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COUNTY COUNCIL TO DISPOSE OF TRAMORE RESERVOIR SITE FOR FACTORY

All Interested Parties Should Be Given Chance Of Bidding

This could be an opportunity for an industrial breakthrough in Tramore and any delay in the matter might cause difficulty said Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Friday during a discussion on proposals by the Council to dispose of the site of the old reservoir in Tramore.

Mr. E. J. O'Leary, Acting County Secretary, said that recently the Council had been approached to sell the site for the erection of a factory which would manufacture central heating boilers and member employment in the area of 7 or 8 men initially apart from the clerical staff which would be required. The name of the firm interested was Truro Ltd. Since then they had inquired for the purchase of the site for the erection of a plastic industry and also from a local farmer.

Mr. W. Kenneally, T.D., said that the site had been applied for by Truro Ltd. who had submitted proposals of their plans to the Council. "I am sure," said Mr. Kenneally, that the aim of every person here is that if we can create industry and promote employment in any centre we should do it."

Mr. Kenneally went on to express the view that in his opinion the second application for the site came from a speculator who wanted to get it to sell to the owner of the firm interested in it. He thought it was very dubious that a second plastics concern would be established in Tramore where there had a big I.C.I. plant in Waterford city. Mr. Kenneally went on to say that he did not know who the farmer who applied for the site was but he did not think the site was one which would be of any use for farming purposes.

He then proposed that the Council dispose of the site to Truro Ltd. who were prepared to erect a factory there and provide employment. Mr. M. J. Shalloo agreed with Mr. Kenneally but said in regard to the provision of industry in Tramore. They were all in favour of the site being sold to the farmer concerned who might want to erect sites at the site and the other interested in plastics all interested, should be given an opportunity of bidding for it.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor, Co. Manager said that this site had been there a long time and the Council had received no offers for it. Mr. Michael Morrissey, Solicitor, Tramore, had written recently asking the Council to make the site available. A discussion had followed and Mr. Kenneally, T.D., entered the matter at that stage to ask him to see the people concerned with a view to speeding up negotiations.

Mr. O'Connor said that he agreed to do this and met Mr. Morrissey and it was then he heard about the plastics as he knew nothing about it up to that. He did know, however, that Truro Ltd. were most anxious to negotiate for the purchase of the site.

Mr. Curran, Chairman, said that he knew that Truro Ltd. was backed by local men who were prepared to put their money into starting an industry. Mr. P. Coffey — But still we should not suffice anyone!

Co. Manager—Mr. O'Brien and Mr. Jackson of Truro were the only people I met. Mr. Kenneally—The other man is only a speculator who wants to get the site so that he can go back and squeeze the others.

Finally on the proposal of Mr. Kenneally, seconded by Mr. Shalloo, the Council agreed to approve the sale of the site of the old waterworks at Tramore to Truro Ltd. subject to satisfactory terms to be negotiated by the Co. Manager and a further report to the Council on the outcome of correspondence with any other interested parties.

SEARCH ON FOR UNLICENSED T.V. OWNERS Following recent press and T.V. publicity aimed at holders of unlicensed radio and television sets an intensive drive against licence pirates commenced today. Over 250 inspectors are engaged on this work. House to house inspections are being carried out in all rural and urban areas where it is thought that unlicensed radio and television sets are in use.

A combined licence must be taken out annually for a television set (covering radio and T.V.), and a radio licence for a radio set only. A combined licence covers all television and radio sets, including transistor sets, in a household.

"Cashing In" On Votes Of Sympathy

ONLY A MATTER OF COURTESY SAYS COUNCIL CHAIRMAN

The matter of the passing of resolutions of sympathy at meetings of Waterford County Council which has been the source of more than one discussion at Council meetings in the past was given another airing at the Council's monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Friday. By 10 votes to 7 the Council decided to arrange no change in the existing arrangements.

It was on a motion in the name of Mr. A. Deasy that the matter came before the last meeting. The motion asked that "resolutions of sympathy which are passed by this Council be sent to relatives as well as members of the Council and that no member's name be included in such resolutions."

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, said that it was his own personal view that there was nothing wrong in including the names of the proposer and seconder of a resolution. He pointed out that the names were included in the minutes of meetings and that they were mentioned in newspaper reports.

Mr. Deasy moving the motion said that he did not agree with the Chairman. He had already expressed his own views on the subject and he still stood by them. He felt that resolutions of sympathy should go out from the Council as a whole and not from any particular member.

Mr. K. O'Ryan seconded the motion. Mr. P. Coffey said that he would have to agree with what the Chairman had said as members only proposed such resolutions and it was purely a matter of courtesy for the local representative to be mentioned.

Mr. Deasy—The resolution will still go out but with no names attached. Mr. W. R. Dowd said that if there were members of the Council trying to get "kudos" from such things they would still continue to cash in on them no matter what. Personally he thought it would be better if these resolutions went out just from the Council without any names.

The Chairman said that he wanted to discount the idea that no one member of the Council was casting his vote. It was just a matter of courtesy and there should be no discussion. He said that death of a very delicate subject and one which should not be discussed. He felt that this was a very small issue to bring before the Council.

Mr. Deasy disagreed and said that he might be wrong but he had reason to suspect that at times the motives of members proposing such resolutions were to cash in on the votes of sympathy.

Finally a vote was taken and the motion was carried by 10 votes to 7. The Council decided to arrange no change in the existing arrangements.

On the motion of Mr. Dowd, seconded by Mr. A. Deasy, the Council agreed to adopt a report from the County Engineer, concerning the demolition of derelict sites at Church Lane, Lismore, at a cost not exceeding £200.

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SOCCER CLUB'S BID FOR DUNGARVAN DUMP SITE

A letter from Dungarvan Soccer Club was read at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council making a bid for 10 acres at the dump at Shandon which the club proposed to develop into a playing pitch.

Mr. J. Robinson, Town Clerk, pointed out that some time ago it was suggested that when the new dump was opened and the old dump was reclaimed the latter would be used as a site for industrial purposes. He thought that the Council should be slow to make any decision until this position was cleared up.

The Chairman said that he thought it would be a good policy for the Council to hold the site until they saw what way things were going. Mr. P. Whelan said that the Soccer Club would not be left very long before the site they had at present. They were all doing a lot for the young lads in the town and he thought they should be given the opportunity to develop the dump site for their own use and he thought their application should be favourably considered.

The Chairman said that he could not see any club at the moment who were prepared to take on the site. Mr. C. O'Connor, County Manager, said that the Council should be slow to give the site to the Soccer Club on the basis that it would be used for industrial purposes and develop it for that purpose.

Mr. A. Deasy said that the club's application should be favourably considered. The question of the area of the dump site was then raised and the Manager said that he would make a report on this.

Mr. Whelan—The club's application should be considered? Mr. K. Deasy—Yes, the County Manager will consider it in his report.

N.B.A. TO BE ASKED FOR DETAILS OF DUNGARVAN SCHEME COSTS

The National Building Agency which is at present building a scheme of 28 houses at Young Road, Dungarvan, are to be asked by Dungarvan Urban Council for a breakdown of the costs of the houses which are to be sold to the 28 selected applicants for £3,160 each. This was decided at a meeting of the Council last Monday night when some members pointed out that although the Council had sold the site for the houses at a cheap rate to the N.B.A. there were rumours current that the purchasers were not getting the benefit of this cheap rate.

Mr. J. P. Robinson, Town Clerk, said that in order to facilitate the purchasers who would be obtaining loans and grants from the Council, it would be necessary to raise £275,000 to cover the loans and £24,000 to provide the grants. The former would not affect the rates as they would be repaid by the purchasers but the grants would cost £1,100 a year for a 10-year period. Mr. Robinson said that the Council would be asked to provide the necessary loan to purchase the site.

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, expressed the appreciation of the Council to the Provincial Bank for their action in making an excellent site available for the new Library.

MOBILE LIBRARY On the proposal of Mr. H. R. Dowd, seconded by Mr. M. Shalloo, the Council agreed to a suggestion by the County Librarian that a Mobile Library van be provided and authorised the provision of the necessary loan to purchase it.

COUNCIL TO CONTRIBUTE TO TRAMORE FESTIVAL On the proposal of Mr. M. J. Shalloo, seconded by Mr. T. Whelan, Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Friday unanimously agreed to make a contribution of £50 to the Tramore Festival committee under Section 75 of the Local Government Act 1946.

Proposing that the contribution be made, Mr. Shalloo said that the Committee ran a 7-day festival in the town which cost between £1,500 and £1,600 and it attracted a big number of people to the area. The idea of the festival was to extend the tourist season. This year the Committee found themselves financially down a good bit. Next year they intended to change the date to June 30 as to start the season earlier.

Mr. J. D. Hally, County Engineer, said that between 160 and 180 cars were continually parked in the Square and these were taking up the space which should be available for vehicles passing through the town. He proposed that an area of Scullan's Yard be bought and developed as a car park and he believed that a grant would be forthcoming for such a project. He also believed that the County Council and the County Engineer should provide car parks for their own staffs.

Mr. A. Deasy also stressed the need for a car park in Dungarvan and said he was glad that the Engineer felt the same way. He referred to the parking of cars outside the offices at Anns Brughis and said that it was wrong that these should be allowed park right up in the footpaths. As a result, the footpaths were cluttered up and he had received complaints that because of this, people had to walk out on the roadway when passing there.

It is time for the Council to do something practical and provide car parks for the Council staff," said Mr. Deasy "and then we can ask the business people of the town to do the same."

Mr. Hally said that the Council had in fact already provided a car park for the staff.

Finally the Council agreed that the Department be informed of the urgent need there was for a car park in Dungarvan and that details of a recent traffic survey carried out in the town be submitted with the information.

ROADSIDE BEET CLAMPS A SERIOUS HAZARD Could Be Cause Of Accidents Concern about the clamping of beet prior to haulage along a roadside was voiced by Mr. G. Heskin at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Friday.

Mr. Heskin said that this was a most serious matter and one of the biggest hazards came from the beet itself while the muddy condition of the road which usually followed was another hazard. These could be the cause of several accidents and the matter was one which would have to be tackled at national and local levels. The introduction of built grain carrying would call for a concrete platform and something would have to be done in the near future to tackle these problems.

SITE CRUX FOR NEW DUNGARVAN LIBRARY SETTLED

Members of Waterford County Council were informed at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Friday that the problem of the site for the proposed new branch library in Dungarvan had finally been settled.

Mr. F. J. O'Leary, Acting Secretary, stated that the County Libraries Committee at their last meeting had passed a resolution accepting with gratitude the site offered for the library by the Provincial Bank.

Mr. O'Leary added that the matter was now in the hands of the Council's Solicitor to draw up the necessary documents. (It will be recalled that the Libraries Committee originally rejected this site as unsuitable and sought the Shambles site owned by the Urban Council which has now been sold to the Department of Posts and Telegraphs for a new Post Office.)

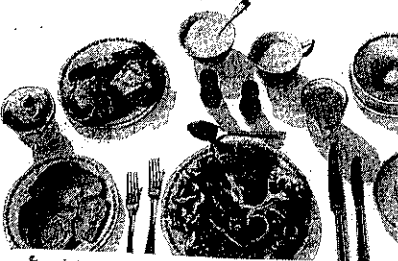

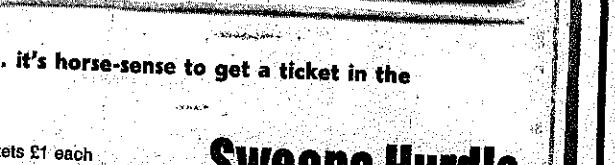
