### ELECTION TO REGIONAL HEALTH BOARD

By far the most important item on the agenda of the meeting of the Regional Health Board, which took place at the meeting of the Regional Health Board, was the election of two members of the Council to the recently established South-Eastern Regional Health Board. The matter in which the matter was approached proved to be very interesting and not only that but it also proved how fallacious is the idea that there are no politics practised at local level.

The Council's law adviser was present especially at the meeting to explain the procedure laid down by the act for the election of the members. The relevant section stated that: "(1) where, under rule 1, two or more members fall to be appointed to a health board at a meeting of a council of a county . . . they shall be appointed as follows:—(a) any group of councillors comprising the necessary number of councillors may nominate a councillor to be a member of the board and he shall be appointed on that nomination without any voting; (b) the remainder of the members of the board shall be appointed successively by a majority of the votes of the councillors who are not members of any group of councillors as aforesaid; (c) the number of councillors necessary to form a group for the purposes of this rule shall be obtained by dividing the total number of councillors present at the appointment by the number of members to be appointed, or where the number so obtained is not a whole number, the whole number next greater than the number so obtained; (d) no councillor shall be a member of more than one group."

Ordinarily there are 23 members on the County Council but there were two absentees from Monday's meeting—one from each of the two main parties—Mr. Hippocampus and Mr. Michael Harry (P.R.). This left a total of 21 members present so that in accordance with the rule the number necessary to form a group for the purpose of nomination was 11.

Of the 21 members present, 11 were members of the Fianna Fail party but they did not choose to form themselves into a group as they did not wish to be in the fact vote as a group in the election which followed. Fianna Fail wanted both vacancies for their party and had they formed themselves into a group they would only have obtained one as the other would have then been taken up by Fine Gael who could muster 10 including the lone Labour Party representative, Mr. T. A. Kynce for their group.

When Fianna Fail decided not to go into a group, the Fine Gael councillors were stymied and had once more to give way to the majority rule maxim.

During the election a member of the Fianna Fail party made a statement in which he said that he would have wished to see things divided differently but as he was tied to a political party he had no choice but to carry out the party line. This, of course, again points to the political undecidability which are continually making themselves felt.

### OUR HARBOUR

I think the sooner we realise that not only do we have a shipping hazard in the quay in Dunshinn, but also in the harbour itself, the better. Since the Urban Council, acting as the harbour authority, decided to allow shipping into one of the berths at the quay, two vessels have come up and both spent days snick in the channel before they were able to make it to the quayside.

The insurance coverage necessary to indemnify the Council and the town in the event of any damage to the shipping is very costly and this expenditure can hardly be justified as the harbour is already being run at a loss.

### GOVERNMENT RELUCTANCE TO CONSULT PUBLIC OPINION ON E.E.C. ISSUE

Dr. Hugh Byrne, T.D., speaking at the annual dinner of the Dungarvan Branch Fine Gael at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan, last Sunday night, said that as in so many other important areas, the present Government had failed in its duty to stimulate public discussion of the developments which were taking place in the E.E.C. area, and had shown a marked reluctance to let the people in on the developments which were taking place in the E.E.C. area.

The Fine Gael Party, viewed with considerable concern the readiness of the present Government to close down or downgrade a number of rural hospitals with a view to concentrating hospital services in large urban centres. It was becoming increasingly difficult to get doctors to stay in rural areas and it would become impossible if they were to become even more remote from hospital facilities.

EXTORTIONATE PRICES. One of the greatest scandals of our time was the extortionate prices which had to be paid for housing sites particularly close to towns and cities. These prices were one of the principal factors which contributed to Ireland having the lowest output of houses in Europe. Money which should have been used to build bricks and mortar was having to be paid for land before building could even start.

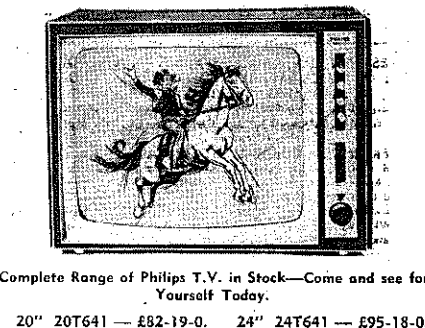
