**THE RATE IS STRUCK**  
Waterford County Council's decision to reduce the rate of the shadows again and the threat of abolition which has loomed over the members for the past few weeks since they first refused to strike an "adequate" rate has been translated as the Council, after a series of meetings, surged to a 13-10 vote to reduce the rate to 10 pence in the pound at the final special meeting last Friday.  
The peculiarity had one rate been struck the first day, that is the rate which the Manager would have accepted as adequate, it would have been only £3.28. So in point of fact what the Council achieved by its vote to reduce the rate was 5p more than it might have been or need be.  
Last Friday was the last ditch stand or as one member of the Council put it, the last effort "to pull the chestnut out of the fire." It was evident even before the meeting started that all the stops were out as the Chairman and other members and officials of the Council put their heads together with the legal adviser to try to hammer out an acceptable mode of procedure.  
First indications that there was a breakthrough in the deadlock which has hampered the Fianna Fail members all through the period was when Mr. O'Ryan roved in with his party colleagues in the first vote which was taken. He did likewise in the second vote for the striking of the increased rate and this was coupled with the fact that it was opposed by Mr. Kynne, meant that the desired breakthrough had occurred.  
Mr. O'Ryan explained the change in his stand by saying that he had been seen to take the task of building a few houses for people in need in his area through and that the Council was abolished he would be unable to do so. People may or may not think that this was a good reason for his change of heart but they might also ask why such concern did not prompt Mr. O'Ryan to reverse his direction earlier.  
Be that as it may, there is still one other point about last Friday's

meeting that puzzles me. At the March 19 meeting reductions of 18p were approved by the Council and accepted by the County Manager to bring the rate submitted down to £5.25. It was at this point that the Council took over last week and the Co. Manager then informed the members that they now had to face the further problem of a cut of £13,000 in the Road Grants notified since the previous meeting. To restore this would require the equivalent of 11d (5p) on the rates. But the Manager also submitted to the members a list of reductions totalling £13,000 which could have been cut from the estimates and which could have been used to offset the reduction in the Road Grants. However the Council or a majority of 13 members opted to put the extra 1/- on the rates to solve the problem and this was how it all ended up.

Some people see the whole affair as a bottle of smoke. Personally I think that it is necessary for the Council to make a stand against the rising burden of the rates. These are becoming unbearable and unless the public representatives see fit to protect the interests of the people they represent then I think that it is a matter for the public to organise themselves in the proper way to see that they obtain this protection for themselves.

## Exchanges Follow Striking Of County Rate

AN INCREASE OF 95½p (19/1d.) IN £

The "tough-soft" line "campaign being variously followed by Waterford County Council over the past seven weeks in the matter of determining a rate for the coming year finally came to an end at a special meeting in Dungarvan last Friday when by 13 votes to 10 the Council agreed to adopt a rate of £5.30. This was the fourth meeting of the Council called to deal with the matter and when the final decision was announced exchanges occurred between members of the Fianna-Fail and Fine Gael Parties.

It will be recalled that the original estimates meeting of the Council was held on March 19 and at this a rate of £4.87 was passed by 12 votes to 10. This figure was reduced by a number of small reductions and by cutting 38p (7/1d.) from the Health Authority estimate which was the amount by which this was increased over last year. The County Manager objected to the rate on the grounds that it was inadequate and reported the position to the Minister for Local Government who ordered that a local inquiry be held. Following this the Minister upheld the County Manager's objection and directed the Council to revoke the rate they had made and to strike a new rate. He allowed them 14 days in which to do this.

A further meeting of the Council was called for April 16 to consider the Minister's directive but following this there was no change as for one reason or another the Council by 12 votes to 11 refused to revoke the rate they already adopted. The possibility of abolition then loomed over the Council following this decision but Fianna-Fail members put down a motion calling another special meeting for the following Friday in a further effort to save the Council.

Council had refused to disturb the rate they had already determined and it was now his view that the first thing to do was to deal with the notice of motion as this, if passed, would restore the status quo ante the last meeting. He said that the motion would require only a simple majority to pass it.

The motion was seconded by Mr. S. Whelan and was then put to the meeting and a recorded vote taken. This resulted as follows: For—Messrs. Curran, Kennedy (P.), Whelan, Foley, Henneberry, O'Ryan, Ahearne, Dowd, Quirke, Cahill, Keane, Kenneally (W) (all Fianna Fail) (12). Against—Messrs. Deasy, Dowey, Hartly, Coffey, Cusack, Heskin, Walsh, Dunphy, Harney, Shalloo, (all Fine Gael)—10. Abstained—Mr. T. Kyne (Lab.)—1.

The Chairman then declared the motion carried by 12 votes to 10 with 1 abstention.

**CUT IN ROAD GRANTS**

The Council then proceeded to discuss the general rate situation and the Co. Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor said that the original rate sought was one of £5.87 (£5.43 in the £). The Council had approved reductions amounting to 3/6d. and this brought the rate down to £5.51 (£5.25). Since then he said that they had been notified of the State grants which would be made available from the Road Fund for the current year and these showed a cut in the amount for arterial roads on the amount which had been originally included in the Estimates. The result was that they would now be £13,392 short under this head and this posed a further problem.

The Chairman added that the provision of this amount out of rates, if they were to maintain the level of employment at last year's figure, would be equivalent to 11d. in the £ and this would bring the rate to £5-6-0 (£5.30).

Mr. Kyne then proposed that a rate of £5.30 be adopted and this was seconded by Mr. W. Kenneally T.D.

In reply to Mr. Walsh, the Co. Manager said that this would be an increase of 19/1d. (95½p) over last year.

Mr. Walsh—That's almost a 20 per cent increase.

The Chairman declared the proposal passed.

**SOCIAL INSURANCE REMUNERATION LIMIT**  
The Government have made an Order under Section 6 of the Social Welfare (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1965, with effect as from 3rd May 1971 increasing the remuneration limit for social insurance in the case of non-manual employees from £1,200 to £1,600 a year. Employees excluded from insurance by the previous limit will from the date mentioned be compulsorily insurable unless their remuneration is at a rate exceeding £1,600 a year. It will, therefore, be necessary for such persons to get insurance cards from the local office of the Department of Labour (Employment Exchanges or Employment Offices) as soon as possible.
