PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

THE COUNTY RATE

In one of the shortest annual estimates meetings held in recent years, Waterford County Council struck the County rate for the coming year within a few hours at Dungarvan last Friday. While it can be said that the members did a good job it cannot be denied that an increase of almost 7% in the rate goes on to the rate to bring the overall figure for the coming year to 86/11 in the £.

Following appeals from members of the N.F.A. deputation to keep whatever increase would have to be approved to the barest minimum, Mr. N. Walsh struck the nail on the head when he said that while the present rating system existed there was no hope of even stabilising, much less of bringing down the rates.

He was referring to the position whereby health services and main road maintenance remained a big charge on the rates accounting more or less for half of the total figure.

The Chairman of the N.F.A. County Executive who led the deputation called the special health services grant which was designed and made available by the Minister for Health to Health Authorities in order to keep the increase for health services in this year's rate within 2% of last year's figure, "only chicken feed" and somewhat I feel that I am in agreement with him on this. This attitude of the Minister is a pity thing and cannot be accepted as a long term solution to a problem which has been causing headaches for local ratepayers for many years.

In regard to the upkeep of the main roads of the County, another member of the deputation was perfectly correct when he pointed out that since the railway line was closed, the wear and tear on these roads by heavy traffic is something which the local ratepayer should not be asked to finance.

The Council have been asking for a special rate to be levied on the Department of Local Government since the closure took place but so far without any success. Their latest communication to the Council on the matter states that the application is still being examined and that when it has been fully considered the Council will be informed of their decision. This is just a "live horse and you'll get grain" tactic and means nothing in terms of hard cash.

In the meantime the ratepayers have to foot the bill for a decision that was taken at Government level or at least at national level if it must be said that it was the Board of Coras Iompair Eireann that decided to shut down the railway.

It is indeed little consolation for the ratepayers year after year to see their annual rate demands mounting rapidly and it is as tough on the Urban ratepayers if not more so than on their rural brothers.

A STOP-GO CRISIS

The country has been having a stop-go crisis for the past twelve months but signs now indicate that the position is likely to come to a head soon. The red light has been flashed on a number of occasions by economists and financiers but the Government, as political demands dictated, fluctuated between the red and the green. First we were told that there was an economic crisis looming and then within weeks, the Minister for Finance came out publicly and as much as said that someone was joking as there was absolutely no crisis.

This on-and-off position has been operating for several months now, with first one telling us that we are on the brink of economic disaster, another stating that we are in an orgy of self-destruction and that we are pursuing a policy which will bring us all to our knees. This is the "on" position. Then in order to suit political temperatures government spokesmen have come along and said that the economic growth was expanding as planned and that there was no need for undue worry. This was the "off" position.

Last Friday, Mr. Donald S. Carrill, the Governor of the Bank of Ireland in his farewell speech to the General Court of Proprietors had this to say: "We have heard

the cry of 'wolf' too often to recognise him when he is prowling in the garden. Whether he is at the door or at the gate may be open to some argument, but certainly he is in the immediate vicinity." He described the rate of inflation as reaching "intolerable proportions" and summed up the whole situation by saying that "the nub of the problem is that there is a fundamental imbalance between the real value of output produced by the community and the standard of living it attempts to enjoy."

This simply means that we are living beyond our means and beyond the economy of the country can afford. Yet we find the intelligentsia of the community more vociferous in their demands for higher salaries and better conditions than even the ordinary worker.

This was referred to by the Taoiseach in Cork last Saturday when he said that the tendency is for different sectors to pull against one another with the result that the national potential is frustrated. He said that a firm essential to realise the full potential of all our resources was a healthy co-operation and a true harmony between all sections of the community—between the urban and rural community, between employer and worker, between worker and worker, between Trade Union and Trade Union.

The Taoiseach also referred to what he called an alarming situation on the industrial relations front when he stated: "I think the dangers here are clearly apparent and I think that the warnings which the Government have given have brought home the seriousness of the threat which is represented by the bitter management/labour disputes and by the sharp inflation which must follow upon rises in wages and prices which go beyond the level which our economy can bear." If this situation has been alarming in the past, it is not going too far to say that its continuation in the future, when every sector of industry will be exposed to the eventual full blast of foreign competition, will be suicidal.

These statements of both the Governor of the Bank of Ireland and the Taoiseach fairly sum up the position but I think it is now time for the Government to put an end to its cat-and-mouse policy and to come to grips with the problem in a firm way.

THEFTS AND BURGLARIES

I note that during the week the Mayor of Galway appealed for extra Gardaí in Galway to curb an outbreak of burglaries and thefts in the city. His appeal follows the stealing of jewellery and other goods from shops, private houses and cars since December.

A similar appeal could be made as far as Dungarvan is concerned for we have been experiencing one of the worst crime outbreaks in the town and district possibly on record. Safes have been removed from premises and found later ripped open; cars have been stolen; premises have been entered and considerable quantities of goods stolen and plate glass windows have been broken in smash and grab raids. The latest incident occurred last week-end when thieves broke into the local Technical School and broke open filing cabinets and damaged blackboards.

The Gardaí believe that the entire series of raids and robberies are being carried out by a particular gang of youths and young men in the town but so far they have failed to obtain sufficient evidence to ensure a conviction.

N.F.A. DEPUTATION WARNS "BUBBLE MUST BURST SOON"

The Annual Estimates meeting of Waterford County Council was held in Dungarvan last Friday and after a comparatively short meeting, certainly the shortest meeting of its kind in years, the Council unanimously agreed to strike a rate of 86/11 in the £ for the coming year. This is an increase of 6/11 in last year's figure but a reduction of 2/6 in the rate submitted by the County Manager. A deputation from the N.F.A. County Executive appealed to the Council to keep the rate at the lowest possible figure.

In his report to the meeting the County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor stated that the estimates provided for a total expenditure from revenue of £2,118,257 which represented an increase of £283,170 on the amount provided last year. The amount to be levied off the county would be £1,270,293.

The report went on to state: "An increase of 5/2.46d. in the Pound would have been required to meet the Statutory Demands received from the Waterford Health Authority in respect of Health and Mental Health Services, but such increase can now be reduced by 3/6.68d. in the Pound by reason of a Special Health Grant which is being made available by the Minister for Health. The proposed expenditure in the Estimate, as circulated, would have required a rate of 92/11.66d. in the Pound; however, by reason of the Special Health Grant, the total rate in the Pound now required is 89/4.98d. and the increase in the general county rate over 1969/70 is thus 94.98d. instead of 12/11.66d. as shown in the Estimate. The Special Health Grants, which amounts to £31,300 will result in the rate for Health Services being amended to 34/6.6d. or an increase of 1/7.78d. over that for the current year."

In addition, Separate Charges in respect of Malicious Injuries will involve the expenditure of a sum of £939 and will require the raising of a rate of 78 pence in the pound. The Demands of Lismore and Tramore Town Commissioners will require levies of 3/11.15d. and 2/3.11d. in the £ respectively to meet the cost of services administered by the Town Commissioners, these figures representing increases of 1.18 pence and 1.08 pence respectively.

N.F.A. DEPUTATION

Mr. K. O'Riyan introduced the N.F.A. deputation which consisted of Mr. John Molloy, Chairman, Mr. E. Cheasty and Mr. M. Kely. Mr. O'Riyan pointed out that this was the most important meeting of the Council each year. They would be trying to strike a rate at the meeting but in fact they were doing so at most meetings over the past year by passing supplementary estimates which were mainly concerned with increased salaries and wages.

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, said that it was the policy of the Council to strike the lowest possible rate and they had always cut their estimates to the bone.

Mr. Molloy then addressed the meeting and he said that their main complaint was that the Health Charges and the Main Roads were becoming an unbearable burden on the rates. The few shillings which the Minister had now given off was only "chicken feed" and they felt that something more drastic would

ing for more and better services which proved very expensive. "At the end of the year then," he said "we cannot be expected to work a miracle."

Mr. N. Walsh also welcomed the deputation and said that he admired them. They were very reasonable in their suggestions. However, he said that he would like to see representatives of the Urban ratepayers with them as these were the people who feel the pinch more. "They should be here to join their protests with yours," he told the deputation.

Mr. Walsh went on to say that while the present rating system existed there was no hope in the wide world of even stabilising much less bringing down the rates. "We are an economy minded Council," he said, "but something drastic must be done by some Council which will go as far as saying 'no' even if it means being abolished. The future Health Boards will mean more increases as they will be more bureaucratic and the Councils will have no say. I thought the deputation would come out strongly and condemn that. The Editor of the *Dungarvan Leader* made that point recently and I admire him for it. Urban ratepayers and small shopkeepers will feel this worse than farmers and the problem we have before us today is how can we reduce this increase of 7/10.1d. What can we do?"

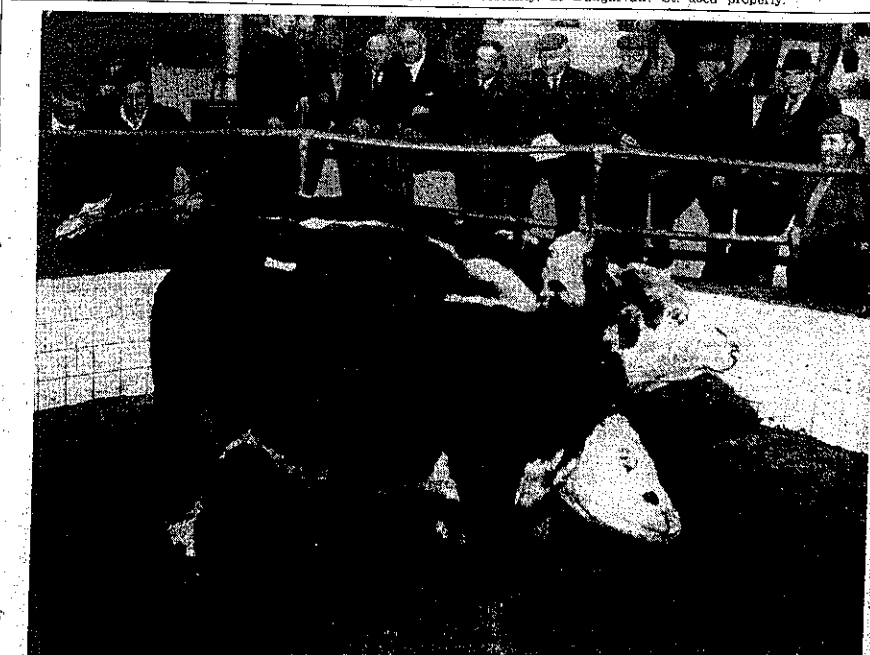
