TAX CONFUSION

During the past week the main topic of conversation has been the impact of the application of the increase brought in under the Budget and put in force since last Friday. I have heard more than one harassed housewife explain to the public the increase. To say the least of it, the increase has caused a great deal of confusion and people are not certain that it is being properly and fairly applied.

In an official notice just issued from Dublin Castle by the Revenue Commissioners on the tax, a paragraph on "passing on the tax" states as follows: "Accountable persons will recover their full liability for Turnover Tax at 5% by an addition of approximately 3% to the price exclusive of Turnover Tax. While the price of goods already includes Turnover Tax at the old rate of 2 1/2%, an addition of 2.63% to the price will cover the increased liability for Turnover Tax at the new rate."

The application of the tax in relation to food prices seems to be causing most confusion and from inquiries I have made, it appears that similar though slightly differing scales, are being applied in different shops and stores. For instance in one case the tax is applied from purchases of 8d. upwards, while in another the tax is not applied to items priced under 1/-. In another case the tax is generally increased by one penny over multiples of 1/8d. while yet again it is being worked on multiples of 1/-. I found a difference of 1d. in tax charged on 5/- between these two systems, while in the former the full 1/- goes on from 18/4 to 20/-, it is charged on purchases from 18/1 up on the latter system.

One of the big difficulties appears to be that stores which have absorbed the tax in advance, have now to pay the full 5% since last Friday, applied the full 5% under the new rate. Personally I believe that the public has a genuine grievance in this regard because it prices up to last Friday had been adjusted to cover the original 2 1/2%, then the increase should now only be to the order of 2 1/2% and not the full 5% as has happened in a big number of cases.

Another complaint which seems to be generally grounded concerns the application of the tax on the total amount of a number of items purchased, some of which may be exempt from the tax. It may have appeared a simple way to the Minister for Finance to bring in £23 million to increase the Turnover Tax in the Budget but its application has certainly caused a great deal of confusion, uneasiness and dissatisfaction among the public. I believe that the Revenue Commissioners have a duty to see to it that the collection of the tax is properly and equitably applied in the interests of all concerned and that includes both the people who have to collect it through their sales and those who have to pay for it through their purchases.

"The Institute has been set up to help spread the Word of God by every means possible, today, through publications, films, on radio and television. And it is training men and women, priests and nuns to use these methods here at home and in Africa, India, South America and the Far East."

"In this way, using all the skills known to modern man, the faith of our fathers will continue to be brought to millions of people all over the world but in a new and vital way. Your help is needed. Please give generously. Thank you."

The powerful influence of television is spotlighted in the following item which I also quote from "Orbit":

"The average American between his second and sixty-fifth year spends nearly nine years of his life simply watching TV. By the time a 5-year old child in the U.S. enters kindergarten, he has already spent more time learning about the world from the family TV set than is spent by a B.A. student in a classroom throughout his college years."

Well now, that should show you how necessary it is for us here to ensure that we have the most responsible direction of our Television service.

DISPUTE OVER RIGHT OF WAY

Mr. F. Morris, B.L., instructed by E. A. Ryan & Co. appeared for the plaintiffs, and Mr. E. P. King, solicitor, J. P. Williams & Co. was for the defendants. Plaintiffs claimed that on or about 2, 1969, a right-of-way over a luneway leading from their lands to the main road had been blocked by three poles and an iron gate had been placed there by the defendants to prevent them from using it. Mr. Morris told Judge Fawcitt that when the case came up for hearing at Clonmel Circuit Court, the settlement was reached when it was agreed that a right-of-way be granted over the luneway to his clients and that a summons pending in the District

Claim Follows Alleged Round The Houses Car Race In Middle Of Night

MALICIOUS INJURY APPLICATION DISMISSED

A malicious injury application which was stated to have been a sequel to a round-the-houses race between two cars in the middle of the night in Dungarvan, was dismissed by Judge Fawcitt at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday on the grounds that there was no evidence to prove that the damage had been malicious or caused by wanton recklessness. The claim was brought by Patrick Mooney, 18, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, against Waterford County Council for the sum of £89-6-3 in respect of damage to his car. Mr. F. Morris, B.L., (instructed by E. A. Ryan & Co.) for the applicant, said that on the night of June 13, 1969, or very early the next morning, the damage occurred to plaintiff's car which he had parked outside his residence earlier in the evening. At about 1.30 a.m. Garda Power, was awakened by a crash and looked out his window and saw a mini car reversing away and driving away at speed. Another car also went up the street at speed and it looked as if there was some kind of round-the-houses race going on. Patrick Mooney in evidence said that on June 12, he parked his car outside his residence at O'Connell Street at about 9 p.m. He went in and retired some time subsequently. The first he knew that anything was wrong was when he was called by Garda Power. He went out and saw that his car was damaged. John Dunford, St. Bridget Terrace, said that he was going into his own house at that time primrosy bank, 'til we chat a while.' 'Oh, no, kind sir, my hurry, I fear, admits of no delay; Look all around, 'his morning clear, 'tis the dawning of the day.'

Mr. D. Budd, B.L., (instructed by Mr. M. M. Hally) for the County Council asked the Judge to dismiss the claim on the grounds that there was no evidence to prove that the collision had occurred through recklessness. He said that nobody saw the accident actually occur and there was no evidence that there was a race around the streets of Dungarvan that night. Mr. Morris submitted that Mr. Dunford's evidence stated that the car had been driven in a completely reckless manner. Judge Fawcitt said that while he was sorry for Mr. Mooney, but all they knew was that Mr. Dunford, a tourist to Dungarvan had his car stolen that night and it struck Mr. Mooney's car. They subsequently knew what happened after he did not think there was enough evidence before him to compel him to view that what happened was done with malice or recklessness and he would consequently have to dismiss the claim. No order was made as to costs.

HAVING A RACE

Witness said that he then had a look at the mini car which had stopped and saw that the ignition was on but there was no ignition key. The left wheel of the car was damaged. In his opinion one of the cars was chasing the other or they were having a race and the mini was driven in a completely reckless manner. Garda W. Power said that he heard a crash outside in the street. He got up and looked out the window and saw the lights of a mini up against the front of Mr. Mooney's car. The mini reversed and drove off up Beigid Street. It stopped some way up and witness went out and ran up the road but when he got near the car he saw a man disappearing into Mitchell Street. When he got there there was no sign of the man. The next morning he was at the Garda Station when an English man named Duffey reported that his car, a mini, had been stolen from outside where he was staying about 150 yards away from where the crash occurred.
