Ballysgaggart swallowed the bitter pill of defeat at the hands of Clonea on Sunday last. The victory was a bitter one for the Ballysgaggart team as they were crushed to Clonea-Power in a thrilling hurling final which produced a quota of excitement and interest.

Official Opening And Blessing Of New Committee Of Agriculture Offices In Dungarvan

PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY REFERS TO TREMENDOUS PROGRESS IN COUNTY WATERFORD

The new suite of offices of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture at Shandon, Dungarvan were officially opened and blessed on last Monday. The £35,000 premises contain a fully equipped kitchen, machinery workshop, a lecture hall-committee room and a full range of offices for the members of the advisory staff of the Committee. The premises were designed by Messrs. W. M. O'Dwyer and Associates, Architects, Dublin and was built by Messrs. E. O'Brien & Sons (Dungarvan) Ltd., Building Contractors.

The opening was performed by Mr. Jackie Fahy, D.P., Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries who was deputising for the Minister, Mr. J. Gibbons. The blessing was given in an ecclesiastical ceremony performed jointly by Mr. Rev. Dr. M. Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore; and Very Rev. Dr. Canon Clarke, Church of Ireland Rector, Dungarvan, who was deputising for Mr. Rev. Dr. J. Ward Armstrong, Bishop of Cashel, Emly, Waterford and Lismore.

A special feature of the new building is the painting in oils of the famous race horse "Delius" which was presented to the Committee by its former owner, Mr. Buddy Flahavan, KilmacThomas and which has been hung in the foyer of the building.

FARMERS HAVE PROBLEMS

In his address, Mr. Fahy said: "In the opening today of your new Headquarters and Farm Training Centre is most gratifying to me in my official capacity as evidence of your Committee's progressive outlook and in my personal capacity because I was involved in it when I had the honour to be your Chairman. It will give the young farmers in the Dungarvan area, an excellent chance to learn their profession under modern conditions."

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GOVERNMENT PURCHASES THREE BRITISH MINESWEEPERS FOR £600,000

Agreement has been concluded with the British Ministry of Defence for the purchase of three vessels of the Coastal Minesweeper class, the "Oulston," the "Alverson" and the "Blaston," built in the period 1954-1956. The cost of the ships with stores and equipment will be of the order of £600,000. The "Oulston" has been held in Reserve under civilian contract maintenance at Hythe while the other two are being in Reserve at Gibraltar under active Naval maintenance. The preservation of these vessels (i.e. bringing them forward from Reserve to an operational state) will commence in January, 1971, for the "Oulston" and in February for the remaining two. Essential retraining of personnel is already well under way and should be completed in mid-December. The first vessel is expected to be delivered in early February, 1971, and the remaining two in March, 1971.

CREW ACCOMMODATION

The hulls are a composite construction, fibre-glass sheathing on a nylon base and wood planking on an aluminium structure. The superstructure is of aluminium. The crew accommodation is somewhat more spacious than that of the corvettes while the furnishings and lay out are far superior.

MINISTER'S INCREASES FALL VERY SHORT, SAYS N.F.A.

The increases granted by the Minister to remove the threat of differential system of payment for creamery milk. All interests in the dairying industry had voiced their objection to this system and it was regretted that the Minister did not accept this advice.

The timing system had been responsible for a serious crisis in the production of milk in 1970, as a result of which the industry was unable to fulfill very valuable outlets for dairy products on the world market. It was predicted that the cut-back in the future could amount to between eight and ten million gallons a year.

For 1971 all indications were that markets for selling dairy products were going to improve but the retention of the timed system would certainly further depress the production of creamery milk.

The statement said: "In the context of our entry into the European Community a timed system like this is against the Community's policy. It is very wrong that such a serious disincentive should exist to the producer from passing the 7,000 gallons level of production."

"There has been a complete ignoring of N.F.A. proposals with regard to quality milk. Unless we produce quality milk we cannot have quality dairy products which the world markets now dictate."

portable quality and assistance towards the provision of winter feed in hill areas etc.

The paragraph in Tuesday's Government statement on support prices for lambs was misleading.

"The Trade Agreement with Britain allows for the importation of 5,500 tons eligible for full British payment. Based on quantities exported to Britain in the current season we have no prospect of sending anything like the 5,500 tons and consequently our Government here will not be obliged to meet any deficiencies payment on lamb" the statement said.

The increasing of the best average by 6,000 acres is a step towards getting a much greater best acreage in the near future. This will eventually lead to the total sugar requirements of the country being produced on the farms of this country.

For 1969 the tonnage of sugar imported amounted to 33,500 tons which cost £1,165,900.

N.F.A. TURKEY SALES ARRANGEMENTS FOR 1970

The N.F.A. estimates that turkey numbers will be down by at least 80,000 this Christmas. This was stated by Michael Dillon, Chairman of the N.F.A. National Turkey Marketing Committee, at a press conference in Dublin to announce the programme for this year's expanded network of auctions.

Mr. Dillon said that while the total number of turkeys sold from Irish hatcheries from January to August was some 30,000 higher than last year, there was no backlog of frozen birds to concern with, as all supplies were cleared just Christmas. Last year a carry over of 100,000 frozen turkeys from the 1968 Christmas trade had to be disposed of. He felt that the decline in the turkey population this year would effectively establish a buoyancy in the trade, which would be a tremendous boon to the country's 500,000 producers.

Mr. Dillon said the N.F.A. provided convenient and efficient trading centres for the fresh turkey trade. The N.F.A. intended to consistently provide such markets for farmers who include turkey production as an integral part of their farming programme.

CERTIFIED SEED POTATOES

The Department of Agriculture and Fisheries remains farmers who are interested in growing seed potatoes for certification in 1971 to get in touch with the local Potato Inspector now about their proposals, especially about having the soil sampled for Potato Root Rot and worm and procuring suitable seed stocks, properly graded, for planting.

Potato crops are not eligible for inspection or certification unless the land on which the crop is grown has been sampled and the soil found to be free from Potato Root Rot and worm and the seed planted is from an approved source.

Information as to the conditions for certification and Forms of Application may be obtained from the local Potato Inspector or from the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (Section 21), Upper Merrion Street, Dublin 2.

On the proposal of Mr. P. Cahill, seconded by Mr. J. Keane, the Committee unanimously agreed to the application of the 12th round salary increase for all members of the staff.

LICENSING OF STALLIONS, 1971

Owners of stallions are reminded that, under the Horse Breeding Act, 1934, every entire horse foaled in or prior to 1969, whether used for stud purposes or not, must be licensed in 1971.

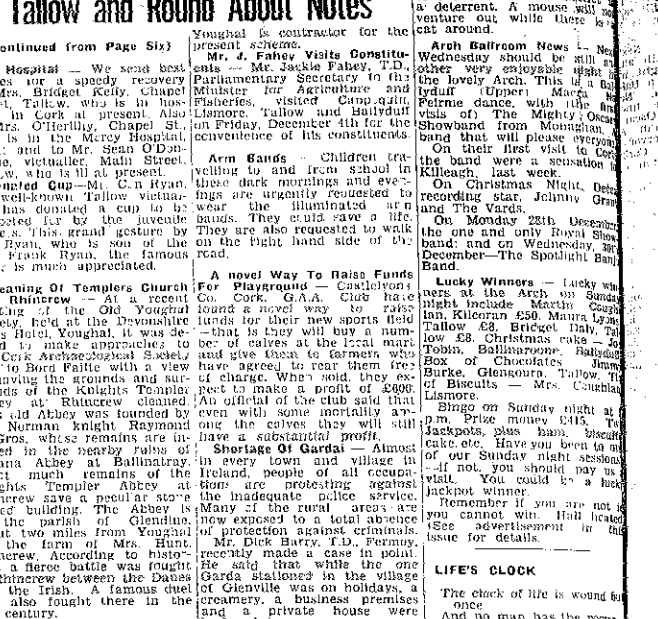

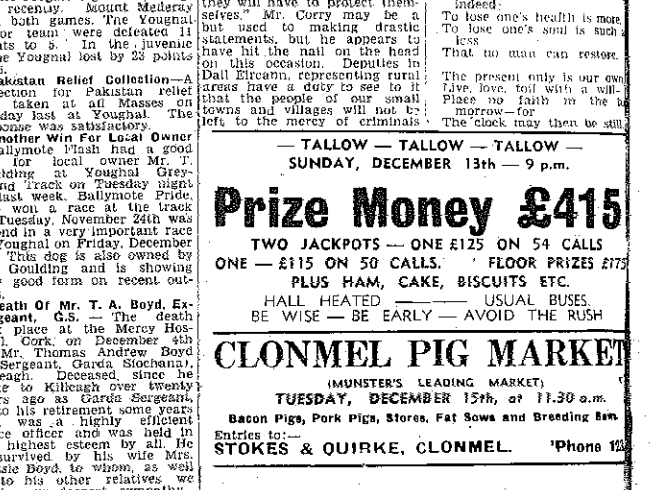

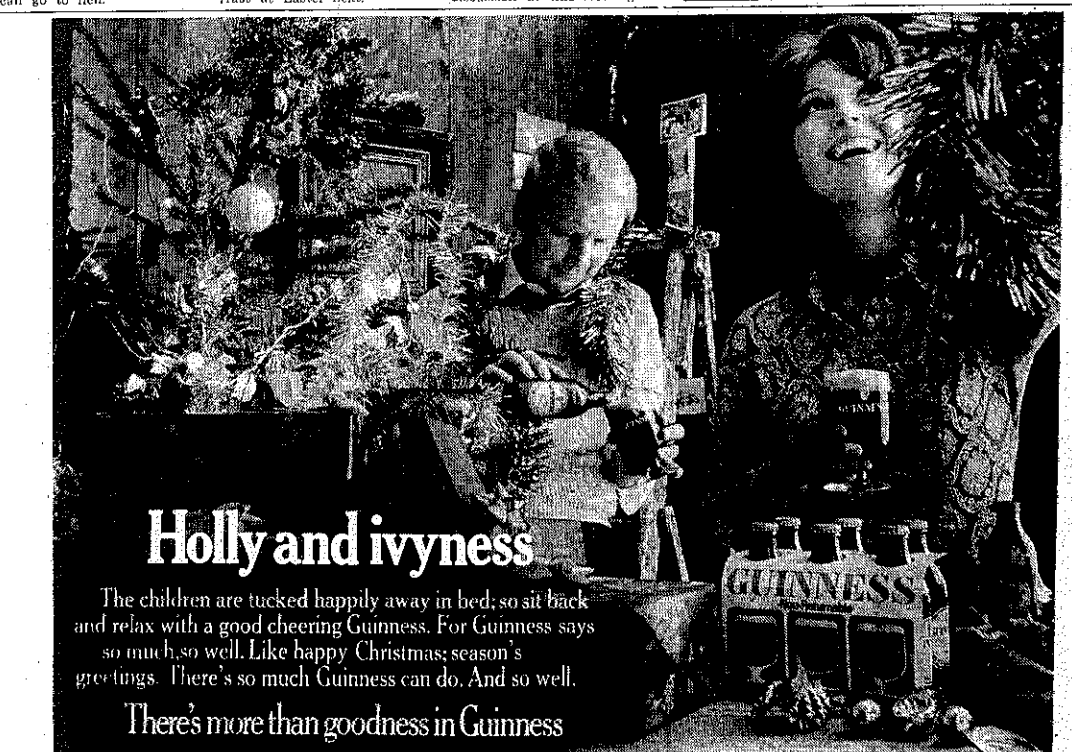
