## PENSMAN takes you Behind the Spotlight

### SIXES AND SEVENS

One could possibly be excused for saying that the monthly meeting of the Waterford Health Authority held in Dungarvan last Monday night was one which was pregnant with possibilities even before it occurred. It provided a further round in the controversial issue about the future role of the local District Hospital but in the final analysis the end result of all the discussion that took place seems to be one of continuing confusion.

A well organised deputation, over fifty strong, fully represented the meeting and there was no lack of able speakers. The discussion went on for quite a long time but the report of the proceedings published elsewhere in this issue, would tend to indicate that most of those who expressed views were at sixes and sevens with each other.

As I understand it, the members of the deputation were not only seeking a new modern maternity unit for Dungarvan but they also wanted to ensure that the District Hospital would continue to function for the future in the same manner as it has been doing up to the present. As a matter of fact I do not think I would be wrong in saying that the latter was, for many, the most important aspect of the matter. They want to ensure that there will be no interference with the existing surgical facilities as they now exist at the hospital and that the operating theatre and ancillary services will be allowed to continue to function there.

However, the item as officially listed on the agenda for the meeting was simply stated as "Maternity Unit, Dungarvan" and it was on this basis that many members of the Health Authority approached the problem. The letter from the Department of Health, read at the meeting, agreed that a maternity unit was required for Dungarvan and suggested that it should be located on the top floor of the District Hospital, the space which at present houses the dental surgery ward and the operating theatre.

This was the thin edge of the wedge as far as the deputation was concerned as the discontinuance of the operating theatre would put an end to the cause for which they have been fighting. However, this issue remained clouded throughout the discussion under the banner of the location of the maternity unit, although it was clearly stated in the Department's letter and by the County Manager during the course of the discussion that surgical facilities at the hospital would cease as soon as the hospital system in the county and city became rationalised.

I feel sure, as did a number of the Health Authority members when the meeting proceeded after the deputation had withdrawn, that the members of the deputation, left, rightly or wrongly, under the impression that they had won the battle and that not only would sanction be sought for the erection of a new prefab maternity unit but that there would be no interference with existing accommodations at the hospital and, most important of all, that present surgical facilities would be continued and even further developed there.

It was at this stage that the position crystallised when the question of the fight to secure the Regional hospital for Waterford city was mentioned. The mem-

### A PRIVILEGE AT £1 MILLION

Ireland has won much international praise as a small nation which has played a big role in U.N. Peace-keeping duties. Units of the Irish Army have had for a long number of years tours of duty in the Congo and in Cyprus where they are still engaged. The maintenance of peace around the world is a very noble cause but it should be sacrifice enough for a small country like Ireland to provide troops without also having to pay for the privilege of carrying out these peace-keeping duties.

In the Daily last week, the Minister for Defence in reply to a question as to whether the United Nations have been paying the amount due to this country for the Defence Force personnel engaged in peace-keeping in Cyprus and the Middle East stated: "Claims made on the United Nations to date in respect of participation of members of the permanent Defence Force in peace-keeping duties in Cyprus amount to £2,570,877-18-10d. and of this £2,162,004-9-3d. has been paid leaving a balance of £408,872-12-7d. The question of the repayment of this outstanding amount is being pursued vigorously with the United Nations."

In the course of supplementary questions the Minister admitted that this rather hefty "outstanding amount" has been outstanding for "about 12 months."

I think that it is nothing short of a scandal that Irish taxpayers who already have so much to contend with because of our own domestic economic problems should have to carry a debit of this nature on behalf of the United Nations. Surely it should be more than enough to provide men besides also having to make financial sacrifices to maintain them to preserve peace around the world.

## DUNGARVAN VISIT OF IRISH HEART FOUNDATION—MEDISCAN UNIT

The Irish Heart Foundation Mediscan Unit will be in Dungarvan from Thursday 3rd December to Monday 7th December.

The screening project is designed to identify persons who are at risk of heart disease, so that their doctors may be informed and treatment prescribed.

It is the first project of its kind in the world to help persons to avoid heart disease. It is intended to screen ONLY MEN in the age group 30-60 years at this time.

The Mediscan Unit will be located at ARUS BRUGH, Dungarvan.

The screening, which is FREE, takes approximately 15 minutes and includes blood test, electrocardiogram and a questionnaire.

WHAT TO DO

If you wish to be screened the appointment system is as follows:

Ask your local doctor for an appointment card.

Fill in the card and return it to Miss M. Clancy, Assistant County M.O.H. Office, Arus Brugh, for appointment.

This centre will operate from Friday, 27th November, 1970.

Detailed analysis of each check will be sent to the subject's doctor in approximately four weeks. Only doctors referrals will be screened, so it is necessary to ask your doctor for an appointment card.

The Mediscan Unit is a direct result of the support received from Dungarvan and other centres throughout the county.

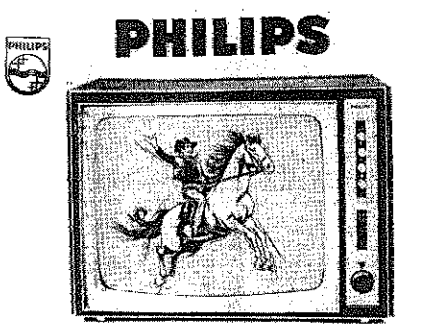

Mr. Rev. Dean Day said that in the rationalisation of hospitals he felt that the right place for the Regional Hospital should be in Waterford but that did not invalidate the claim of Dungarvan.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor, County Manager, replying to the points raised said that it was extremely important in the assessment of the situation that the separate issues be identified and unless they did this there was a tremendous danger that the overall issue would become clouded.

The first issue was the provision of a maternity unit and he said that there was a 100% agreement between the Health Authority and the Department that Dungarvan needed a modern maternity unit.

The only issue to be decided was one of location and he thought this could be left aside for the moment. He was not his role to decide the Department, he said, but he referred to proposals for a new unit approved by the Department first in 1954 and later in 1966 which the Health Authority did not go ahead with.

In regard to the District Hospital, the Manager said that he wanted to say here and now that there was no question whatsoever of closing it. This hospital had given very fine service over the years and its future role was clearly identified in the Fitzgerald Report.

Its role in future would be the same as it had been up to now with the exception of surgery. All surgical patients would be treated in future at Ardkeen where they had full up-to-date medical services and on discharge those in the Dungarvan area could return and be treated at the District Hospital.

The best long term solution to the problem said the Manager was the creation of a new pre-fab type maternity unit in the grounds of the District Hospital but if a short term solution was required he suggested that the 2 beds reserved for higher income group patients in the private rooms at the District Hospital be converted into maternity beds for lower and middle income group patients and the conversion of the surgery into a labour ward.

He added that when the new convent for the nuns was built near the County House the 5-6 beds now occupied by the surgery could be converted into additional maternity beds. In this way they would be able to maintain the existing bed numbers in the District Hospital.

In regard to the point raised as to whether the hospital M.O. had been asked for his views, the Co. Manager said that Mr. McCarthy was satisfied that he could not provide an adequate service in the 2 bed unit which was closed with the limited nursing facilities available to him. He concluded by saying that if the members felt a new maternity unit was required the officials would proceed as expeditiously as possible and added that there was no ulterior motives in the minds of the officials or the Department that the provision of maternity beds would mean the closing of the District Hospital.

DEPUTATION SPOKESMAN Principal speaker for the deputation who were then given an opportunity to make their case was Mr. Thomas P. Ryan, President, Junior Chamber, Dungarvan. He said that facilities at the District Hospital should be developed to provide surgical facilities other than for minor or intensive care cases; post-surgical convalescent beds and a 24-hour casualty service staffed and maintained by the present doctor plus the appointment of a full-time resident doctor to be supplemented by local G.P.'s on a rota basis for after hours calls.

Mr. Ryan also said that the District Hospital should be used for acute cases only and should be entirely divorced from maternity and geriatric responsibility.

INQUEST ON YOUGHAL GARAGE OWNER

A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that death was due to multiple chest injuries was returned by a jury at an inquest in Ardara on 19-year-old garage proprietor, Patrick J. Morrissey, Main Street, Youghal, who was fatally injured when his car was in collision with a lorry at Moor, Kinsalebeg, on October 31 last. Dr. D. J. McNamara, Ardara, said he carried out a post mortem examination on the deceased in Dunmore hospital and found that he had multiple injuries. In his opinion death was due to multiple chest injuries which the deceased had received. APPEARED DEAD Sgt. M. Fahy, Ardara, said when he arrived at the scene of the accident he saw the deceased in his car and he appeared to be dead at the time. Evidence of identification was given by Michael Morrissey, deceased's brother. When the jury retired they verdicted the deceased, Dr. Daniel Healy, Lismore, extended sympathy to the wife and family of the deceased. This was yet another tragic episode in the all too frequent road fatalities, he said. Supt. M. English, Dungarvan, Mr. Russell-Perry, Foreman of the jury, and Mr. E. P. King, solicitor (representing interested parties) associated themselves with the expression of sympathy.

TRADITIONAL MUSIC RECORD CLUB

A new traditional music Record Club has been established by Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann and in the first year will produce two L.P.s and one E.P. The idea of the new club is to give lovers of Irish traditional music an opportunity of purchasing records at bargain prices and in this way enable them to build up a household collection of the top artists in the traditional music field. The two L.P.s being offered to members of the Record Club are "Fleadh Cheoil '70" Lisacel and "Bonny Kate". The Fleadh Cheoil record will feature winners from the recent Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann and will be the first of its kind. It is hoped to make this an annual release and will be a valuable memento to those who attended the event and a concise impression of the competition standards for those who were not able to be in Lisacel. It was often felt in the past that the All-Ireland Champions were forgotten soon after the Fleadh Cheoil and did not get sufficient recognition and it is hoped the new record will in some way rectify this situation. The standards achieved at this year's event were considered to be exceptionally high and to have the winners from over 1,000 finalists on record will be considered a major break through. The second L.P., "Bonny Kate", will feature a cross section of some of the best performers of traditional singing and music. It will be varied in content, from as slow as will be in music the same mood as another very popular record, "The Standard of Kelly" which is still in great demand.

EMIGRATED TO AUSTRALIA

The E.P. "An Gairdeán Éireann" features four songs by singer, Eileen Begley, who comes from Ballynane, Co. Limerick. She is now in Melbourne, Australia, 12 months ago with her husband Vincent and baby daughter and reports that she has formed a branch of Comhaltas in Melbourne. She was a popular television performer and has emigrated with other members of the well-known Begley family who appear regularly on R.T.V. She was born in the town of Ballynane, Co. Limerick and was widely acclaimed for her singing style. It was on the night before she sailed for Australia that Comhaltas decided it would be a shame not to do something to perpetuate the cultural influence of the traditional scene and they recorded twelve songs on that night. "An Gairdeán Éireann" (four of these and it is hoped in the near future to release a further record with more of the songs.)

WHERE ARE ALL THE ARMBANDS GONE?

That's the question directed at parents by Mr. Robert Molloy, Minister for Local Government, in reminding them of the dangers faced by their children on the way to school on the dark mornings ahead. During the past two winters the Safety First Association, with the help of funds from his Department, has distributed reflective armbands for primary school children. "What happened to the thousands of pounds worth of armbands distributed as a matter of course?" asks the Minister. "Have these been lost or thrown carelessly aside, without a thought of the danger to children that lies ahead this winter? Mr. Molloy goes on to say that for those who have lost their armbands the Safety First Association has launched a further scheme this winter. Supplies of the armbands for children in primary schools can be obtained by the schools from the Safety First Association on payment of a nominal charge of 6d. per armband. The Minister urges parents and teachers to try to ensure that all children under their care wear reflective armbands, at least on the journey to and from school.

ACCOMPANY THE VERY YOUNG

Two further points for parents to note—very young children should not be allowed to go to school by themselves. See to it that they are accompanied by an adult or an older responsible child, if your child must cycle to school, make sure he has front and rear lamps and a clean reflector on his bicycle. "And then there's the driver" says the Minister. "He is at the other end of the tragedy when it happens, and it's no use a parent saying 'The driver can't help himself to keep out of this terrible situation by taking a few simple precautions. Drive that bit more slowly. Use dipped headlights while it is still dark. This will help you to see children and their reflective armbands. But please make sure that your headlights are properly focused. Again, winter mornings do see brightest easily and drivers should continue to use at least sidelights until daylight is well advanced."
