MATERNITY SERVICES

No doubts exist about the need for the urgent provision of a maternity unit for Dungarvan which will also serve many parts of West Waterford. There are doubts, however, as to what form it should take and where it is to be located until these are resolved there seems little hope of anything being done in the immediate future.

The Health Authority officials at one with the Minister and his officials in the Department of Health that the unit should be located in that part of the Dungarvan District Hospital which at present accommodates the operating theatre and the female surgical patients. But there is a big volume of local public opinion opposed to this proposal because it is felt that this is but the first step towards closing the hospital.

The County Manager has given an assurance in a public report saying that there is no question of closing the hospital. At the same time he has made it clear that the District Hospital can no longer be used as a centre for surgery and that all surgical cases must be transferred to Ardkeen.

There seems to be a certain amount of confusion in the minds of some people about the transfer of surgery to Ardkeen when it is assessed this move as the first step towards the total closure of the hospital. I think the County Manager's assurance should be accepted as I do not believe the hospital will be closed. At the same time I also accept, as the only feasible plan, that all surgery must be centralised in Ardkeen where all the facilities and specialists are readily available.

When people succeed in looking on the provision of a maternity service in Dungarvan and the continuation or transference of surgery from the local hospital as two different problems the sooner will solve the more urgent of the two at the present time; the establishment of a proper maternity unit to deal adequately with the requirements of the town and district.

CIRCUIT COURT APPEALS

One Fails; One Succeeds

Two criminal appeals were made at Dungarvan Circuit Court before Judge Fawcitt on Tuesday, one of which failed but the other was successful.

In the first John Kier, a plasterer of Carrigrohane, Kilmactonus, appealed against a sentence of two months imprisonment imposed on him at Kilmactonus District Court on February 4, when he was convicted on a charge of assaulting Garda Anthony Doyle, and Eugene Power at Carrigrohane, Kilmactonus, on April 18, 1950.

Mr. E. Conynan, B.L., instructed by Mr. L. Langan (solicitor) was for the appellant, and Dr. D. R. Coughlan, State Solicitor, who prosecuted, stated that the defendant had been in a licensed premises in Ballymore on the night in question. After leaving it with a number of others he followed Garda Doyle who was not in uniform and two companions. They abused Garda Doyle and his companions and defendant then assaulted them without provocation. On the same night the defendant assaulted another man in a public house about four miles from where the first assault had occurred and had also been charged and convicted on this.

Superintendent M. Sillis, Tralee, said that the defendant had no previous record.

Mr. Conynan said he realised that this was a serious assault but he asked the Court to direct leniently with the matter.

Judge Fawcitt said that he would not interfere with the sentence imposed by the lower court which was on the light side and he was tempted to increase it. He said that he would not, however, and dismissed the appeal.

SUSPENDED SENTENCE

Patrick Mooney, 30, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, appealed against a sentence of six months detention in St. Patrick's Industrial School imposed on him at Dungarvan District Court on February 10, when he was convicted on charges of taking a motor-cycle, the property of Michael Walsh, Ballinacorney Cross, Ring, without the owner's consent and stealing a battery, two bulbs and a tool kit at Slonodon, Dungarvan on January 12.

Dr. D. R. Coughlan, State Solicitor, said that the defendant was a 17-year-old messenger boy who might not be very intelligent. He saw this motor cycle and took it and after driving it around let it back at another place later.

Superintendent M. English said that the defendant was living in a communal dwelling and his IQ was pretty low.

Mooney who was not professionally represented, said he was sorry for what he had done. It was the first occasion in a long time that he had got into trouble.

Judge Fawcitt then intimated that he was disposed to suspend the sentence. He warned the defendant that he would be back in 12 months time and if defendant behaved himself in the meantime he might keep suspending the sentence but he would not remove it for the present. He then directed that the defendant who was before the court in custody be released.

DEFENDANT WHO BEHAVED IN MOST APPELLING FASHION HAS JAIL SENTENCE ADJOURNED

Successful Appeal Before Circuit Court

A 35 year old married man, at present working as a haulier's labourer, appealed at Dungarvan Circuit Court last Tuesday against conviction and sentence of 6 months in jail on 4 charges of assault and larceny imposed on him at Cappoquin Court on July 23rd last.

He was Michael Merrigan, Rosary Place, Middleton, and Dr. D. R. Coughlan, State Solicitor, who prosecuted, told the Court that on May 5, last year, Merrigan hired a hackney car in Middleton and accompanied by his wife went on a tour which included visits to Aglish and Clashmore. They sat in the back seat of the car and drank wine from a bottle which they brought with them.

Dr. Coughlan said that the Merrigans called on a number of licensed premises and had a number of drinks and became intoxicated. At Clashmore a man named Michael Cowling who was in his 70's, was working in a field and Merrigan got out of the car and went into the field and sought to get Cowling to pay him a sum of money. Dr. Coughlan added that he could not say whether Cowling owed the money to Merrigan or not. Merrigan verbally abused Cowling and was eventually assaulted by Merrigan when he returned to the car to Aglish where he was viciously assaulted by the driver, Patrick Dunne. In this fight Dunne struck Merrigan a heavy blow as a result of which he had to be removed to hospital.

Dr. Coughlan then stated that when the charges were heard at Cappoquin District Court on July 23 the defendant was sentenced to 6 months when he was convicted on the charge of demanding money from Michael Cowling with menaces. He was sentenced to two further terms of one month for assaulting Cowling and Dunne, all the sentences to run concurrently.

When Mr. E. Morris, B.L., (instructed by E. A. Ryan & Co., Solicitors) who appeared for the defendant stated that they were appealing against the severity of sentence only, he was told by Judge Fawcitt, "This is a very serious offence and if the facts are as stated then I would be very hesitant. Mr. Morris if I were you to go on with this appeal."

Mr. Morris said that he thought there were extenuating circumstances and he added that he had received instructions to proceed with the appeal.

Judge—Very well, Mr. Morris, but you have been warned.

INFERIORITY COMPLEX

Dr. A. Grayson said that he was Senior Psychiatrist attached to a Cork hospital to which the defendant was admitted in May 1950 in a state of acute alcoholic intoxication. From a number of examinations he formed the opinion that the defendant could easily be influenced and easily led. He also suffered from an inferiority complex which could be the reason for his drinking. He added that he

Michael Merrigan was then called to the witness box and said that the first thing he would like to do was to apologise to Mr. Cowling and Mr. Dunne for what he had done. He asked the Court to give him another chance. On each of the previous occasions on which he had got involved in trouble he had been drinking heavily but he had now turned over a new leaf and had taken the pledge and was working in a steady job.

Mr. Morris suggested that his lordship might suspend the sentence or adjourn the case for 12 months to give the defendant a chance to take the treatment as suggested by the Psychiatrist.

Judge Fawcitt said that the defendant had behaved in a most appalling fashion in demanding money from an unfortunate farmer while his subsequent behaviour was beyond thinking. However, he said that he thought there was a glimmer that treatment might be able to do something for the defendant, and although he was doing it against his will he said he would adjourn the matter for 12 months but added a warning to the defendant "if at that time the report about you isn't as I hope it will be I will double each of the sentences imposed on you and there will be no further chances."

WEST WATERFORD AMBULANCE SERVICE TO BECOME A REALITY

Success For Mr. Quirke's Agitation

An ambulance service for West Waterford will shortly become a reality and so bring to a successful conclusion an agitation which Mr. J. Quirke, Ballyduff, started twelve months ago and persisted at in the intervening period.

At the monthly meeting of the Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan last Monday night, the Acting Secretary, Mr. P. P. Monaghan stated that negotiations were proceeding for the establishment of a unit of the Order of Malta in Lismore. He said that five people in the area had indicated their interest in the project and they would form the nucleus of the new unit. A vehicle was available for use in the service and when training was completed an ambulance service would then be provided by the Order.

Mr. Quirke said that it was now twelve months since he first raised this matter of the necessity of an ambulance service for West Waterford and he was glad to see now even after such a long period that something was at last being done. He said that the doctors in the area were doing a great deal of work to have the service established especially Dr. Donovan, Ballyduff, who had already got three volunteers for the service in Ballyduff and had got some more this week.

"This service," said Mr. Quirke, "is long overdue in the area and I would like to see it get off the ground now. I propose here and now that the vehicle be provided to start the service off."

Mr. H. R. Dowd, seconding congratulated Mr. Quirke for at last achieving what he had set out in his mind. He also thanked the doctors of the area for their co-operation.

The proposal was passed unanimously.

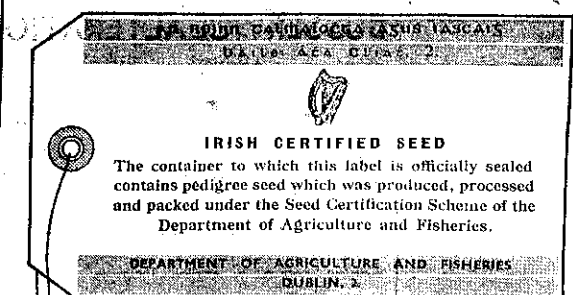

Book Review THE THIRD WORLD WAR by Jerome Connolly

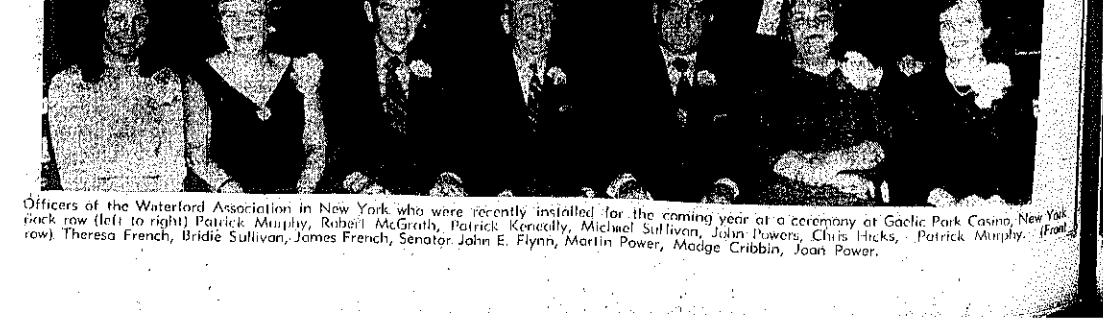

CIRCUIT COURT AWARDS FOR MALICIOUS INJURY IN DUNGARVAN

At Dungarvan Circuit Court before Judge Fawcitt on Wednesday last, Cornelius Roche, Gents Hairdresser, Mary Street, Dungarvan, was granted a decree for £10 with costs and expenses against Waterford County Council in his malicious injury claim for damage to the electric barber's pole outside his premises.

Applicant in evidence said that on Monday night, January 18 his next-door neighbour called him and drew his attention to sparks coming out of the electric pole. He removed the fuse and when he examined the pole the following morning he found that the cable connecting it had been forcibly ripped out. He reported the matter to the Gardaí.

Maurice Kiehl an electrician in evidence said that he repaired the damaged pole. It took considerable pressure to remove the cable and he formed the opinion that someone passing by swung out it.

Judge Fawcitt said he was satisfied the act was malicious and he granted the decree and made it a County at large charge.

The application was moved by Mr. E. Conyn, B.L. (instructed by Mr. L. F. Langan, Solicitor).

CLAIM FOR DAMAGED SHOT GUNS. Incidents in which a number of young men and members of the Gardaí were involved in Dungarvan on the night of June 18 last were recalled when Colum Moloney, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, claimed £71.55 against Waterford County Council for malicious damage to two shot guns taken from his shop.

Mr. E. Conyn, B.L. (instructed by Mr. Langan, Solicitor) for the applicant said that the applicant's store was raided by a number of young men and two guns taken and when the police arrived the guns were used to do battle with them and the stocks and barrels were damaged.

Christopher Keenan an employee of the applicant said that at about 8 p.m. on June 18 last he was called by a person who said that a plate glass window in the shop door was broken. When he got there there was a big crowd in the street and the Gardaí had arrived. He inspected the shop and found missing.

Sgt. M. Hayes said that 3 youths broke into Moloney's store that night and two of them armed themselves with shotguns and came out to the street and attacked the Gardaí. He also attempted to strike the Gardaí and the guns were damaged in the fight.

Judge Fawcitt said he was fully satisfied that the damage in this case was not only malicious but was wantonly done and that the guns had been used in an attempt to drive off the Gardaí who appeared very quickly on the scene and carried out arrests.

He congratulated the Gardaí for their speedy arrival at the scene and for their able handling of the situation. He gave an award for the full amount claimed with costs and expenses and made it a County at large charge.

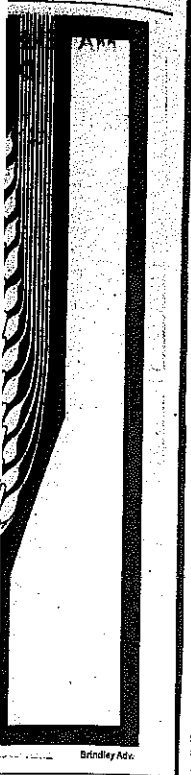

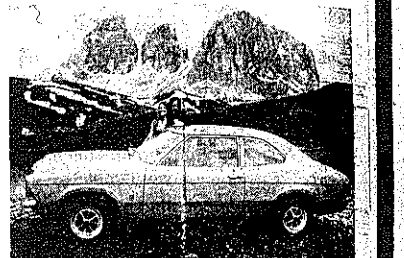
