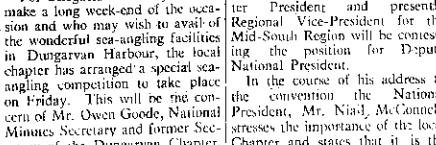

FINANCE MINISTER WILL DEDICATE NEW SEA-WATER MAGNESITE PLANT AT BALLINACOURTY

FIRST OF ITS KIND IN EUROPE

Dungarvan and Bennettsbridge will be the focal points next Thursday September 17th, when Ireland's first Sea-Water Magnesite Plant will be officially dedicated by Mr. George J. Colley, Minister for Finance.
The Dungarvan Plant and Bennettsbridge Quarry operations are part of the Quigley Magnesite Division of the Pfizer Chemical Corporation which has its world headquarters in New York.

Tuesday sees the completion of a four-year project which will undoubtedly contribute to the Nation's industrial growth and advancement. The programme, involving a capital expenditure of \$10m. heralds the dawn of a new industrial era in the Dungarvan locality.
At Ballinacourty, Kilkenny dolomite is converted into dolomitic lime which is then reacted with Irish coastal sea water to produce high quality magnesium.

FIRST IN IRELAND

This new multi-million pound project is the first in Ireland to extract valuable mineral resources from off-shore waters and the nation's high-purity dolomite deposits. The undertaking is unique because no similar installation is to be found anywhere in continental Europe. Built by the Quigley Division of Pfizer Chemical Corporation, the Dungarvan plant processes many million gallons of sea-water per day. When chemically reacted with dolomitic lime, produced from County Kilkenny limestone, the treated sea water yields high-purity magnesium oxide (magnesia) at a rate of over 75,000 tons a year. The dolomite ore from Bennettsbridge is mined by open cast method and is crushed, graded and railed to Dungarvan at the rate of over 250,000 tons a year. The new factory plant supplies high-graded refractory material to Roofchrome, Cork, a subsidiary of Pfizer Inc. There,

PRODUCED AT LESS COST

The Quigley introduction of the novel "Gunatipite" (BOF) in 1965 was a major breakthrough and meant that steel could be produced at less cost by extending the life of furnaces. Before the Dungarvan plant went into operation, C.I.E. laid a 2 1/2 mile new track from the Waterford/Dungarvan line to the new site. In addition, new sidings were built at Bennettsbridge and at the Tivoli Industrial Estate at Cork to accommodate rail wagons specially designed and built by C.I.E.

TIDY TOWNS TITLE RETURNS TO DONEGAL

RESULTS OF BORD FAIRTE 1970 COMPETITION

The tiddest town in Ireland is Malin, Co. Donegal, northernmost village in the country. Malin (population 171) has won the National Award for the best town over all in Bord Faillte's Tidy Towns Competition. Last year Malin was runner-up to Tyrrelpass, Co. Westmeath.

This year's result brings the title back to Donegal after eight consecutive years in the Midlands. Glenties in Co. Donegal was overall winner in 1958, 1959, 1960 and 1962. Glenties re-entered the competition this year after several years absence and won the prize for the best new entry in its category.

Malin received 140 out of a possible 150 marks, more than last year's winner and the highest total since the inception of the competition in 1958.

There was a tie for second place between Ballyconnell, Co. Cavan, and Trim, Co. Meath, both scoring 138 marks. Entries totalled 554 and of these 56 were new competitors.

GREATLY IMPRESSED In a telegram of congratulation to Mr. P. J. Logue, Secretary, Main Development Committee, Dr. Tim O'Driscoll, Director of Bord Faillte said: "Congratulations on a very fine performance. This is a fully deserved reward for a superb community effort."

HOW LOCAL TOWNS FARED In the marking sheets of the adjudicators, Dungarvan found itself in the lowest grade, "Good", in category "G" (5,000-25,000) and of the 25 entrants in this category was fifth from the bottom with 84 marks (out of 150), one more than was scored last year.

Other marks were allocated as follows (maximum 150): Category "A" (Population not exceeding 200) — Newcastle 120; Conna 115; Ballynacorney 105; Mogeely 92; Clashmore 91; Casheleens 76; Villierstown 81; Category "B" (Pop. 200-500) — Kilmoe 112; Ardmore 110; Killeigh 108; Kilmacnathomas 87; Cheekpoint 86; Castlemartyr 84; Category "C" (Pop. 500-1,500) — Dunmore East 100; Tallow 88; Cappoquin 81; Lismore 80; Category "D" (Pop. 1,500-3,000) — Middleton 118; Fermoyle 95; Tramore 89; Carrick-on-Suir 77.

Category "E" (Pop. 3,000-25,000) — Youghal 91; Clonmel 88; Dungarvan 84. The gradings were made out as follows in all categories: 110 marks and over—'Exceptionally Good'; 100 marks to 109 marks—'Highly Commended'; 85 marks to 99 marks—'Commended'; 70 marks to 84 marks—'Good'.

AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEE MEMBERS HEAR ADDRESS ON BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION

CAUSES OF INFECTION OUTLINED

Members of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday were addressed on procedures to be adopted for the eradication of Brucellosis by Mr. J. Farrell, Supt. Veterinary Inspector, Department of Agriculture and by Mr. N. Schorman, Supt. Veterinary Inspector, B.T.E. Office, Waterford.

Points made in the address and discussion which followed were: Brucellosis is caused by a small microbe called Brucella abortus. The most common method of introducing the disease to a herd is by purchasing infected cattle. It is important to realise the highly contagious nature of Brucellosis, not only to cattle but also to humans. The brucellosis-infected cow may pass on infection to humans by drinking infected milk or handling infected material.

It is sometimes overlooked that infected cows may calve normally at full term or perhaps a short time before full term while at the same time spreading millions of brucella germs which infect other cows and in-calf heifers. This particular category of infected animal is most dangerous as spread is taking place without the knowledge of the owner.

It is advisable to check-heat a herd, preferably before mid-pregnancy, in order to establish if infected animals are in the herd. If infection is established, a veterinary surgeon's advice should be taken on procedures to be adopted following tests.

An abortion vaccine is not a cure for brucellosis. Vaccine is an aid in the control of the disease and provides a measure of protection only if its use is supported by good management and farm hygiene.

Compulsory eradication commenced in 1946 in Dungarvan and has been extended to other counties since. The gradual extension of eradication will protect country by county until the entire country is brucellosis free.

As far as counties outside the present compulsory area are concerned, herdowners should avail of the heifer vaccination scheme for maiden heifers, twelve months and upwards. A voluntary brucellosis scheme is available to herdowners who wish to clear their herds in advance of eradication measures.

Further use of the Milk Ring Test at local creameries is under consideration and it is hoped to introduce it in the near future.

CALL FOR REMOVAL OF I.B.O.A. SECRETARY

Bank Strike Causing Incalculable Harm To Country

Strong criticism of their attitude in the present bank strike was levelled against the Bank Officials and the Secretary of their Association at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr. D. Ahearne said that it was very disappointing for the general public that no attempt had been made to settle the strike and he added that if it continued the whole country would soon be in chaos.

Mr. H. R. Dowd said that it was a great pity that the Bank Officials did not choose a better Secretary to represent them. He said that at present they were apparently unable to settle a dispute without taking strike action and when a strike occurred they were unable to settle it.

Mr. K. O'Riyan, Chairman, said that it was unfair to say that no attempt had been made to settle the strike. Several attempts had been made without success.

Mr. M. Harly said that they should appeal to both sides to approach their problems with goodwill as this was the only avenue through which they could negotiate with success. He suggested an independent arbitration board and said that the Government could and should encourage a meeting between both parties on that basis.

Mr. Dowd. The Bank Officials want to establish an intolerable precedent in this country by waiting to be paid while they are on strike. They are holding the country up to ransom and the strike has done incalculable harm and will set the national economy back more than a year.

Mr. Dowd. It's not a lock-out. It's the most colossal anti-national, anti-social action and the worst I have ever come across.

Mr. C. Curran said that Mr. Dowd should be complimented on his most excellent statement on this matter. There was no doubt but that both sides involved were holding the country up to ransom. We are the only country without proper banking services, said Mr. Curran, and we are the laughing stock of the world.

Mr. Dowd added that they should appeal to the Minister for Labour to get both parties into direct consultation immediately with a view to settling the dispute without further delay.
