was not in the same quantities as that noted on the Tramore and Waterford approaches.  
"Swinging sharp right towards Cappoquin, one moves down O'Connell Street. Again, one notes litter along the gutters and on the pavements. It was noted that most property here was well presented. However, in a number of cases, the upper portion of faces of buildings were neglected while the lower portions were decorated.  
"Further on, near terraced houses on the left, one noticed masses of litter in the gutters despite the presence of litter baskets. This is one of the vicinity of the Ormond Cinema. The amount of litter is in alarming proportions on the way out here towards Cappoquin. Further out, one noticed some terraced cottages on both sides. Some more colour in this area would be an improvement. Again, litter and weed growth was noted on both sides of the

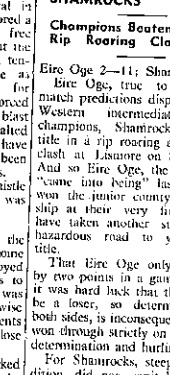

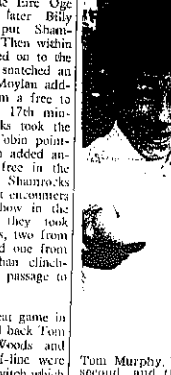
