A SERIOUS STEP
The Secondary teachers throughout the country have voted in favour of strike action if their demands are not met and unless these demands are granted the strike will commence on Tuesday next, February 2nd. This is a very serious decision and one which is bound to have the most serious and widespread repercussions.
Parents with children in secondary schools and especially those whose children are at present preparing for the Intermediate and Leaving Certificate examinations this summer are rightly concerned with the situation as it could well mean, in a big number of cases, that the studies and teaching of these children will cease with no indication as to when they may be resumed. It will also be a serious setback for the pupils who even at the moment are conscious of the uneasy atmosphere which exists and who naturally are bound to be upset by such a "stop-go" situation.
I am not going to go into the merits for the dispute but the whole position where the teaching profession and the Department of Education are concerned appears to me in a sorry state. If the Secondary teachers have grievances which they insist must be dealt with in isolation it puts the Department in a cleft-stick because to sooner will the Department have given into their demands than the Primary teachers will renege their claim and then the Vocational teachers will also enter the fray again.
I believe myself that all the present negotiations should be scrapped and an effort should be made to make a fresh start as otherwise if this present system of stop-fringeing allows to continue there can be nothing but constant upheaval and unrest. The teachers' organisations should attempt to rationalise their position so that the entire profession, at all levels, remains in harmony. At present there is only discord and it is difficult for the general public to understand how an intelligent, responsible body of men and women cannot come together and arrive at a common denominator.
In all this discord it is the children who suffer. This is not the first time that a dispute has broken out between the teachers' organisations and students' organisations. In the past, enough to be caught by the first fire in their Intermediate year are now finding themselves hampered in a similar manner in their Leaving Certificate year. This is what makes the lives and future careers of thousands of young boys and girls so frustrating and hampered by responsibility. They are merely the victims.
Even at this late stage perhaps there is still time for viceroy countable settlement can be reached and a break-down of our secondary educational system averted.

CHILDREN LEARN WHAT THEY LIVE

I am indebted to my friend Mr. Robert Aspell of Dungarvan for passing me a recent issue of his hometown paper in the U.S. Called "The Sunday Oregonian" (it was a Sunday edition) it contained a mere 225 pages made up in 12 sections. I have not as yet succeeded in getting through it all (how Americans manage to read these papers from day to day and still put in some work beats me!) but the following item in the magazine section caught my eye and as it sets out in a clear, uncomplicated manner, more helpful than most child psychology books in just 22 lines, how to help mould happy, healthy, well-adjusted young people of to-morrow I thought it worth reproducing. Titled "Children Learn What They Live" it has this to say:
If a child lives with criticism, He learns to condemn.
If a child lives with hostility, He learns to fight.
If a child lives with ridicule, He learns to be shy.
If a child lives with shame, He learns to feel guilty.
If a child lives with tolerance, He learns to be patient.
If a child lives with encouragement, He learns confidence.
If a child lives with praise, He learns to appreciate.
If a child lives with fairness, He learns justice.
If a child lives with security, He learns to have faith.
If a child lives with approval, He learns to like himself.
If a child lives with acceptance and friendship, He learns to find love in the world.
ABBESIDE CAUSEWAY BRIDGE

Waterford Health Bill: £2,336,365 Approved

WILL INCREASE COUNTY RATE 8/6 AND CITY RATE 7/6

After a further two hours session, the members of the Waterford Health Authority at their Estimates meeting in Dungarvan last Monday night unanimously adopted an estimate which will provide for a gross expenditure of £2,336,365 for the coming year. The original estimate provided for an expenditure of £2,457,300 and would have meant an increase of 15/11d. on the County rates and 15/5d. on the city rates. This included the liquidation of a debit balance of £126,935 but at Monday night's meeting the members decided to provide only £18,000 towards this debit balance and this reduced the overall rate increase on the County to 8/6d. and on the City to 7/6d.
The decision was not reached, however, until a proposal by Ald. T. Brennan that the agenda be adjourned until the Minister declared the amount of the Health Services and Special Grants to be made available for the coming year had been rejected by the Chairman, Mr. P. (Fad) Browne, T.D., on the grounds that it was illegal.
The meeting opened with Mr. F. Mongay, Acting Secretary, reading a copy of a letter from Waterford County Council sent to the Department of Health following their meeting on January 11 which stated that the Council had passed resolutions recommending that the Health Services Grant be made available should be of such amount as to ensure that the rate to be adopted would not exceed that passed for the current year as they could not recommend an estimate which would place an increase of almost 17% on the County ratepayers and urging on the Minister the importance of informing the Health Authority of the total amount of the grants to be made available for 1971/72.

FINAL REPORT FOR NEXT SUNDAY'S CONVENTION

The Annual G.A.A. County Convention will be held at the C.B.S. Hall, Dungarvan, on Sunday, January 31st. The programme from the mark the festive scene of the Association in the county of Mr. Deigan, who has been Secretary of the Board since 1938.

The Association was founded, not merely to promote and develop physical fitness, but to provide a means by which the Association could reach its full potential—namely, the organisation of native pastimes, our own games, for our own people.

What of the future—what are we really satisfied with our progress to date and do we feel ample scope to meet changing circumstances in the years which lie ahead. To day Ireland and the Association are at the crossroads. A momentous decision is about to be made, a decision which could shake the very foundations of everything which we stand for. I am aware that our Association reaches in to every corner of our country and has its roots in solid foundations. Our games have a national significance, doing something worth while and doing it voluntarily. It is important for us to preserve our national identity and to retain our principles.

The Association having espoused the gospel and affirmed allegiance to it, should be Gaelic first and last of the time.

During the year under review the prestige of the Association was well maintained. There was no apparent lack of interest or enthusiasm in our ranks. We had whole-hearted efforts to maintain the best Gaelic traditions throughout and the intensive measure of public support for our games and pastimes was as pronounced as ever.

From the point of view of our County Championships our teams were engaged as a whole in a previous year and in all played a total of thirty eight matches. We won an impressive number of titles, played our part as a solid unit of the Association. Pride of place, however, in my report must go to Pat Lanning, your County Chairman, who at the annual Congress in Galway was elected to the Presidency of the Association. GAME SMUGGLING IS RAMPANT SAYS N.F.A. People who are smuggling pheasants and poultry from Britain into this country...

N.F.A. PRESIDENT'S CALL AT DUNGARVAN SYMPOSIUM

There was no doubt that E.E.C. membership would give Irish farmers an immense opportunity to increase their incomes by efficient expansion of production if Ireland became a member of the Common Market. This was stated by Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the National Farmers' Association when he spoke at a symposium, organised by Waterford County Executive, Macra na Feirme in Dungarvan, on Friday night, 22nd January, on "Irish Agriculture in the E.E.C." Mr. Maher said that for the first time Irish farmers would have complete freedom to expand production on farms for which Irish farmers were suited.

Mr. Maher emphasised that E.E.C. membership would offer these opportunities but that considerable effort would be needed to realise these opportunities to the full. The total amount of the benefit which would be received from E.E.C. would depend on the efficiency at farm level, efficiency in the food production industry and the effectiveness of our marketing efforts both on the home market and on the export markets in other member States.

In the E.E.C., just as today, there will be no place for the inefficient creamery or bacon factory. Those who make maximum impact in the domestic and foreign consumer in the advertising of their products will earn the biggest premiums from the market.

There would be some increase in Irish farm costs. Fertiliser prices appeared, would be increased because of the increase in sulphates and potash by our own Government would be discontinued. Labour costs would tend to increase with increasing prosperity in some industrial sectors and also as a result of the increase in the cost of living involved in the application of E.E.C. agricultural prices.

This latter factor must not be exaggerated. The Government estimated that the effect of bringing Irish agricultural prices up to E.E.C. levels over 5 years would be to raise the cost of living by less than 1% per year over this period.

As far as farmers are concerned this kind of increase in living costs together with such increases in production costs, as well as foreign exchange, would be very small in relation to the increases in incomes. On the capital side there was no reason to expect any increase in machinery prices. Certain items which now carry import duties would be freed of these duties under E.E.C. membership conditions.

NEED FOR CAPITAL. Mr. Maher stressed that capital was now needed to bring about changes in agricultural structures and in the structures of the food processing industry. This capital would be raised by means of a new National Development Fund. This fund would be necessary to ensure the greatest benefits to this country from E.E.C. membership.

He added: "Now is the time to be carrying out this work. In 2 or 3 years time it will be too late. I call on the Government to make a positive affirmation of its intention not to let this opportunity slip."
