### PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

#### NOTHING GOING FOR THE SMOKING HABIT

When the Minister for Health, Mr. Eoin MacNeill, launched the anti-cigarette-smoking campaign last week he made a speech which contained some statistics which should make all smokers sit up and take notice. According to the facts stated by Mr. MacNeill, the habit of smoking is nothing going for the smoker as the prospect of a shortened life.

He quoted Dr. Charles Fletcher, Secretary of the Royal College of Physicians Smoking Committee, as saying at a conference on smoking and health held in San Diego, California, that a 35-year-old man who smokes 15 minutes of his life for every cigarette he smokes, will probably indeed for a few weeks of the week. At this rate one could almost see the inevitable end of his life literally going up in smoke. But it is a sobering thought as Dr. Fletcher is no light-weight in his field and much weight must be attached to what he has to say.

Mr. Children then went on to state the Chief Medical Officer of the British Department of Health and Social Security, Sir George Godber, had to say in an article which he wrote in the "World Health Magazine" last March: "In fact the man who smokes twenty or more cigarettes a day from the age of twenty onwards is likely to die five years less than the non-smoker of the same age, and if he smokes forty or more he is likely to live eight years less. The man who smokes twenty cigarettes a day has double the chance of dying in the next ten years than the non-smoker."

Bringing the problem nearer home, Mr. Children pointed out that ten times as many smokers as non-smokers died of lung cancer in the past twelve years. Statistics showed also, he said, that the coronary heart disease rate for men smoking twenty or more cigarettes a day was about three times greater than that for non-smokers and he pointed out that in this country in 1969 deaths from heart disease at 11,220, amounted to about one-third of all deaths.

These statistics should certainly hammer home the message that cigarette smoking is dangerous to health and that for adults and teenagers alike the passing satisfaction of the puff is hardly worth the sacrifice of years of good living.

#### A SAD REFLECTION

When Charles Stuart Parnell died on October 6, 1891, there was great mourning throughout the land for the chief who had done so much for his country and his people. Whatever happened in the years before his death and the unfortunate association that brought about his downfall and his rejection as leader in the battle for Home Rule, Parnell still remained the man who brought England to heel.

Parnell died quietly but his death caught the world by surprise and it is doubtful if Ireland ever got over that surprise. For years after, Irishmen wore the ivy leaf of remembrance on October 6 and some few still do to the present time.

How few, though, was reflected in the handful that came up, a mere few dozen, for the memorial service at his monument in Dublin last Sunday. At the same time over one thousand of our young people gathered outside the American Embassy in Dublin to protest "as the voice of Vietnam in Ireland" against the visit of U.S. President Nixon to this country last week-end.

I thought what a sad reflection and how ephemeral human attitudes are.

### Steep Increase In County Agricultural Estimates

E.E.C. COMPETITION WILL DEMAND MORE EFFICIENT FARMING METHODS

#### THE BOLD O'DONAHUE

The need for more efficient methods in farming to increase production and to cut costs so as to be able to meet the competition when we enter the Common Market was referred to at a meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture last Monday by Mr. J. P. Cadogan, Inspector, Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, when the Committee was considering the provisional estimates to finance the various schemes for the coming financial year.

The overall estimate totalled £59,531 which is an increase of £12,708 over last year and it will call for a rate demand of 2/6d. in the £. on the County County which is 8d. more than last year's demand.

The main heads of expenditure set out in the estimates, with last year's figures in brackets, were as follows: Pig Breeding £1,635 (£1,375); Instruction in Agriculture £27,126 (£21,022); Instruction in Horticulture £10,742 (£7,861); Instruction in Poultry Keeping and Farm Home Management £6,073 (£4,515); Scholarships £2,200 (£1,810); Administration £5,507 (£3,905); Fox Destruction Scheme £200 (£140) and Subscription to General Council £100 (£30).

There were no increases in the other items which remained as follows: Poultry Stations £18; Cattle Breeding £500; Sheep Breeding £500; Subsidies to Shows £345; Winter Farm Schools and Classes £650; Seed Potato Scheme £100; Special Fruit Tree Planting Scheme £100; Shelter Belt Scheme £300; Pigeon Control Scheme £100; Journals and Visual Aids £90 and Capital Outlay on new offices £2,145.

Presenting the estimate, Mr. Cadogan pointed out that they were only provisional and subject to a certain amount of guess-work which was not helped by the Bank strike. He said that last year they had a credit balance of £5,000 but had none this year as last year's estimate had been cut too fine and this balance together with the allocation of £3,000 for the capital outlay on the offices, which was not taken up, had to be spent to meet the cost of the other schemes.

Mr. Cadogan then went on to say that the rate demand which at present stood at 1/53d. in the £ would be increased by 8d. to meet the increased expenditure set out in the current estimates. This sudden increase was partly explained by the way they had cut last year's estimates to the bone which would have to be made up this year; salary increases which were not allowed for last year and an increase in the office staff with the appointment of an additional clerk-typist and a caretaker for the new offices.

However, he said that the main increase was due to the increases in the salaries of instructors which came to a sizeable sum. They were not hiding this fact nor did they want to hide it and his function and that of the C.A.O. was to see that they got value for the money spent and he thought it was good business to spend more money if it brought a better return and in this case he hoped this would be so as it would mean more production on the farms. 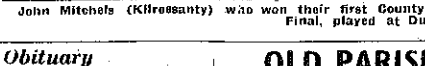

CASTLELYONS CREAMERY PLANS INTENSIVE ADVISORY SERVICE FOR SUPPLIERS IN BALLYDUFF-TALLOW AREAS

Plans to establish a more intensive advisory service for their suppliers in the Ballyduff and Tallow areas were referred to in a letter from Castlelyons Co-operative Creamery read at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday.

The letter which came from Mr. P. Healy, General Manager of the Creamery stated: "My Committee is interested in making a contribution towards a more intensive advisory service in the Ballyduff and Tallow areas covered by our Society. We have about 200 suppliers resident in Co. Waterford attached to these branches. An arrangement has been made by this Society with the Cork County Committee of Agriculture to give a more intensive advisory service to our Castlelyons, Conna, Ballincurry and Glenville branch areas. We are anxious therefore to extend a similar service to our two County Waterford branches."

Mr. G. Frost, C.A.O., said that when he got the letter a few days prior to the meeting he got in touch with Mr. Healy and with Mr. Barry, Chairman of the Society as he wanted to get them to name a figure in regard to the proposed contribution. They informed him that they would be unable to state this until they had a meeting of their committee and asked him to postpone consideration of the good thing then.

Mr. W. Dower said that he was sure that all members would agree to co-operate with the suggestion made by Castlelyons. Mr. Frost—It's a good thing and should be encouraged. In reply to a question by Mr. J. Quirk, the C.A.O., said the Castlelyons were asking them to provide the necessary instructions for the areas and they would pay a contribution towards the cost.

Mr. Frost told Mr. G. Heskin that these instructions would only service the area of the Creamery in Co. Waterford and there would be no overlapping with the Cork areas. Finally it was agreed to defer further consideration of the letter pending a detailed report from the C.A.O. which will be available for the next meeting.

OPEN IT QUIETLY SAYS MEMBER OF AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEE

SHEEPBREEDERS' DEPUTATION TELL OF HEAVY SHEEP LOSSES

Grey Back Crows As Bad As Foxes

They had got as incentive bonus from the Department to increase lamb numbers but with the great destruction being caused by foxes, the bonus was of little or no benefit, stated Mr. Michael Morrissey principal spokesman for a deputation from the County Waterford Sheepbreeders' Association which attended the monthly meeting of the Waterford County Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan on Monday.

The deputation were seeking an increase in the grant for the fox destruction scheme and an increase in the number of premiums offered for their annual sheep sale. Mr. Morrissey said that their Association had paid out £250 towards the eradication of foxes last year and they had received a grant of £20 from the National Game Council towards this. It was essential if they were to increase the sheep population that every thing be done to reduce the number of foxes and he asked for the co-operation of the lowland sheepbreeder in this as it was as much in his interest as of the mountain man.

Another pest, said Mr. Morrissey, which is causing as much destruction and loss to sheep producers is the grey back crow. They will kill off a new born lamb just as quick as any fox. Mr. Morrissey also referred to sheep losses caused by straying dogs and said that the law should be enforced so that all dogs would be tagged so that if they were either shot or caught their owners could be found.

UNIQUE ASSOCIATION

Mr. John Harrington another member of the deputation said that the Sheepbreeders Association had done its best for its members over the past 18 years and he thought they were unique not only in the county but in the country because they had contributed such a substantial amount towards the destruction of foxes. He was sure that only for this sheep losses in the county would be far greater. For funds they had to rely on an annual dance and other subscriptions and for this reason he said they would like the Committee to increase their grant towards the fox destruction scheme.

"We," said Mr. Harrington "have the best Sheepbreeders Association in Ireland here; now and sheep breeders from all along the west coast from Kerry to Donegal come to our annual sale and to help them we would like to see the number of premiums increased as they are all fully taken up every year."

INCREASED ALLOCATION

Mr. K. O'Ryan, Chairman, pointed out to the deputation that provision had been made in the Committee's provisional estimate for the coming year to increase the allocation for fox destruction from £140 to £200.

Mr. G. Frost, C.A.O., referring to the point about increasing the premiums said that he understood that no one had been injured down in this regard.

ST. PATRICK'S HOSPITAL—Much avoidable delay in carrying out the improvements at St. Patrick's Hospital has arisen from the failure of the H.M. installation contractors to proceed expeditiously with the work. The contractors have now resumed work and it is hoped to have this installation complete by the end of this week. This will allow the remainder of the building work to be resumed. It is proposed to put out to contract within the next two weeks the new drive and parking area. All of the approved alterations and improvements should be completed by March, 1971.

SALE OF LAND—ST. OTTERRAN'S HOSPITAL

It has been decided not to advertise the land for Public Auction for the moment. The position will be reviewed in one month.

ST. OTTERRAN'S HOSPITAL—NEW STORES AND KITCHEN

Approval has been sought from the Department of Health for the appointment of a consultant to advise on the planning of new stores and kitchen.

ARDKELLY HOSPITAL—GENERAL SURVEY

The appointment of a Consultant to carry out a general survey of ArdKelly Hospital to advise on improvements and alterations was recommended some time ago.

HOME FOR AGED, DUNGARVAN

The construction of a new Home for the aged at Dungarvan is at present out to tender. The closing date for the tenders is the 26th October.

COUNTY HOME—CONVENT

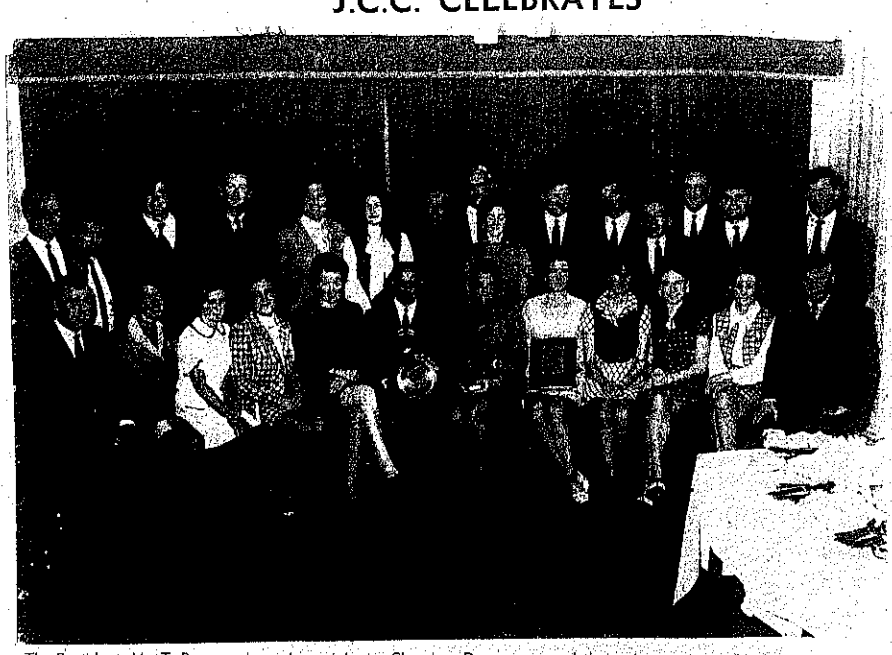
