IT WILL NOT CLOSE
How can you get it across to people who apparently have closed their eyes and their ears to the facts that certain fears which assail them, though they may be genuine, are completely unfounded. And what do you do to convince people from these fears are not reasonable and require to be changed?

As from the very beginning, the confused thinking which has been part and parcel of the problem of the status of the Dungarvan District Hospital and the provision of maternity services for the town and district showed itself to be as confused as ever when the matter was once again discussed at a special meeting of the Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan last Friday night.

A strong deputation, mainly female, crowded into the Council chamber for the meeting which was held in the evening and was fully representative of the people of Dungarvan and West Waterford and spoke on their behalf in regard to the problem.

However, if this claim is to be justified how then was it that various speakers on behalf of the deputation did not speak with one voice even with a singleness of purpose and idea? One speaker would say for nothing less than a new maternity unit and a full surgical service at the District Hospital, another was prepared to accept the decision that all surgery be transferred to Ardkeen and that the hospital beds be used for medical cases and convalescent patients only who yet another wanted to keep the operating theatre at the hospital rather than provide a proper casualty department at the hospital.

During the meeting a letter was read from the Minister for Health which suggested as the best short-term solution for the provision of a maternity service, the substitution of maternity beds for surgical beds at the District Hospital. In this letter the Minister exceptionally stated: "I am writing to confirm that there is no question of closing the District Hospital or of reducing the number of beds already operating."

And yet despite this and the fact that it has been stated so often before, Mr. William Kennedy, T.D. has been along some time later during the discussion at the meeting and expressed the view that the District Hospital should run full and busy and that the Dungarvan District Hospital is not going to be closed and that people could understand that and for all!

But as I have said already, what do you do to convince people who apparently want to listen only to their own voices or who will be satisfied with nothing less than their own demands.

Dungarvan Can Make Very Strong Case To Be Retained As Urban Authority

DISCUSSION ON GOVERNMENT WHITE PAPER
In a preliminary discussion on the Government White Paper on Local Government Reorganisation held last Monday night, the County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor expressed the view that a very strong case can be made for the retention of Dungarvan as an Urban Authority in any future set-up. It was decided that a further study of the reports submitted by the Town Clerk should be made by the members and that the matter will again be discussed at a meeting to be held on Monday, March 29.

The Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson, submitted two reports which placed before the members extracts from the White Paper covering (1) aspects which referred to the future roles of Town Commissioners and Urban Councils and (2) the implications for Dungarvan as far as the White Paper was concerned.

Mr. O'Connor said that he was completely against any suggestion to abolish Urban Councils because of his experience of the fact that the local Urban Council had done a tremendous job and it would be a pity to see it going.

As a councillor he said his experience was that he was running his feet in trying to keep up with local complaints. He was sure all the other members of the Council had the same experience and they were doing all this work in their spare time. He felt that the major reason for this being done was that there was no information service provided for the public through which they could find out what their rights were and consequently people had to go to their councillors instead of finding things out.

Mr. Deasy said that he had in fact done a job which was never intended to do, but what would happen if the local Urban Council was abolished and the public representation of the Dungarvan area was reduced to two or three members? It would mean a reduced service for the people and that is a very serious matter and any proposal to abolish it.

Mr. Deasy then said that a united authority might not be the best thing either as the interests of the people of town and country were not always compatible. He asked whether rural communities could benefit from industrial development. This might result if one had to pay for the services of the

SAVING ON RATES
Mr. Deasy referred to a point made in the White Paper that up to 9% in the 5 could be saved if Town Commissioners and small Urban Councils were done away with and asked what the saving would be if Dungarvan Urban Council was done away with and the services taken over by the County Council.

Mr. Robinson replied that at present the urban rate was only slightly over the county rate and the result would be the saving of a few pence only. He said that he was preparing a table setting out the comparisons but had not yet completed it. As soon as he had finished he would have it circulated to the members.

Mr. D. Goode said that he agreed with all Mr. Deasy had said. It would be a travesty of justice to have the urban councils abolished he said as this would be taking away their rights as a democratic people.

Mr. T. Kyne, Chairman, said that as far as he could see the outlook for the future of over Dungarvan Urban was very gloomy. If Town Commissioners for towns of up to 8,000 population

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Deputation Again Rejects Proposals For Dungarvan Maternity Unit

FEARS THAT HOSPITAL WILL BE CLOSED ARE UNFOUNDED

We have discussed this problem several times already and no acceptable proposal has so far evolved said Mr. C. A. O'Connor, Co-Manager, at a special meeting of Waterford Health Authority in Dungarvan last Friday night when discussion on the provision of a Maternity Unit for Dungarvan adjourned from the previous meeting was resumed. A deputation, about 50 strong and predominantly female attended the meeting and a number of spokesmen addressed the members.

At the outset, the Chairman, Mr. P. (Fad) Browne, T.D., said that on the instructions received at the last Health Authority meeting the three deputes from the constituency approached the Minister for Health concerning the District Hospital in Dungarvan and the provision of a Maternity Unit. They did have the interview with the Minister and when he said the Minister had addressed a letter to him as Chairman of the Health Authority in which the position of the District Hospital was spelt out in clear tones.

We are trying our best to adhere to the request of the deputation, he said, and I want to assure you that we are trying all the way but at the same time I think if we press the matter too hard I can visualize something might happen as far as our claim for the Regional Hospital for Waterford is concerned. 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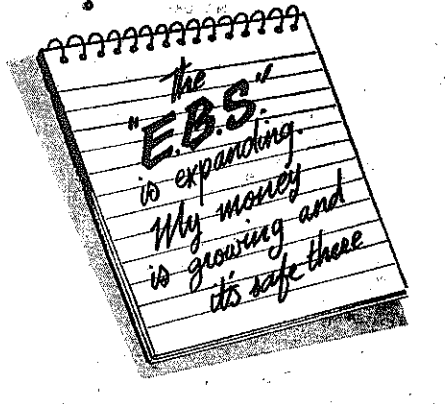

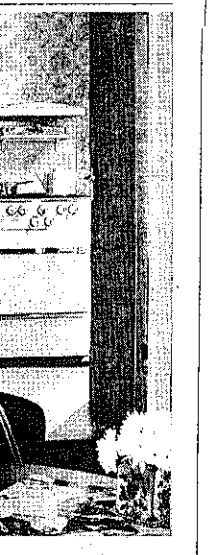
