





G.A.A. Is As Gaelic As It Is Athletic

REFERENCE TO CHANGING TIMES AT ANNUAL COUNTY CONVENTION

Over 220 delegates attended the Annual G.A.A. County Convention held at the C.B.S. Hall, Dungarvan, last Sunday and they heard the Chairman, Mr. P. Fanning say in his Convention address that while these were times of change the G.A.A. continued to be as Gaelic as it was athletic.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The report of the auditor showed that income for the year amounted to £8,149 as compared with £5,944 in the previous year or an increase of £2,205. Expenditure amounted to £7,687 as compared with £6,847 and showed a surplus of £462 for the year as compared with a deficit of £103 in 1968.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

In the course of his report to the Convention, the Secretary, Mr. D. Goode, stated: "The Association throughout the County is in a strong position and our present Cumann members have proved in no uncertain manner that they are dedicated and aware of things which help to maintain our national identity."

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

A feature of the Convention was the re-election of all the outgoing officers without opposition as follows: Chairman—Mr. P. Fanning (St. John's); Secretary—Mr. D. Goode (Dungarvan); Treasurer—Mr. P. Connolly (St. John's).

POSITION OF HANDBALL

Referring to the position of handball he commented: "During the year your Board decided to have a special meeting re the formation of a handball County Board. The G.A.A. has a responsibility towards handball in the county and were prepared to give unqualified support to any movement to revive and strengthen the game in the county."

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

In the course of a lengthy address, Mr. Fanning urged the G.A.A. people of the Decies to a fresh awareness of the unchanging purpose of the Association in times that were constantly changing, times that demanded fresh thinking, imaginative planning and an even greater measure of commitment.

CLUB CREDIT SCHEME

In regard to the above scheme he said: "Arising out of the decision to go ahead with this Scheme, it has been recommended that a Co. Board should act as a servicing agency for all those clubs who wish to avail of this Scheme."

DUNGARVAN QUAY WALL PROBLEM Council to Repair One Berth

At the January monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson submitted a further report setting out the present position in regard to the quay wall. The report stated: "This matter was considered by the Council at a meeting held on 11th November, 1969. It was agreed at that time to write to the Department of Transport & Power and also to the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation requesting that a grant be made available for the repair of the quay wall."

NEW HOUSES FOR OLD PEOPLE IN DUNGARVAN Substantial Loss Will Be Borne By Rates

Wade at a previous meeting that they were not doing enough for the old people and that rents charged to the tenants of the new scheme at St. Martin's Terrace were too high, the following report was submitted to last week's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council by the Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson.

LOSS ON RATES

The figures referred to in the foregoing report were then given as follows: All-in cost per house, £2,000; Total outgoings (loan charges £172; administration, insurance etc. £30) £202; Less rent per house £14 per annum; total loss per house per annum £188.

CAPPOQUIN SCHOOL PROBLEM STILL UNRESOLVED Further Discussions At V.E.C. Meeting

The sale last year of the lines Vocational School in Cappoquin to the Sisters of Mercy in the town for a post-primary education centre which was the centre of widespread controversy at the time, was again the main topic of discussion at last week's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee in Dungarvan.

INSUFFICIENT INFORMATION

Messrs. A. Carroll & Co., Solicitors, Fermoy, acting on behalf of the Sisters of Mercy, wrote to the Committee stating that they were unable to furnish the information requested in respect of the school, but to get it they would have to rescind it.

COMPLAINT BY PARENTS

Further protest in connection with the school came up when a complaint was made by a number of parents from the Cappoquin area that they were being pressed into sending their children to the school.

RIGHT NOT SATISFACTORY

Mr. P. Kennedy said the children in effect were being sent to a change course in the school and that was not satisfactory from the pupils' point of view.

A quarter is, of course, half of a half. Divide 5 by 2 and we find it. The answer is .25. Remember the point and the fact that you can add ciphers after any decimal. For instance .5 or 10/- can be written as .50 as will be in our new money system — meaning fifty pence. Three quarters or 15/- can be written .75 — a quarter — by then, i.e., .25. Thus £1.55 will be written £1.25 £1.10 will be written £1.80 and £1.15. £1.75 the .25 .50 and .75 in each case standing respectively for 25, 50 and 75 new pence. E.
