Potts were exchanged twice more before the interval when Ballygunner were leading by two points (2-11 to 1-7). Their defence overall was sound but goalkeeper Liam Crotty made more than one blunder over the hour which resulted in major scores for Stradbally.

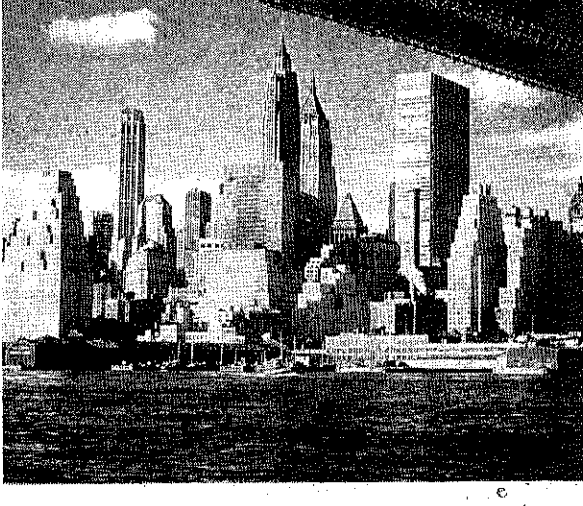
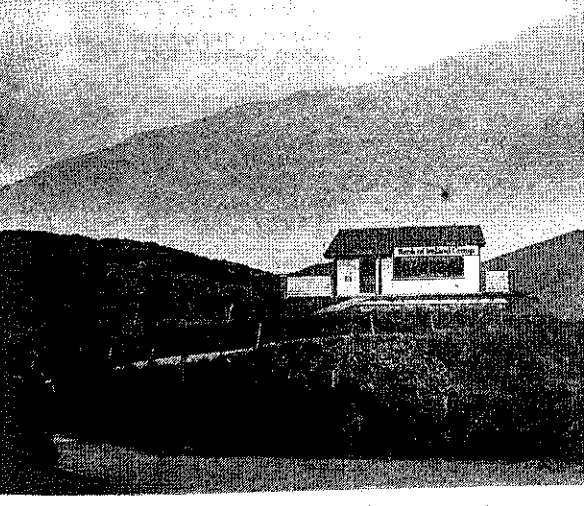
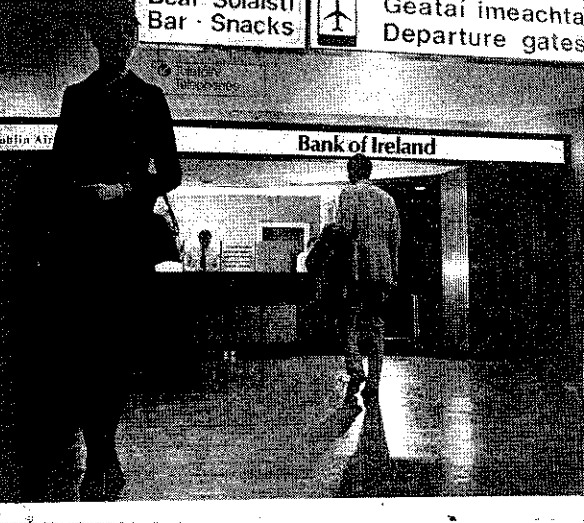
John "Stylo" Riordan was by far their outstanding player in defence and he got most assistance from Micky Tobin, Ned Merrin and Paddy Kennally.

Hogget Ewe and Mountain Lamb Subsidy Schemes, 1971

Conditions for Payment of Subsidy for Each Qualifying Animal

- 1. The Hogget Ewe Scheme applies to suitable hogget ewes of all breeds. For the purposes of the Scheme, a hogget ewe means one with not more than two permanent incisor teeth.
2. The Mountain Lamb Scheme applies only to suitable lambs of the Blackface Mountain ("horny") and Cheviot breeds in mountain flocks in the State. Flock owners may be required to provide evidence about their mountain grazing.
3. To qualify, all hogget ewes and lambs must have been dipped in the period 1st June to 7th August, 1971. They must also be of good quality and type. The Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries reserves the right to withhold payment of the subsidy in respect of any hogget ewe unsuitable for breeding, or any lamb unsuitable for breeding or fattening as adjudged by inspectors appointed by him, whose decision in this respect shall be final.
4. Inspections will be carried out only at centres appointed by the Minister. Hogget ewes will be inspected at all such centres: lambs will be inspected only at centres for the areas to which the Mountain Lamb Scheme applies. Advertised lists of centres will indicate which are available for inspection of lambs. Animals not presented in accordance with these arrangements will not be considered for subsidy.
5. No claim for subsidy will be considered from any applicant who does not permit the ewes and lambs presented by him to be marked by inspectors appointed by the Minister in whatever manner the Minister may decide.
6. The amount of subsidy payable will be £2 per qualifying hogget ewe and £1.50 per qualifying lamb. No animal will qualify in 1971 for more than one subsidy payment.
7. Subsidy will not be payable on sheep which (a) are branded with tar, pitch or paint; (b) have excessive black wool; (c) bear earmarks which indicate that they have been imported.
8. Subsidy will be payable to the flock owner in respect of sheep which are accepted by an inspector appointed by the Minister as suitable for subsidy, provided the flock owner— (a) has mountain grazing within the State in respect of the Mountain Lamb Scheme; (b) produces a certificate of dipping as provided for in the Sheep Dipping Orders; and (c) obtains at the relevant inspection centre and completes form of claim for subsidy on the sheep (including where appropriate a declaration in relation to (a) above).
9. The Minister's decision in all matters relating to the Schemes shall be final.

N.B.—Under no circumstances will subsidy be paid on sheep in respect of which a dipping certificate for the period 1st June to 7th August, 1971 is not produced.
