Dumping Of All Factory Waste To Cease

Dungarvan - A Grand Town But It Stinks

Tourists who recently visited Dungarvan when asked what they thought of the town replied that it was a grand town but that it stinks!

This was stated by Mr. P. Whelan at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council during a discussion on the dumping of factory waste at the old Shandon dump and the present position in regard to the sewerage plan for the Slusheen.

When the Co. Manager, Mr. O'Connor, stated that he had no fresh report on the sewerage position Mr. Whelan asked what was causing the hold-up.

Mr. O'Connor replied that there were problems still to be solved in regard to the disposal of domestic sewage and industrial waste. It was proposed to have an inspection at Abbeyside, where it was proposed to have a pumping station to see whether there would be any pollution from the discharge.

Mr. Whelan said that this matter was going on for years and the smell from the place was still something cruel. A deputation representing people who lived in the vicinity and who were affected by the smell had recently gone to see the Medical Officer. He advised that one guest house owner had lost several customers who would not stay because of the shocking smell. This was not good enough for these people who were all large ratepayers.

Mr. T. Kyne, Chairman said that the Council had Department sanction for the sewerage scheme but not for the pumping station and they could not go ahead until they got that.

Mr. Whelan - This is a shocking thing; the smell is dreadful and the sewerage is backing up all the time.

Mr. Whelan added that the position was particularly bad during warm weather and there were always fear of an epidemic.

Mr. T. Wade alleged that the cause of the smell at the Slusheen was the effluent from the Creamery and this should be piped away altogether. They should have been right in the pumping station but not because it did not suit certain people and they should have done it at their own expense and not at the expense of the ratepayers as was the position now.

Mr. Kyne said that all industrial effluent had been carefully examined and the officials of the Council were not satisfied that if the effluent from the Creamery was piped away as far as the quay that that would not be objected to by the Fishery Board.

Mr. Deasy - So this effluent will have to be treated before being discharged?

Chairman - More than likely!

Mr. Deasy - And will this raise the cost of the scheme?

The Manager, Mr. O'Connor said that the domestic sewage could be dealt with by a disinfectant and they would have to examine whether one outfall would do. This would be done in consultation with the Creamery and the Leather factory.

Mr. Kyne said that they wanted the employment at the Creamery to continue so they could not very well compel them to do something which might force them to close down.

Mr. Whelan - That wouldn't happen.

Mr. Kyne - I don't know!

A noisy interlude in which Mr. Wade, Mr. Kelly and Mr. Hackett were involved followed and the Chairman threatened to adjourn the meeting if the members did not behave themselves properly.

Mr. Kyne warned the members that they should be conscious that a High Court action was pending against the Council on the matter and any statements made by the members could be used against the Council later.

CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN OF URBAN COUNCIL RE-ELECTED UNANIMOUSLY

At the annual meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night the outgoing Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne (Lab.), was again unanimously re-elected for the coming year.

Mr. Kyne's re-election was proposed by Mr. N. Kelly and seconded by Mr. D. Groode, both Fianna Fail members of the Council.

Kyne thanking his colleagues for his re-election referred to the fact that this would be his last period in office in the life of the present Council as there would be a local election held before the next annual meeting.

Mr. E. Walsh (F.G.) the outgoing Vice-Chairman was also re-elected unanimously by the proposal of Mr. Kelly seconded by Mr. A. Deasy (F.G.).

EDUCATION MINISTER ACTING IN DICTATORIAL MANNER

Resignation Call at V.E.C. Meeting

Mr. K. O'Ryan, a Fianna Fail member of Waterford County Council has called for the resignation of the Minister for Education whom he accused of acting in a dictatorial manner and contrary to the wishes of the vast majority of the people on the community schools issue.

Mr. O'Ryan, who was speaking at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee in Dungarvan last Monday said there was a massive wave of rejection for the Minister's proposals.

Mr. O'Ryan went on: "I personally deplore his action which is purely dictatorial and I unreservedly call for the Minister's resignation."

The C.E.O., Mr. Donal Kelleher, said they had no reply from the Department of Education to a resolution sent following the last meeting at which members expressed opposition to the community school proposals as well as stressing the need for greater involvement in any talks or discussions between the Department and V.E.C. committees. Mr. Kelleher said once a reply had been received a special meeting would be convened.

The discussion ended, without Mr. O'Ryan's resignation call being acted upon.

All workers with Building, Civil Engineer and Building Sub-Contracting firms are legally entitled to be entered in the non-contributory Construction Federation Pension Scheme with effect from the 7th March, 1969. Pensions payable are between £100 and £375 p.a. depending on number of years in the Scheme. A mortality benefit of £750 is made to dependants of workers who die before retirement provided they are at least 26 weeks in the Scheme. Workers who are not entered in the Scheme cannot benefit.

Each worker is entitled to have his pension scheme card stamped weekly. Employers may obtain these cards from The Construction Federation Pension Scheme, 28 Earlsfort Terrace, Dublin 2.

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Defendant Gets Home By Very Slight Whisker

DRUNK DRIVING CHARGE DISMISSED

A traffic accident which occurred at Crutty's Corner, Abbeyside, last Christmas Eve had a sequel at Dungarvan Court last Wednesday when John French, with address at 2, Barrack Street, Cork, and Moonan, Ring, appeared before District Justice B. J. Carroll charged with driving on the occasion while under the influence of drink. He was further charged with driving a vehicle with a defective handbrake.

Inspector A. J. Murtagh prosecuted but there was no appearance for the defendant nor was he professionally represented. Dr. C. P. O'Connell gave evidence that he was called to the Dungarvan Garda Station at about 10.20 p.m. on December 24. He saw John French who was aged 23 years there. On examination he found that the defendant's pulse was slightly up but he carried out the usual tests fairly well. Witness said he formed the opinion that the defendant would be able to drive.

Miss F. Mulcahy, Abbeyside, stated in evidence that shortly after 9 p.m. on December 24, she left her home to go home. She drove up Sexton Street and at the junction with the Waterford road she intended to go right on to the Clonca Road where her home was. As she came to the junction she was watching for traffic on the Waterford road and suddenly a light flashed past her from a side street and the next thing that she saw was the rear mudguard of her car was struck.

Witness went on to say that she pulled up at once and got out and saw a van parked near the telephone kiosk. She went back and spoke to the driver of the van but he was abusive and asked her why she didn't look where she was going. He appeared to be most unconcerned about the whole thing and she said she told him then that she would phone for the Garda and they would decide who was wrong.

Witness added that she asked the defendant for his name and he replied that he was Jack French, Moonan, Ring. A week after the accident occurred she said she rang the defendant's insurance company but he had not reported it up to that time.

Garra T. Donovan gave evidence of having investigated the accident. When he arrived at the scene he met Miss Mulcahy who told him that she had been hit by the driver of a van which was parked at the telephone kiosk near the junction. She went back and saw the van driver who was resting against the front of the van. Garda Donovan added that when he spoke to the defendant the latter was slow and hesitant and witness formed the opinion that the defendant was not fit to drive. With Sgt. Carty he then took the defendant in the patrol car to the Garda station. On arrival there the defendant got out and walked slowly, was unsteady but did not stagger.

Sgt. T. Carty said in evidence that he accompanied Garda Donovan to the scene of the accident. He spoke to the defendant and formed the opinion that he was unfit to drive. He arrested the defendant and brought him to the station. There he gave him a breathalyzer test which proved negative by a very slight margin. In reply to a question put by the District Justice, witness said that the scene of the accident he had no doubt at all about his condition and he was satisfied that he was unfit to drive.

Garda T. Coughlan in evidence said that he was Station Officer on December 24 and was there when the defendant was brought in at 9.45 p.m. He formed the opinion that the defendant was a borderline case. Michael Mulcahy, Abbeyside, said that he was on his way home on Christmas Eve when he came to the scene of the accident involving his sister's car. He stopped and went back and spoke to the driver of the van. He said that the defendant was going to leave the scene of the accident but witness went after him. Witness added that he formed the opinion that the defendant was drunk on the occasion.

District Justice Carroll said that the case was a very difficult one to decide because of the conflicting evidence involved. On the one side he would have to accept the evidence of Sgt. Carty and Garda Donovan, two experienced men, and Mr. Mulcahy who saw the defendant at the scene of the accident as to the defendant's condition. Against this there was the evidence of Doctor O'Connell that the defendant was not unfit to drive and Garda Coughlan who said that he was abusive and asked her why she didn't look where she was going. In all the circumstances, said the Justice, "I will give the defendant the benefit of a very slight doubt and he gets home by a very slight whisker in the drink driving charge. However I have no hesitation in convicting him of careless driving on the occasion."

The Justice then imposed a fine of £15 on the defendant for the conviction with an additional fine for the defective handbrake of the van. The Council unanimously approved that a request for this facility be made.

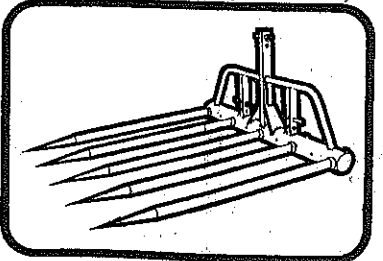
