## PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

### A SHOCKING INCREASE

Disarray and shock can be the only reactions of the ratepayers of Dungarvan when they read this week that a rate of 93/- in the £ was struck by the Urban Council at their estimates meeting last Monday night. The rate is an increase of 8/- over the current figure.

Since 1966/67 the rate has jumped from 61/10d. to 93/- an increase of 31/2d. in little more than 3 years.

### DROWNING FIGURES INCREASING

One of the most disturbing aspects of the Annual Report of the Irish Red Cross Society's Water Safety Section for 1969 just published is the statistics on drowning accidents over the past year.

### WHICH WILL IT BE?

There are two views of Ireland's natural resources: the first is: Ireland is . . . The last unspoiled outpost of Europe, a land happily preserved from the woes of air and water pollution; a land of clean uncrowded beaches, uncluttered landscapes, restful forests and remote wilderness areas for the tourist; a paradise of pure streams, rivers and lakes for the fisherman; a blessed refuge of woods, wetlands and bogs for wild bird and beast; a garden of unending delight for the botanist; an Alibi's cave of nature, wondrous awaiting the "Open Sesame" of the scientist; an asylum of peace and quiet far from the clamour of the world; a veritable Arcady of pastoral dignity and charm.

The second is: Ireland is . . . A recent but dedicated member of the "effluent society"; a land whose natural values and charms have been eroded by the ever-multiplying technological advances of modern civilization; its internationally important wetlands contaminated by herbicides and pesticides; its deer, its pronghorns and other wild life under attack from all sides—the very barn owls being exterminated by chlorinated hydrocarbons; its famous salmon and trout rivers stricken by an unidentified but fatal disease; its beaches fouled by oil and solid wastes; its inhabitants assailed by ever-growing noise and its cities pervaded by locally produced smog.

You think these two descriptions are inconsistent? Either may be fair comment today, but both cannot remain true. There is a choice which we must make; either resign ourselves to a steady deterioration in our natural heritage or resolve to face the costs, not alone in money terms but in effort and self-restraint, of maintaining our environment.

### A REAL FARCE

The fact that at best we have only one corvette in commission and at worst just nothing makes the whole business of sea fishery protection ridiculous and turns the entire Irish Naval Service into a farce.

The Government do not seem to be over-anxious to come to grips with the problem and when the matter was raised in the Dail last week the Minister for Defence, Mr. J. Gibbons, stated that while

### BINGEN ON THE RHINE

As promised last week I give here now, instead of our usual ballad, the words of the well-known poem "Bingen On The Rhine" which were requested by an Ardmore reader for a friend in England.

I am indebted to Mrs. K. Green-slade, Killeenagh, Knockmore and to Mrs. Margaret O'Mahony, Kilmore, Tallow, both of whom sent me on the poem. In a postscript, Mrs. O'Mahony informs me that the poem is by the Hon. Caroline North and that she read it in her school book over 50 years ago. She also states that the word Bingen is pronounced with a hard "g" as in "gone".

A soldier of the legion lay dying in Algiers. There was lack of woman's nursing, there was dearth of woman's tears. But a comrade stood beside him while his life blood ebbed away. And bent with pining glances to hear what he might say. The dying soldier faltered as he took his comrade's hand. And he said: "I ne'er shall see again my own dear native land. Take a message and a token to some distant friends of mine, I was born at Bingen, fair Bingen on the Rhine."

Tell my brothers and companions when they meet and crowd around. To hear my mournful story in the pleasant vineyard ground. That we fought the battle bravely and when the day was done. Many a comrade lay ghastly pale beneath the setting sun. And 'midst the dead and dying were some grown old in wars. The death wounds on their gallant breasts, the last of many scars.

But some were young and suddenly beheld life's swift decline. And one had come from Bingen, fair Bingen on the Rhine. Tell my mother that her other sons will comfort her old age. For I was e'er a truant bird that thought his home a cage. My father was a soldier and even as a child, My heart leaped forth to hear him tell of struggles fierce and wild. And when he died and left us, to divide his scanty hoard. I let them take whatever they wished but kept my father's sword. And with boyish love I hung it where the bright light used to shine. On the cottage wall at Bingen, fair Bingen on the Rhine.

Tell my sisters not to weep for me or sob with drooping head. When the troops are marching home again with glad and gallant tread. But to look upon them proudly with a calm and steadfast eye. For her brother was a soldier, and not afraid to die. And if a comrade seeks her love, I ask her in my name. To listen to him kindly without regret or shame. And to hang the old sword in its place, my father's sword and mine. For the honour of old Bingen, fair Bingen on the Rhine.

There was a little sweetheart in those merry days gone by. You'd have known her by the merriment that sparkled in her eye. Too innocent for coquetry, too fond for idle scolding. Oh friend I fear the lightest heart makes sometimes heaviest mourning. Tell her the last night of my life, for ere this moon be risen. My body will be out of pain, my soul be out of prison. I thought I stood beside her and saw the yellow sunlight shine. On the vine clad hills of Bingen, fair Bingen on the Rhine.

I saw the blue Rhine sweep along, I heard, or seemed to hear. The German songs we used to sing in chorus sweet and clear. And down the pleasant river and up the slanting hill. The echoing chorus sounded in the evening calm and still. And her glad blue eyes were on me as we passed in friendly talk. As it shone on distant Bingen, fair Bingen on the Rhine. ## SHOCK FOR DUNGARVAN RATEPAYERS

### Urban Council Adopts Rate Of 93/-

Dungarvan Urban Council at their Annual Estimates meeting held last Monday night struck a rate of 93/- in the £ for the coming year. This is an increase of 8/- in the current figure and is 7d. less than the figure submitted to the meeting by the County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor. The Council meeting commenced at 8.30 p.m. but it was 10.10 p.m. before the members reached the business of considering the estimates. One hour and twenty minutes later at 11.30 p.m. the resolution adopting the new rate was passed and the meeting concluded.

In his report to the meeting the County Manager stated that a rate of 93/7d. was required to meet the net estimated expenditure of £83,123 for the coming year made up of £41,500 to meet the demand from the County Council and £41,623 to cover the cost of Town Services. The expenditure shown an increase of £11,323 over last year, requiring an increased rate of 8/7d. (6d. to meet the increased County demand and 8/1d. for the increase on Urban services). The report pointed out that the total increase would have been 13/2d. but because the produce of increased valuation (new houses, etc.) brought in 4/7d., the increase came to 8/7d. in the £.

The report then went on to give details of the expenditure and stated that there was no change over last year in the amount (£3,775) to be spent on urban roads. The total cost of Sanitary Services (water, sewerage, scavenging, public lighting, etc.) at £29,246 showed an increase of £6,117 and the report stated that the increases here were mainly due to increases in salaries and wages and also to a sharp rise in the cost of electricity for pumping water.

### HOUSING SERVICES

The total cost of housing services at £54,925 showed an increase of £5,534 over last year and the Manager's report stated that the big increase under this heading was also mainly due to wage increases but was also affected by the fact that the housing repair fund had now been fully expended.

Approximately 1,700 of the present year's wages and materials were met from that fund, stated the report, "and these two factors combined have resulted in a very steep increase. However, I would point out that there are now 482 houses being rented by the Council, and the average amount per house shown in the estimates for maintenance is less than £12 per house."

The report also pointed out that there was a considerable increase in the loan charges for supplementary grants due to the necessity to raise a loan for the new housing scheme at Youghal Road.

### GENERAL PURPOSES

The General Purposes Account at £57,025 showed an increase of £5,662 and the report stated that salaries and retiring allowances were responsible for a considerable portion of this and pointed out in regard to the latter to the new Scheme of pensions under which Local Authorities were now required to pay pensions to the widows of retired officers and in accordance with which two widows of former Council officials would qualify.

Under this heading also the report stated in regard to a contribution of £175 to the Regional Tourism Board: "The Tourism

### Eventually having gone over the Manager's report the Council arrived at the stage where no one was able to make any suggested reductions.

Mr. Kyne, Chairman, said that the Council members had done a great job and were to be congratulated. He agreed that the increase was a considerable one but again said that if they were to continue to provide the best services the ratepayers would have to pay for them.

At this stage Mr. P. Whelan asked whether the Manager would be prepared to reduce the rate by the odd 7d. and accept a figure of 93/- in the £.

Mr. O'Connor, the County Manager said that he had kept the expenditure in the estimates to a minimum but he was prepared to cut the 7d. on the basis that the estimated income would increase sufficiently to enable him to do so without cutting any items of expenditure.

Mr. N. Kelly who said that the ratepayers were getting a very good service and that they had a great County Manager and excellent officials proposed that a rate of 93/- be adopted.

Mr. D. Goode stated that they had a duty as a Council to strike a rate seconded the proposal. He said that an increase of 8/- was needed to meet the demand before them.

The resolution was unanimously passed and the meeting adjourned at 11.30 p.m.
