TO HELP OUR HANDICAPPED CHILDREN

On Sunday next the people of the County of West Waterford will be afforded an opportunity of helping the wonderful work of St. John's Association for Handicapped Children when a collection will be made at all church gates throughout the county.

The collection is to help in meeting the day to day running expenses of St. John's Special School in Dungarvan which is at present being conducted in temporary premises kindly loaned to the Association by the Presentation Community in the town.

The building up of a permanent school is the main aim of the Association and the cost of a new school to be built by the Department of Education.

St. John's School was opened in January 1969 when there were little over 40 children on the roll with a staff of three teachers. Now, less than eighteen months later, the roll has risen to 76 with a waiting list of some 6 pupils while the staff has increased to 4 teachers and the good nuns, at considerable inconvenience to themselves, have managed to increase the accommodation by making two additional classrooms available.

A great deal of negotiation has gone on in the matter of building a new school and plans have been drawn up and approved for a building which is proposed to sit on a site which the Nuns have also kindly agreed to make available to the Association. Some legal snags remain to be ironed out before an agreement can be reached and the matter is at present in the hands of the Board of Works.

A tentative estimate for the new school puts the price at £42,500. At this time the building is completed to the extent of 75 per cent beyond that figure. On this basis the Association has fixed a sum of £10,000 as the minimum target to meet their local contribution towards the cost and next Sunday's collection is looked on as one of the main sources towards achieving this target.

In a recent progress report on the school and the work being done there, the Assistant Chief Medical Officer of the County, Dr. M. E. O'Neill, states: "Did we have our own school we could have a present roll of approximately 82 pupils with a future intake approximating to 100. More important than these statistics is the educational and social progress being made by the children which has, in many cases, been remarkable, making the whole project well worth while."

The establishment of this school in Dungarvan and the great work which has been carried out and is continuing at present under Dr. O'Neill and his staff in assessing children all over the region can only be recognised as a great social benefit and one for which there was a great need for a long time.

Besides the Regional Association which draws its members from all over the county, the school has a number of very hard-working committees attached to it. The members of these committees with the School Manager, Very Rev. Fr. D. O'Brien, P.P., devote much of their time at great personal inconvenience to themselves at times, to the running of the school.

Next Sunday, the general public will have an opportunity of showing their appreciation of the work of those people and what they have done and will continue to do for the handicapped children of the region. Every penny collected will be put to good use to ensure that in time facilities will be available to provide special education for all the handicapped children of the region who require it. So do not let it go to the other person when it comes to contributing next Sunday. This should be a community effort which should command the support of all.

Union Claims Councillor's Statement Was Inaccurate And Mischievous

SEQUEL TO COMPLAINT AGAINST HOME ASSISTANCE OFFICER

"It might have been more logical, prudent and just to have the case investigated before making any public pronouncements which as we conclude are both inaccurate and mischievous," stated a letter from the Workers' Union of Ireland (No. 15 Branch), Dublin, which referred to a complaint made by Mr. K. O'Ryan against a Home Assistance Officer at a previous meeting and which was read at the Monthly meeting of the Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan last Monday night.

In the course of a discussion on salary increases at the previous meeting, Mr. O'Ryan stated that a recipient of Home Assistance had informed him that a Home Assistance Officer had told him: "it is too damn well off the likes of you are."

The matter was the subject of an official report from the Secretary at last Monday night's meeting while the Chairman, Mr. P. Browne, T.D., also submitted the letter from the Union which had been addressed to him on the subject.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

In the course of his report, the Secretary, Mr. J. A. Hynes stated: "At the last meeting Councillor O'Ryan raised the following issues:—

- (1) The low level of Assistance
- (2) A specific complaint regarding the carrying out of his duties by an Assistant Officer in relation to a particular Home Assistance recipient.

"With regard to the first complaint concerning the low level of assistance, a recent survey undertaken by an Officer of the Institute of Public Administration in the course of preparation for the publication of his book "A Law for the Poor," reveals that Waterford ranks amongst the counties paying the highest rates of Home Assistance. In the table of averages only Dublin has a higher average rate of assistance (Table 10, page 46).

"With regard to No. 2, the recipient in question has a Social Welfare Disability of £7-8-0 per week. He has a mentally handicapped child and by virtue of this a special supplementary Home Assistance allowance of 30/- per week was being paid in his case up to March approximately. It was then learned that his wife had taken up employment some months previously, a fact which changed the family's circumstances and which had not been revealed to the Health Authority. It was felt desirable to establish the position.

INCREASES FOR SPECIALISTS EMPLOYED BY HEALTH AUTHORITY APPROVED

Will Cost Over £4,000 A Year Extra

We don't want to have any doctors' strikes in Waterford and I propose that these increases be granted stated Mr. P. Cahill at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan last Monday night when increases for whole-time and part-time Health Authority Medical Specialists were being considered.

The increases were set out in a letter from the Department of Health dated April 14 which stated:—

"Successive Ministers for Health have had under consideration a claim from the Medical Association and the Medical Union for an increase in the remuneration of whole-time and part-time Health Authority medical specialists consequent on implementation of the Health and Mental Treatment (Amendment) Act, 1965.

"The basis of the claim was that implementation of the Act had resulted in an increase in the consultants' work on behalf of public patients together with an increase in their private practice so that some measure of compensation was necessary. The specific conditions were accepted by the then Minister but since the legislation affecting their conditions of service had been introduced by the Minister for Finance, he made an offer which was rejected by the specialists.

"Negotiations were resumed with the present Minister, who felt that he was bound to honour the commitments of his predecessors in office, and have resulted in the following agreement:—

(a) Payment of a lump sum of £760 to cover the period from 1 April, 1966 to 31 March, 1969 and

(b) An increase of £250 a year as from 1 April, 1969.

"The agreement applies to whole-time specialists who have the use of four private beds, and it provides for a pro-rata increase, based on current salaries, to part-time specialists who have the use of two (or in some cases four) private beds.

"The Minister's sanction to implementation of this agreement may be assumed. The Irish Medical Association and the Medical Union have been advised of course, that this sanction is contingent upon the willingness of local Health Authorities to provide the necessary funds.

In reply to a question by Mr. O'Ryan, the Secretary stated that five doctors were involved in the increase. These included the County Surgeon who was a whole-time officer and four other specialists who were part-time and who had private practices.

The increases as set out in the Department's letter were approved.

tion that when family income changes the Home Assistance recipient must inform the Assistance Officer of the change. As a result a relatively nominal decrease of 10/- per week was made in the Home Assistance Allowance in this case. On being interviewed the recipient denied that the Assistance Officer had ever asked him to bring the boy to the dispensary. The reason he brought him was because his wife was not at home to care for the child.

"With regard to the allegation that the Assistance Officer used the words "You are too well off" the recipient says that the Assistance Officer did not say this. When asked did he say "You are too well off" he replied "he did not." The relationship between the Assistance Officer and the recipient is exceptionally good.

"The Manager accepts the assurance of the Assistance Officer that the events, as outlined, did not take place and he further accepts the evidence from the recipient that the words complained of were not used.

Mr. O'Ryan said that anyone hearing this report would think that the statement he had made at the last meeting was a concocted story. But, he said, "I assure you that the statement made by me was the same as made by me by the recipient at the time."

Mr. O'Ryan then went on to say that he had again visited the recipient last Sunday night and on this occasion the man told him that he had said the first day was wrong and he went back on everything he had said then. Mr. O'Ryan added that he was now convinced that the whole thing was a pre-fabrication of lies.

UNION LETTER

It was at this stage that the Chairman submitted the letter on the matter which he had received from the Workers' Union of Ireland. Signed by Mr. L. O'Dea, Branch Secretary, the letter stated: "I am obliged to bring to your attention a matter of grave concern to members of this trade union employed as Assistance Officers by Waterford Health Authority. It appears that an Assistance Officer is charged with discourteous behaviour and scandalous treatment towards a home assistance recipient... as raised by Councillor O'Ryan who received support from three other Councillors."

The letter went on to state that while elected representatives had the right to criticise justly and constructively any of the Union's members in the discharge of their duties "the prosecution of this case would appear to suggest that the Waterford Health Authority believes in a system of sentence before trial. No opportunity whatsoever was given the official in question to report and explain on the circumstances of the case. He was subjected to an attack by certain councillors whom we can only conclude have a personal animosity against this official and Assistance Officers in general or who seek political limelight by raising unchecked and unsubstantiated assertions at a public meeting in order to gain maximum publicity in the news media. Decency and a sense of fair play are essential ingredients in any administration and equally apply to public life."

The letter then pointed out that the Union had checked the facts with the parties concerned and concluded: "we suggest that those who may wish to engage in ridicule should do likewise before passing judgement. We would remind the elected representatives who have seen fit to act as judge and jury without any trial that their actions do not conform to basic human rights or to democratic procedure. It might have been more logical, prudent and just to have the case investigated before making any public pronouncements which as we conclude are both inaccurate and mischievous."
