## MAN takes you behind the Spotlight

...the great work he has since done and of his long record of service to Catholics in the outback of South Australia, he has been named in the South Australia State list of Birthday Honours for Queen Elizabeth and is to be made a M.B.E. He is Fr. James Dunne who was born at Coolishal, Ballyduff Upper, next to the National School which, as a youngster, he attended until he completed his primary education. He completed his secondary studies and commenced his studies for the priesthood at Mt. Mellray Seminary and then went on to Propaganda College, Rome, where he was ordained on December 17, 1927.

One year later he left for Australia and was appointed assistant parish priest at Peterborough. For the past 21 years he has been parish priest of Streaky Bay.

And now I take the rest of my story as it appeared in "The West Coast Sentinel" of South Australia under the date June 16 as follows:

"Father Dunne, who has become an almost legendary figure on the West Coast where he is well-known and respected by members of all denominations, had once served the largest parish in the world—200,000 square miles of South Australia's outback.

"Appointed to this position in 1940, Father Dunne travelled to the railway camps and sheep stations along the three main railway lines in the State twice a year.

"One of these tours took him from Port Augusta to Cook on the East-West line, the second from Hawker to Pinkie, and the third from Peterborough to Broken Hill, visiting soldiers' camps and sheep and cattle stations on both sides of the line.

"Once a year, Father Dunne travelled on the Birdsville track, visiting parishioners, and he also celebrated Mass at Coober Pedy and Andamooka every twelve months.

"I travelled in a Mainline truck, loaded with tyres, my swags, water and enough petrol for 1,200 miles," Father Dunne recalls.

"I carried a radio transmitter with a pedal generator, and kept in contact with the flying doctor bases at Alice Springs, Kalbarrie, Broken Hill and Charleville.

"When Father Dunne was appointed to Streaky Bay in 1950, travelling long distances was still an inevitable element of his work.

"In charge of the area between Port Kenny and Eucla, Father Dunne regularly called on people in this area, and celebrated Mass in the main centres every Sunday.

"I used to travel 290 miles every Sunday," Fr. Dunne said.

His "working hours" on Sunday were from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

"With the increase of population in the Far West, the Catholic Church saw the need to appoint a priest at Ceduna last year, and Father Dunne's parish now includes the townships of Port Kenny, Calca, Streaky Bay and Haslam.

"Today, Father Dunne's image has not changed. He still uses a utility truck, fitted with a spare petrol tank, and he has not lost his fondness for the sparsely populated areas where he spends his holidays, visiting the people who live on outback stations north of the line.

On behalf of all his friends and those of his family in the Ballyduff and West Waterford areas I extend hearty congratulations to Fr. Dunne and wish him many more fruitful years working in the Lord's Vineyard under the Southern Cross.

### WHERE ARE WE?

### YOU MUST HAVE A UNION

Writing in the U.S. metalworking weekly, "Iron Age," James Reizer has this to say about Ireland and trade unions:

"\$2.5 million is being spent annually by a dozen groups of companies in Ireland on exploration.

"Development of minerals in Ireland, however, is not without its problems. For example, a group of students and teachers from Trinity College, recently made a study of the mineral development in the country. Their facts and conclusions were essentially correct, but they did conclude that foreign countries—largely Canada—were stealing their wealth.

"Probably the biggest complication for any U.S. company thinking of locating in Ireland is the unions. While there are advantages in Ireland—language, intelligence of the people, willingness to work—you must have a union. And the unions are every bit as bad as the British unions. As one company president put it, "after all, the British unions are all run by Irishmen, anyway. So you have the same thing here."

"On the other hand if the enterprise is small enough the local leadership of the unions is generally very co-operative. The problems arise when the central office in Dublin sticks its nose into local operations.

"The managing director of one American-owned company told me of the only strike he had in ten years. It was a nationwide strike of maintenance workers. He had only a few in his plant. But the entire factory was shut down for three months because the rest of the workers refused to cross the picket line.

"It's too bad the unions cause the difficulties in Ireland because there are so many good reasons to locate a plant there.

"But they'd better move fast. If Ireland enters the Common Market, the 15 to 20 years tax holiday on exports may be eliminated. It will apply only to existing companies. So the time to move, if the inclination there, is now."

I came across these comments in the current issue of "Technology Ireland," the magazine of the Institute for Industrial Research and Standards and thought they were worth reproducing.

### IRISH COUNCIL AGAINST BLOOD SPORTS SEND AN OPEN LETTER TO THE MINISTER FOR JUSTICE

The following is the text of a letter dated 28th June sent by the Irish Council Against Blood Sports to Mr. D. O'Malley, Minister for Justice:

Dear Minister—We were shocked to see your photograph published in the "Sporting Press" of the 17th June in the act of presenting a trophy to the breeder and wife of the owner of the "Coursing Greyhound of the Year" at a function in Knappogue Castle, Co. Clare on the 14th June last.

You must be aware that there is a very strong and continually growing body of opinion in this country, not confined to membership of this organisation, which regard live hare coursing with abhorrence as a barbarous and unchristian activity. This viewpoint has, as you should know, been endorsed by the Christian Churches of this country but in case you are unaware of this we enclose a copy of their statement and resolutions.

Coursing is cruel and an alleged "sport" which should have no place in a Christian and civilized society. That it is certainly cruel is evidenced by the fact that the promoters would be liable to prosecution for cruelty under the Protection of Animals Act 1911, as amended in 1965, were it not for the insertion of a clause in the 1965 Amendment Act which excluded animals coursed or hunted from the protection of the Act. If a special exclusion clause for an Act, designed to protect animals from cruelty, is required, then coursing and, indeed, hunting are certainly cruel.

It is sad to see a Minister in Conservation Year plus one cynically disregard the message of Conservation Year. In that year, itself, hares became scarce, as was admitted by the official organ of the Irish Coursing Club, the "Sporting Press" on the 24th December, 1970 with the words "hares or the lack of them were a major problem again. The summer report that they were plentiful was soon discounted and quite a few clubs found it difficult to meet their requirements."

During the 1970/71 season at least one coursing meeting was cancelled due to hare shortages; sick hares were coursed at Ballyne; weak hares were coursed even at the greatest meeting in the coursing calendar (Clonmel) and hares were coursed more than once on the same day as we proved at Saggart, Co. Dublin. Yet it is for such reasons in this same season that you presented an award—an award for cruelty.

Live hare coursing is very much the preserve of a minority and it is this minority to whom you have lent the prestige of your office. Those of us who abhor deliberate cruelty to any living creature, whether man or animal, have expected our Government to listen to the combined voices of the churches, we have expected it to put an end to this civilized and so-called sport by the introduction of appropriate legislation.

You, as Minister for Justice, would presumably be the one whose duty it would be to steer any such Bill through the Oireachtas. You have, however, chosen to show, publicly, your support of barbarism and even claimed in your

**DECISION TO SELL DUNGARVAN GOLF CLUB AFTER MARATHON MEETING**

After a marathon five hour meeting in Dungarvan on last Friday night, which finished in the early hours of Saturday morning, the members of Dungarvan Golf Club decided by a very slender majority to sell their picturesque nine-hole course at Ballinacourty to the Quigley Magnesite Division of Pfizer Inc. for a major extension of the nearby £3,500,000 industrial plant.

While the decision itself to accept the Quigley offer of an estimated £80,000 for the 42½ acres links came as no surprise, the extent to which the club was divided on the issue was. There was an attendance of close on 200 at the meeting, but less than half of them, representing full members, had voting rights in the final decision.

Throughout the meeting there was quite a divergence of opinion on whether or not the club should accept the offer of a simple majority.

There were at times heated exchanges and the pros and cons of the full and frank discussion were forcibly aired on both sides.

**QUESTION OF MAJORITY**

A question that did arise was whether or not a simple majority would suffice to allow the deal to go through. Some held the view that a two-thirds majority would be required, but it was finally agreed that only a simple majority was necessary. This was crucial in the subsequent vote.

For while officers and members have refused to disclose the actual voting, it has been stated reliably that the £80,000 deal was carried by a mere two votes.

For an alternative course the club have finished negotiations with an extensive landholder, Mr. R. Condon, for the purchase of his farm at Colligan, about five miles from the town. The actual figure, though not disclosed officially, is understood to be in the region of £40,000. It is also intended to lay it out as an 18-hole course.

**LAND LEAGUE CRITICIZES SALE**

The recently formed County Waterford Executive of the National Land League has strongly criticized the Dungarvan Golf Club-Quigley Magnesite transaction that has resulted in the sale of the golf club's nine hole links at Ballinacourty.

Mr. Thomas Foley, M.C.C., Stradbally, Secretary of the Land League Executive Committee has accused the golf club of selling their links and acquiring valuable arable land that was essential for the creating of viable and economic holdings in the Colligan area of Dungarvan.

"Our association accepts," he said in Dungarvan last Monday, "that an amenity such as a golf course is desirable in the Dungarvan area. But with modern machinery and sufficient capital it would be possible for the golf club to acquire non-arable lands for their new course of which there is an abundance in the Dungarvan area."

**WROTE TO CLUB**

Mr. Foley admitted that his executive had written to the golf club on this issue. The members of the golf club, he maintained, said, were business and professional people who depended to a large extent on small farmers and rural people for their livelihoods.

Mr. Foley said that agitation was building up and further meetings would be held to consider "a possible plan of campaign."
