PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

GREAT WEEK FOR DUNGARVAN

Last week was a really red letter week for Dungarvan with a series of events and functions crowding upon the other in quick succession.

The first big occasion was the Annual Convention of Junior Chamber Ireland which drew delegates from practically every county in the town for their two-day annual gathering. How successful the members of the local Chapter were in organising the function can be gathered from the quantity of the tributes paid by all the visiting delegates at the conclusion and I understand that the 1970 A.G.M. of J.C.I. will be remembered for many years to come by all who attended it.

This was a great occasion for Dungarvan as it brought visitors from all over Ireland to the town, many of them for the first time, and as a result I feel sure that our county capital has gained a new status.

On Thursday we had what I feel sure must be looked on, judged by any standards, a unique occasion when the new Sea-Water Magnesium Plant was dedicated at Ballinacorney Dignatories of Church and State, millionaire business men with international reputations and leaders in most walks of life gathered on the wind-swept tip of Dungarvan Harbour for a ceremony which was mounted and carried through with military precision. What occurred here is fully reported elsewhere but I will return to this further on in the column to tell you a little more of what goes on at the Ballinacorney plant.

The landing of a helicopter at Lisheen on Friday afternoon was the next source of excitement. It brought Mr. Jack Mulcahy from Dublin to his native town to receive a well-deserved tribute from the Local Development Committee on behalf of the people of Dungarvan.

Friday also saw the commencement of the International Sea Angling Competition and the town's three day Shark and Shanny Festival and from there until Sunday night the festive spirit prevailed. Indeed there was more packed into the week than would normally be sufficient to keep one going for more than a month. It will, however, in all probability take those who were involved throughout the week a month to recover from it! But congratulations to all concerned in each and every one of the functions for the wonderful success achieved.

well as the abrasion caused by the impact of tons of scrap metal charged into the furnace—and do all this while being subjected to recalcitrant heat.

Furnace relining is a major maintenance item in steel mills. Depending on the size of the vessel, installation of refractory brick can take from two days to a week. The recalcitrant nature of non-productive downtime—can range from £20,000 to £60,000 per furnace.

Steel production in America—the primary export market for Irish seawater magnesia—continues to rise and is estimated to reach a capacity of 80 million tons before the decade is out and the long range-iron is towards the use of total synthetic magnesite production so that there can be no doubt about the future of the Ballinacorney plant which is bound to grow and expand as world steel production rises.

A BISHOP'S APPEAL

Another function at which I was privileged to be a guest last week was the reception held in Dungarvan by Messrs. E. O'Sullivan & Sons (Dungarvan) Ltd. to mark the official opening of the new technical school at Kilmacomas for which they were the main contractors.

Among the after dinner speakers was Most Rev. Dr. Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, and I was very much taken by one of the points which his Lordship made. It was in the nature of an appeal made to the Government, through the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Education, Mr. Michael O'Kennedy, who was present at the function having performed the official opening of the school, to develop rural communities by providing more houses to enable people to live in their own areas.

Dr. Russell made the point that even though people might have to travel some distances to their places of employment they should be allowed to set up house in their own localities. He referred to the position in other countries where workers have to commute very long distances to their work and said that even where workers find employment in industrial centres such as Waterford, Dungarvan and Youghal they are never further away than an hour's travel to these centres anywhere in the country.

The drift from the countryside is a very big problem and were the Government and particularly the Department of Local Government which deals with housing to listen to the advice given by Dr. Russell I believe that the overall result would be of great benefit to our people and particularly to the younger generations who would be able to be brought up in a proper environment.

CHARITY WALK IN DUNGARVAN

Junior Chamber Dungarvan are at present organising a Charity Walk in aid of a number of local charities and should the event prove as successful as last year's venture then the nominated charities stand to benefit handsomely.

The walk will take place on Sunday, October 4, and unlike last year there will be a massed start of walkers from the Square starting at 12 (noon). There is a 16 miles circuit planned for the walkers taking them through checkpoints at Clonca Cross, Ballyvoile Point, Durrow Cross, Downey's Cross, The Pike, Tarr's Bridge and finally back to the Square. Refreshments will be available at checkpoints 2 and 5.

The charities which will benefit from the walk are St. John's School for Mentally Handicapped Children, St. Vincent de Paul Conference, in Dungarvan and Abbeyside; Society of Friends of St. Martin and the Lourdes Invalid Society.

The success of the venture of course depends on the number of walkers who take part and more particularly on the number of sponsors which each walker goes to back his effort. Walker's booklets in which sponsors' names may be listed are now available from Mr. Vincent Byrne, O'Connell Street.

Rumours Of Political Discrimination Against Government Supporters In R.E. Connections

ALLEGATIONS AT CO. COUNCIL MEETING

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, stated at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Tuesday that rumours of discrimination against supporters of the Government in the matter of Rural Electrification were floating around.

The allegation which was made when members of the Council were discussing problems of rural electrification in West Waterford was vehemently denied by Mr. J. Dillon, Area Engineer for the E.S.B. in the Clonmel-Dungarvan area, who attended the meeting to discuss the matter.

At a previous meeting strong criticism of the failure of the E.S.B. to maintain expected progress in their rural electrification programme for West Waterford was made and it was decided to invite representatives of the Board to attend the next meeting to explain the position.

At the outset at Tuesday's meeting Mr. Dillon told the members that throughout the country generally the Board had agreed to give priority to people within one mile of existing extensions and this policy had now been accepted for the Waterford area and he pointed out that this would speed up isolated extensions to individual houses.

He went on to say that the fact that 450 bulk tanks had to be installed in rural areas throughout the county in the past few years had slowed down work on other rural electrification programmes. They gave priority in the matter of connections to schools, group water schemes, small factories and to people who moved from a connected area to one which had not been connected up as they felt that it would be unfair to a person made a great deal of electrical equipment such as cookers, washers, etc., should be left lying idle.

Mr. Dillon then stated that it looked as if they could now continue on again with the rural electrification scheme during the coming year and from progress made to date he said that it would take up to six years before the entire scheme for the county would be completed.

IMMEDIATE DIFFICULTIES AT DUNGARVAN QUAY RESOLVED

Shipping Activities To Be Resumed

The immediate difficulties in relation to the quay had been resolved since the last meeting and for this reason, it was decided, in consultation with the Chairman, not to hold a special meeting to deal with the matter, stated Mr. P. Robinson, Town Clerk, in the course of a report submitted to a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night concerning the problem arising from the dangerous condition of the quay.

The report went on to state: "The Waterford Co-Operative Society have indicated that they are prepared to continue using the quay in its present state provided that the Council continues to carry risks for damage or injury. Our Insurance Company has agreed to continue our cover in respect of Public Liability, but the premium will be increased from approximately £215 last year to £280 this year. This premium will be paid by the Council over a period of 12 months, but in view of the high cost of accidents and injury, the Company is also being asked to submit a quotation for increasing the cover to £100,000.

The Waterford Co-Operative Society have indicated that they are prepared to continue using the berth at which vessels were moored last year, however, they would like to have a second berth available for vessels lying up while waiting to unload. They feel that the berth which was closed following the arrival of the wall would be suitable for this purpose, provided that it was adequately secured up and some repairs carried out. The County Engineer has agreed that minimum repairs could probably be carried out for a period of a few hundred pounds. This could not, of course, guarantee the safety of the berth in the event of further collapse at a future date would remain. However, it would ensure that the quay could continue to be used for shipping.

The Council is prepared to agree to these proposals, work on the minor repairs could be put in hand in the very near future."

Shipping Activities To Be Resumed

Mr. P. Deasy said that some matters stood the general town rate account, it was now approximately £2,000 of the Harbour Account debt and was financing the harbour to the extent of £1,000 of £5,000.

Mr. K. Ryan, Chairman, said he did not believe that the harbour could ever be used again in a manner which would justify extreme expenditure. The immediate provision was to get the shipping moving again and he suggested that they appoint a committee to investigate the Town Clerk's report.

The Council unanimously agreed to this.

Late Mr. Richard Goode, Dungarvan and London

Dick leaves a widow, Sheila, and three children, two sons and a daughter, all of school age. He will be sadly missed by friends and colleagues, not only at Hammettsmith, but in all areas covered by Department I."

Pfizer Dedicates Ireland's First Seawater-Magnesia Plant

PRODUCES MATERIALS FOR STEEL INDUSTRY THROUGHOUT WORLD

Ireland's first plant for the production of refractory magnesia from seawater and native dolomite was dedicated at Ballinacorney Dunganarvan, on Thursday, September 17, by the Minister for Finance and senior officials of Pfizer Inc.

At the ceremonies, a commemorative plaque was unveiled and, in observance of European Conservation Year, silver birch trees were planted on the 42-acre plant site overlooking Dunganarvan Harbour on Ireland's southern coast. Participating with the Minister, Mr. George J. Colley, in the formal dedication of the \$10 million facility were John J. Powers, Jr., President and Chairman of the Board of Pfizer Inc., J. William Stuart, Chairman of the Executive Committee, John E. McKee, Honorary Chairman of the Board, and Dunganarvan-born John A. Mulcahy, President of Quigley Company Inc., a Pfizer subsidiary.

Pfizer officials and guests representing government, commerce and industry were welcomed by Dr. Paul Mulcahy, Operations Manager for Quigley Magnesia in Ireland and Vice-President of Rookchroome Ltd., also a Pfizer subsidiary. On the dais were the U.S. Ambassador, Mr. John D. Moore; Dean R. Tucker, and J. F. Harman, Quigley Vice-Presidents from Pfizer headquarters in New York; Most Rev. Dr. Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, who blessed the plant, and Rt. Rev. J. W. Armstrong, Bishop of Cashel, Emly, Waterford and Lismore, who recited the prayer of dedication. SYMBOLS OF A NEW BIRTH OF FREEDOM Mr. Powers, speaking from a dais flanked by the national flags of Ireland and the United States, said: "I do not think it is far wrong to say that this facility, and the many others that are rising in modern Ireland, are symbols of a new birth of freedom for this country. Describing the new facility as 'a native product of Ireland,' he noted that the process utilizes Irish dolomite quarried from nearby deposits and that the project was built by Irish construction workers and is staffed and operated by Irish personnel. Leadership in the Irish Government, he added, 'made it attractive for this technology to be brought here.' Mr. J. A. Mulcahy noted that over the years he had 'observed with deep regret that emigration was taking a heavy toll of the flower of our Irish youth, and unless Ireland could balance her farm economy with industry, this deplorable situation would continue.' He said the Irish government 'took wise steps in providing the necessary impetus to industry to come to Ireland,' and added 'this endeavour should be continued and expanded.' Operated by the Quigley Magnesia Division of Pfizer Chemical Corporation, the plant will turn out seawater-magnesia at a rate of 75,000 tons per year. This high-purity synthetic material is used widely in steel-making furnaces and in other industrial applications where heat-resistance is required. Magnesia-rich dolomite for the process is quarried, crushed and sized at Bennettsbridge, Co. Kilkenny, and transported by rail to the plant site. A new pier and bulk-handling facility was built in Cork Harbour by Rookchroome Ltd. to expedite shipments to the United States, Europe and the Far East. The dedication came some two years after the first sod was turned, when Mr. Powers gave his promise that it would be 'the fastest building project you have ever seen.' Design and construction of the turn-key project was assigned to Dorr-Oliver Incorporated, specialists in seawater-magnesia who collaborated closely with Quigley engineers in its completion. SPECIALLY CHARTERED TRAIN Earlier in the day, a quarry blast was set off at Bennettsbridge to signal the start of a brief ceremony at that location, which supplies the limestone to the Dunganarvan plant. The blast was witnessed by a C.I.E. train specially chartered by Pfizer for the occasion. Guests from Dublin, Kilkenny, Cork and Waterford were then taken to the main ceremonial site at Dunganarvan. Following the ceremonies, visitors toured the plant site by bus. Mr. Colley, Mr. Powers, Mr. Stuart, Mr. McKee, Mr. Mulcahy and members of the Oireachtas and public representatives were conducted on a walking tour by Plant Manager,

William Stuart, Chairman of the Executive Committee of Pfizer, sitting on the dais with us today. 'I am sure you will be interested to know that the grandparents of two of these gentlemen—Mr. Powers and Mr. McKee—were born in Ireland, and in Mr. Powers' case his maternal grandfather was born in Tipperary and one of his grandfathers was born in Pittmore, only a few miles from here and his relatives are still living there. 'It took very little persuasion to have these gentlemen recognize the wonderful climate for business in this country and I am happy to state, they also decided to put a huge plant in Ireland and it is now under construction at Ringaskiddy in Cork at a cost of over £16-million. So the marriage took place and the bride and groom were very happy in their union and I am quite sure Ireland will also be happy with this union. 'I am now looking forward to spending several months a year in Ireland and I intend raising pedigree cattle and getting involved in other matters which will help the economy of Ireland. I pray that God will bless these plants and their workers and that Ireland will continue to prosper.' REMINDER OF CONTINUING SUCCESS In his speech, Mr. Colley, Minister for Finance, said that the opening of the plant at Ballinacorney was a landmark of the substantial and continuing success the Irish people were achieving in a vital area of national endeavour. 'I am particularly impressed by the nature of this project,' said the Minister, 'as it has all the marks of a successful new undertaking: it affords considerable new employment for this area and in addition the industry is expected to generate new extensive transport business in the area.' Referring to output the Minister stated: 'Annual production will amount to 75,000 tons valued at almost £2 million and the plant represents a capital investment of £3.8 million towards which the I.D.A. has provided a substantial grant. Employment will be provided for 220 men and 40 women. This is a considerable figure for new employment in a non-urban centre. A second stage in the development of the plant will afford additional employment for about 50 people mostly men. 'Paying tribute to Mr. Mulcahy for his part in having the new plant established at Ballinacorney, Mr. Colley said: 'Another heartening aspect of this occasion is the part played by the President of the Quigley Company, Mr. Jack Mulcahy, in ensuring that this substantial undertaking should be established in his native area. He is, of course, a man whose patriotism was proved in darker days. He does Ireland no less a service today. Mr. Mulcahy is one of those staunch Irish-American businessmen who have not forgotten their origins and who have continually manifested an active interest in the progress of this country. We are indebted to him personally and the Companies which he has been associated for this proof of genuine interest in our future. 'Speaking of Mr. Powers, the Minister said 'I am very gratified that we have present today Mr. Jack Powers, the President of the Pfizer Corporation who himself is no stranger to our shores. Pfizer is now very substantially involved in industrial development in this country but I am hopeful that what we have seen already is but a prelude to even more major developments.' U.S. AND IRISH ANTHEMS The ceremonies at Ballinacorney were concluded by the playing of the American and Irish National Anthems by the Dunganarvan Brass Band and the entire party attending the function were then conveyed to Waterford for the special train where a reception to mark the occasion was held at the Tower Hotel.

STAFF CELEBRATION Members of the Staff at Ballinacorney celebrated the occasion at a special Buffet Dance held at the Hotel Orono, Dunganarvan, that night. SCENE OF BOYHOOD MEMORIES In his address Mr. John A. Mulcahy said: 'Minister Colley, distinguished guests and fellow workers: I am sure you realize that I feel a sense of pride and gratitude and a feeling of nostalgia to be here today. There is also a feeling of nostalgia as I gaze over this beautiful Dunganarvan Harbour where I spent my boyhood and from where, nearly 50 years ago, I reluctantly emigrated to the United States of America. 'In many trips back to Ireland over the ensuing years, I observed with deep regret that emigration was taking a heavy toll of the flower of our Irish youth and furthermore, unless Ireland could balance her farm economy with industry, this deplorable situation would continue. Fortunately, the Irish government, with great foresight, took wise steps in providing the necessary impetus to industry to come to Ireland, and—in my opinion—this endeavour should be continued and expanded. It was my keenest desire to help Ireland in this movement; and accordingly I, and my loyal and faithful associates, spent every effort towards increasing our European business to the extent that we were able to build our first plant in Ireland at Cork bearing the name Rookchroome Limited. DEATH DUE TO NATURAL CAUSES

Inquest On Mallow Infant

A seaside caravan holiday at Clonca that ended in tragedy for a Co. Cork family was recalled at an inquest in Dunganarvan on Friday, September 11, on a three-month-old infant boy, Thomas Bohan, 1, Harold's Place, Mallow, who was found dead in his cot in his parents car outside Dunganarvan Fire Station on the night of August 3rd last.

In a statement to the inquest the child's father, Thomas Bohan said that on July 30th last he and his wife and three children went on a caravan holiday to Clonca resort near Dunganarvan. On the evening of August 2nd they drove to Dunganarvan to visit the new Fire Station as he was a member of the Mallow Fire Brigade. His son Mark (aged 3 years and four months) and Paula (aged 2 years and four months) were in the front of the car and the infant Thomas was in the carry cot in the back seat.

SOMETHING WRONG Mr. Bohan in his statement said his wife and he then went into the Fire Station but they could see the children from the building. At one stage he saw the children pulling at a mirror and when his wife went out to them they were all okay then. They remained in the Fire Station for about 20 or 25 minutes but when they returned to the car his wife said there was something wrong with Thomas. He looked at the baby and saw by his appearance that he was dead.

NO VIOLENCE Garda T. Callaghan, Dunganarvan said he was called to the Fire Station at 9.15 p.m. following a report that a child had died in a parked car. He subsequently went to the district hospital where the infant was identified to him by his father. There were no visible marks of violence on the body. Dr. M. K. Cusack, Dunganarvan, said he carried out a post mortem examination on the body and there were no signs of injury of any kind. In his opinion death was due to natural causes though probably from respiratory failure (cot death).

SYMPATHY Returning a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence, the Coroner, Dr. Healy, expressed sympathy with the parents and relatives of the infant. He said it was a very tragic end to the holiday for them.

Land Required For Housing

He understood at the last meeting that the sum of £25,000 was to cover the land and did not include the buildings on it said Mr. P. Kynne, Chairman, said that if agreement could be reached at any stage of the proceedings it would be accepted. He knew that all the Council members would prefer to see the land purchased by agreement as no one wanted to get it by compulsory acquisition.

Mr. A. Deasy thought they had acted hastily in this matter and more time could have been given to negotiations.

Mr. Kynne said that if Mr. Conway was willing to negotiate, the Council would negotiate with him but if not then they could go ahead with the C.P.O. 'I am not prepared,' said Mr. Kynne, 'to give £24 thousand per acre for land as I know what the normal price is in the district and I must be guided by that.'
