PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

THE COST OF FISHERY PROTECTION
 A couple of months ago the deprivations and spoilation by foreign fishing fleets of Irish territorial waters were spotlighted in a national level by Mr. Austin Deasy who raised the matter at a meeting of Waterford County Council. The points made by Mr. Deasy were given widespread coverage in the national papers and since then announcements have been made in regard to the Government's attitude to the position.

Of the three corvettes used by the Irish Navy, two are at present out of commission and the third is in such a condition as to be completely unreliable to undertake any tasks calling for fast action. Mr. Deasy called attention to the movements of continental fishing fleets in the month of September and at the time I joined him in observing more than a dozen of these large, fast, well-equipped vessels off the coast of Ballyvaughan. The cost of these vessels is in the region of £100,000 to £150,000. The L. E. M. vessels are still proceeding and thus in some positive results will be forthcoming.

However, while this is being done the foreign trawlers are still playing their cat and mouse game and nothing is being done. The Ardmore Correspondent of the Leader reported that during the previous week numerous continental trawlers were operating in our inshore fishing grounds within 2 miles of Mine Head Lighthouse and there was no sign of the fishery protection vessel.

Undoubtedly the shippers of these trawlers know only too well the weakness of our position and are quick to take advantage of it. The major problem in replacing the old corvettes is the high cost but if we are to provide adequate protection for the fisheries which stretch around our 1,900 miles of coastline we must be prepared to foot the bill for three or four fast, adequately armed vessels. The question is not whether we can afford to purchase these vessels but rather whether we can afford not to buy them and see our valuable fishing grounds robbed and destroyed by the invaders.

THE DUNGARVAN QUAY

At the moment only one berth is available and the Harbour Board will not allow a second vessel to come alongside due to the dangerous condition of most of the quay.

WICKLOW TAKE BOTH POINTS
WATERFORD DISAPPOINT IN POOR FOOTBALL LEAGUE CLASH

Wicklow hammered Waterford to take both points from their poorly attended National Football League first round clash at the Fisher Field, Dunganran, on Sunday last.

Waterford's failure to produce their best form contributed much to making this a drab and lifeless clash, while a high wind interfered tremendously with the play and as a result the game fell short as a football spectacle.

On the day the winners were by far the better side but a forward division, which saw plenty of the ball failed to capitalise on a sizeable Waterford defence and a fantastic number of scoring chances went begging.

ATROCIOUS SHOOTING
They had at least ten wides when playing with the wind in the first half and for some atrocious shooting, could have trebled their final tally.

Showing more speed, determination and skill they went into attack from the throw-in and were on to all up after fifteen minutes. They had increased this total to 1-7 by the interval, their goal which could have been averted coming in the 22nd minute when the Waterford defence caught flat-footed, allowed John McDonald plenty of scope to crash a shot past the helpless Waterford keeper.

A struggling Waterford side could only raise two white flags in answer to Wicklow's first half tally but they showed some improvement early in the second half and had reduced the lead to two points (1-7 to 0-5) by the eighth minute.

Wicklow never really allowed the home side to get a solid grip on the game after this and when Waterford did score the winners were quick to reanimate with similar scores, so that both sides had an equal share of six points scored between the 11th minute and the final whistle.

Wicklow were well served in defence by Keeper Pat Cronin, Kenny Norton, Ken Browne, Liam Loughlin and John Doyle. Brian Garty and Ken Mellis played well for the hour at midfield, while Michael O'Toole, Michael Coffey, Sean Murray and John McDonald all impressed in attack.

Fishery Conservators Seek Sworn Inquiry Into Blackwater Fish Deaths

GOVERNMENT COMPLACENCY ON POLLUTION PROBLEMS

The recent heavy mortality of fish life in the river Blackwater between Mallow and Fermoy was the main business of the new incoming Board of Conservators for the Lisnaree No. 4 District at their October meeting held in Fermoy under the Chairmanship of Mr. James H. I. Villiers Stuart.

Dr. A. E. J. Went, Chief Scientific Adviser to the Fisheries Division of the Department of Agriculture, attended the meeting.

Before the meeting was the Inspector's report and the results of analysis of water samples taken from the river by the Inspector, Mr. H. D. Thornton. It is stated, however, was not able to make any observations on the results of the analysis in time for the meeting.

The Inspector reported that on October 6th fish were found dead one mile downstream from Mallow Bridge. He collected two salmon, one brown trout and one perch and sent them to the Department for post mortem examination.

On the afternoon of the 6th the Inspector found evidence which suggested that the fish may have died as a result of pure cement getting into the river at Mallow Bridge. The level of the water at this time was as low as at any time for many years.

On the afternoon of the 7th a further small outbreak of mortality occurred upstream of Mallow Bridge. This second mortality could not have been caused by cement which apparently entered the river at Mallow Bridge.

On the 8th October no mortality was evident. During the night heavy rain fell and on the morning of Thursday the 9th the river had started to rise and was five to seven

however a heavy sustained flood after two or three days of continuous rain had taken place the effects of the pollution would in all probability not have been so severe.

The Board's findings after prolonged discussion the Board took the view that the disastrous mortality of fish life was caused by...

(1) The opening of the Beet Campaign on 1st October when the river was in too low state to receive the heavy demand made on its available oxygen supply by the effluent from the Beet Factory.

(2) A small but significant demand on the available oxygen by the effluent from Ballycogh Creamery.

(3) A heavy demand on the oxygen supply by crude untreated raw sewage allowed to enter the river by Mallow Urban Council.
