





NEW OFFICES FOR A.T. & G.W.U. OPENED IN DUNGARVAN

PRESENTATIONS TO MR. T. KYNE TO MARK HIS RETIREMENT

The new offices of the Dungarvan Branch of the Amalgamated Transport & General Workers' Union at O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, were officially blessed and opened last Friday evening.

RESPONSE OF FARMING ORGANISATIONS TO PIGEON CONTROL SCHEME CRITICISED

MEMBERS OF COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE DECIDE TO GIVE LEAD

The poor response of the County Executives of the N.F.A. and of Macra Na Feirme to the proposed pigeon control scheme for the county came under criticism at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday.

At a previous meeting of the Committee it was decided that a meeting with representatives of the Gun Clubs, the N.F.A. and Macra Na Feirme should be held to discuss the financial backing for the scheme.

On Monday's meeting which was attended by Mr. P. Dwyer, Dungarvan, representing the Regional Game Council and Mr. Dan Casey representing landowners in the Ballymacorney area.

Mr. S. Whelan said that it was a very poor trial of the N.F.A. and Macra as it was these organisations which should be most concerned about the pigeon menace.

Mr. Dwyer then addressed the members and said that they had the Game Council and they were "only waiting" to get going on the scheme.

Mr. Whelan said that he was disappointed that the N.F.A. and Macra were not more forthcoming in their support of the scheme.

Mr. Dwyer went on to say that the Game Council had stated that the worst ask each of the Gun Clubs in the region to subscribe £5 each while the Committee of Agriculture had not done anything concrete yet.

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DUNGARVAN MAN GETS JAIL SENTENCE

Broke into E.S.B. Store

A young Dungarvan labourer who was stated to have thirteen previous convictions on his criminal record was sentenced to three months in jail by District Justice B. J. Carroll at Lismore Court when he was convicted on a charge of breaking and entering the E.S.B. lock-up store at Shandon (near the old Railway Station), Dungarvan, on the night of Monday, March 30.

The defendant, who pleaded guilty to the charge, Patrick Costigan, Cathal Brighu Place.

Supt. M. English, Dungarvan, prosecuting, said that on the night of March 30 a Garda and a Sergeant concealed themselves behind the store, which was located in an area where there were a number of crimes committed recently.

Mr. H. R. Dowd then proposed that the Committee put up a sum of £100 towards the scheme and this was seconded by Mr. Walsh.

More about decimals Knowing that 5 means a half, how do we find the decimal for a quarter and for three quarters? A quarter is, of course, half of a half. Divide 5 by 2 and we find it. The answer is .25. Remember the point and the fact that you can add ciphers after any decimal.

For instance .5 or 10/- can be written as .50. as it will be in our new money system — meaning fifty pence. Three quarters or 15/- can be got by multiplying .25 — a quarter — by three, i.e., .75. Thus £1.55 will be written £1.25 £1.10, will be written £1.50 and £1.15, £1.75 the .25 .50 and .75 in each case standing respectively for 25, 50 and 75 new pence.

ENTERTAINING, LIVELY REVUE BY DUNGARVAN CHORAL SOCIETY

The Dungarvan Musical and Choral Society, secured another success with their production of "Easter Cavalcade" which ended a most successful five nights run at the Friary Hall, Dungarvan, last Tuesday night.

This was a highly entertaining, lively, colourful revue which filled almost three hours of most pleasant enjoyment and drew crowded houses each night.

Full of wonderful choral items, it catered for the tastes of everyone with excerpts from opera, old music hall days and ever-green popular melodies.

These were well interspersed with fine solo performances and spiced with several very humorous interludes while the dancers added much to the movement and colour of the entire pot-pourri.

Perhaps the most dramatic scene was the "Windmill Time" sequence which opened the second half of the programme with the entire company on a darkened stage with the movements of the dancers traced by the reflectorised costumes while the turning sails of the windmills formed a realistic backdrop.

The surprise music item on the programme was the appearance of Michael (Duchie) O'Meara, Waterford, who gave a lovely selection on his vibraphone.

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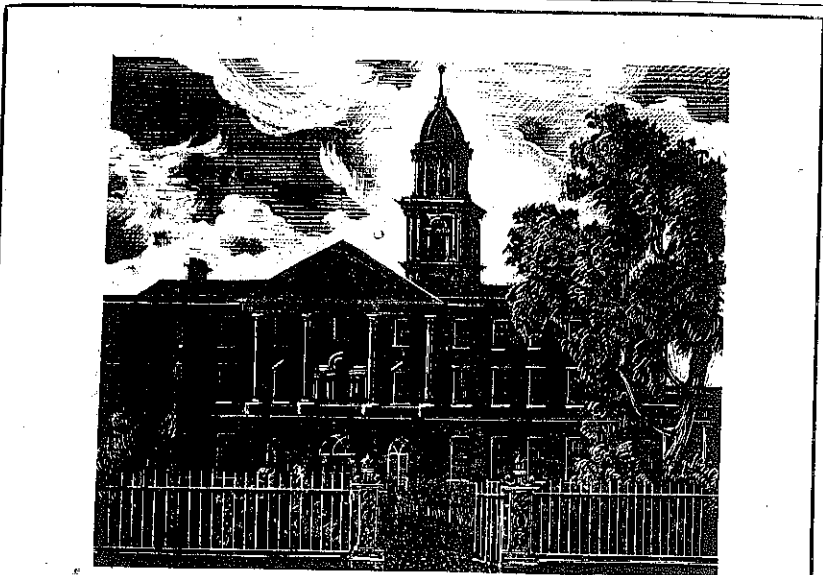

#### WHAT WILL THE BUDGET BRING FOR FARMERS?

Budget time is almost upon us once again and there is more than ordinary interest this year, because of the general inflationary tendencies in the economy.

The general feeling throughout the country is that it will be a stiff Budget, especially in view of the fact that all the services the Government provides cost far more than they were expected to cost.

The balance of Payments position arising from the difference between what the country spends on imports and what it earns in exports is causing concern with an estimated deficit of £60 million.
