PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

THE REALITY OF POLITICS
 Those who enter politics must be prepared to take the rough with the smooth and must be prepared to smile as much in defeat as in victory. Politics knows no sympathy and the records at all levels show that no matter how well or how self-sacrificing a man may serve he is always subject to the whim of the public and to the swing of the political pendulum.
 This is not the first time that such thoughts struck me but they came to mind again this week when I read a report of last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council and saw where a man who had served the Council well in a particular field of activity for close on a quarter of a century was toppled. He was toppled, not because of any inability on his part to fulfil the duties required by the office, but because it was thought politically expedient to replace him.
 As I have said this is an accepted part of the game of politics and any man who cannot take it both ways would be well-advised in the first instance to give nothing to do with it.
 What took place, at last Monday's meeting of the County Council was all in order and the party with the numerical majority was quite within its rights in pressing its advantage. These are the ups and downs of the game.

A WORD OF THANKS
 I have been asked by the Committee of St. John's Special School in Dungarvan to express their grateful thanks to the many kind-hearted people throughout the region who subscribed to their annual church gate collection which was held last May.
 It may seem a bit belated to do this now but the fact of the matter is that due to the Bank Strike which intervened it was not possible for them to assess the overall position until now. However, where matters like this are concerned it is always better late than never.
 The Secretary of the Committee has informed me that the final figures for the collection totalled £1,506-17-8 but this does not include the Kilrossanty collection, details of which have not yet come to hand. Dungarvan with £317-1-7 headed the list and then in order of merit came Ardmore with £108-14-0, Cappoquin with £100-10-3, Ballyduff Upper with £100 and Ballinacorney with £90. Stradbally 874, Kilmacomogha 682-5-0, Ballymacarbery, Tallow and Clashmore £65 each, Modeligo 644-4-9, Kilgobbin 630-14-6, Touraneena 555-7-0, Ring and Old Parish £44 with an additional £24-4-3 from the Church of Ireland collections at Lismore and Cappoquin.

COUNCIL CALLS FOR AMENITY GRANTS FOR SMALL SEASIDE RESORTS
Extension Of Ardmore Pier Would Cost £3,000
 Arising from a proposal by Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, seconded by Mr. P. Kennedy at the quarterly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday that Ardmore Pier be modernised and extended to meet existing requirements and that landing facilities for small boats be provided on the beach west of the pier, the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Halley, stated that he estimated the cost at £3,000 and added that this figure could be exceeded when an examination of the pier had been carried out.
 Mr. Curran — They have been pressing for this in Ardmore for the past five years.
 Mr. N. Walsh said that it would be more honest to tell the people of Ardmore the truth and that the Council had no money to carry out such schemes.
 Mr. Curran — I was hoping to submit a resolution to the General Council of County Councils calling on the Minister to introduce a scheme of amenity grants for the development of small seaside resorts.
ROAD AT GLENCORRIN
 When Mr. S. Whelan asked for a report on the present position of the road at Glencorrin, Old Parish, the Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling, stated that a letter had been sent to the Solicitor representing Mr. Mansfield whose wall had collapsed on to the road to have it cleared.
 Mr. P. Kennedy said that it was a disgrace that this position was allowed to carry on for so long. This public road had now been blocked since last January.
 Mr. N. Walsh — Whose responsibility is it to have it cleared?
 The Secretary said that the Council could do it at an estimated cost of £360 and then charge Mr. Mansfield. He read a copy of a letter sent to Mr. Mansfield's Solicitor on October 20 pointing out that unless the road was cleared within two weeks the Council would use its statutory powers to have the work carried out.
 Mr. Whelan said that while he agreed the job was a big one at the same time he felt it was unfair to have the road closed to the public since last January.
 Mr. C. Curran, Chairman — The local farmers can't get on to the beach there to draw beach materials because it is blocked.
 The County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Halley said that if they did not get a satisfactory reply within the next three or four days he would move in and have the road cleared by the Council staff.
 This was unanimously approved by the Council.

CALL FOR LEGAL ADVICE ON UCC ELECTION BY FINE GAEL MEMBERS OF CO. COUNCIL

CHAIRMAN ACCUSED OF HYPOCRISY

The right of the Chairman to use his casting vote in the matter of the election of a representative on the Governing Body of University College, Cork, for the next three years was questioned amid a storm of protests by the Fine Gael members on Waterford County Council at the Council's quarterly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday. Two members of the Council had been nominated for the position; Mr. Michael Harty (F.G.) who has been the Council's representative on the Governing Body of the University for the past 25 years and Mr. Sean Whelan (F.F.) who was contesting the position for the first time.
 Proposing Mr. Harty's re-election, Mr. Norman Walsh (F.G.) pointed out that Mr. Harty had been the Council's representative for close on 25 years and that in itself was a record which any man could be justly proud of. He said that Mr. Harty had proved an outstanding success in politics and that the years he had done all he possibly could for the welfare of the students from the county at the College.
 Calling on the Council members to remove the election from the realm of politics and to approach the matter in an objective manner, he said that the greatest tribute which they could now pay to Mr. Harty for the wonderful and dedicated manner in which he had filled the position was to again return him unanimously.
 Mr. M. J. Shalloe (F.G.) seconded the proposal.
 Mr. W. Kennedy, T.D. (F.F.) proposing Mr. Whelan said that he endorsed all that had been said about Mr. Harty but having been democratically elected as they were it had been agreed by his party that they should contest the election and that Mr. Whelan should be the party's nominee.
 Mr. C. Curran (F.F.), Chairman, seconded the proposal.
 Mr. Walsh again appealed for unanimity but the Chairman said that there was nothing he could do as he had received two proposals.
 A recorded vote was then taken and resulted as follows:
 For Harty — Messrs. Desny, Dwyer, Harty, Coffey, Gough, Hester, Walsh, Dunphy, Harry, Shalloe (all F.G.) and Kynne (Lab.)—11.
 For Whelan — Messrs. Curran, Kennedy, P., Whelan, Foley, Kenneally, P., Ahern, Dowd, Quinlan, Cahill, Keane, Kennedy, W., (all F.F.)—11.
 The other Finna Fail member, Mr. K. O'Ryan who is at present recuperating after an operation was unavoidably absent from the meeting.

UNAMBIGUOUS
 When the Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling declared an equality of votes as the result, Mr. N. Walsh was again on his feet to ask whether in such a case affecting a trifling election, the Chairman had a casting vote.
 Secretary — Yes.
 Mr. Walsh — Are you sure?
 Mr. Dowling said that Section 52 of the Local Government Act gave the Chairman a casting vote in such an eventuality and he quoted the relevant section of the Act.
 Mr. Walsh — Did you get legal advice on this matter?
 Secretary — No.
 Mr. Walsh — Did I not speak to you about this during the week?
 Secretary — Yes, but there was no doubt as the general law covering the matter is unambiguous.
 Mr. Walsh — Well we're not satisfied with that.
 Chairman — You're entitled to contest it in law if you wish!

The loss of full back T. Kennedy who was sent off for striking an opponent in the 21st minute usurped momentarily St. Molleran's fluidity.

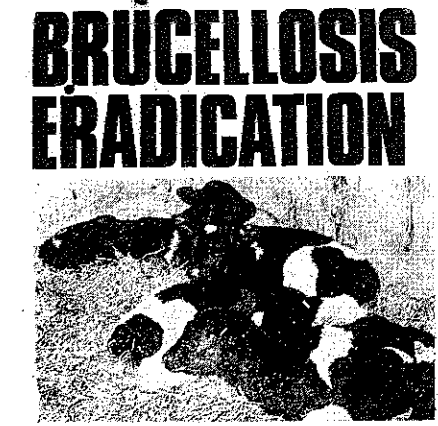

As from 5th November, 1970. FEMALE ANIMALS OF 12 MONTHS UPWARDS AND BULLS OF 9 MONTHS UPWARDS MAY NOT BE MOVED INTO THE BRUCELLOSIS CLEARANCE AREAS COUNTIES ROSCOMMON, LONGFORD, WESTMEATH AND MAYO AND COUNTY LOUTH UNLESS THEY ARE
(a) moving under permit direct from a Brucellosis (Certified) Herd, a similar herd in the Six Counties or a clear herd in the Disease Free Area (Counties Donegal, Sligo, Leitrim, Cavan and Monaghan) OR
(b) accompanied by an official certificate that each has passed a brucellosis test within the previous 14 days OR
(c) moving under permit direct to a registered slaughtering premises, or to a destination outside the area.

TIED TO BED

Foley was a farmer residing alone in a lonely area and around 4 a.m. four men burst into his house and the old man was tied to his bed.

BEYOND DOUBT

A Jim Fleming goal in the 20th minute really put the issue beyond doubt with Ferrybank now holding an unassailable ten points lead (6-4 to 2-6). An Abbeyside goal per Greg Fives who moved to attack in the closing stages put a more respectable look on the scoreboard, but there is no denying the fact that the title rests where it most deservedly belongs.

STALENESS

Abbeyside, despite their scores were showing the effects of their recent spate of outings and there was clear evidence of staleness, especially in attack where as early as the third minute Micky Fives missed an open goal when placed by Landers. Two more golden chances were squandered by opponent full-forward Aidan Barron, one in particular in the 16th minute when he was allowed run through to collect a perfect pass from Micky Fives only to completely miss the ball with a hesitant Ferrybank keeper at his mercy.

MORE OMINOUS

The signs became more ominous as the minutes ticked by and it became more evident that the Villa side had lost their appetite for the game. Too many games had blunted their sharpness. There were a few exceptions but once Ferrybank crept into the lead with a soft score, a Michael Hollins goal direct from a sixty yards free in the 23rd minute the writing was on the wall. A further goal and a point by Jim Fleming left Ferrybank five points clear at the interval and when Donal O'Meara crashed home another goal five minutes after the restart it was clear that Abbeyside were now fighting a lost cause.

CANNOT FEEL PLEASED

The victory apart, Waterford cannot feel too pleased about their performance in a sub-standard game played in dull conditions. Considering the fact that Laois, who beat Waterford at the same venue last year, were short four of their best forwards, one can easily judge the demerits of Waterford's display.

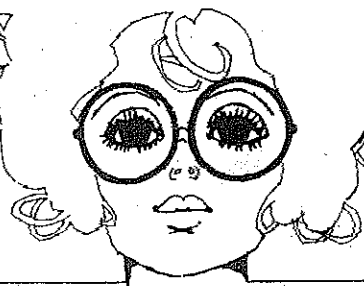
