CAUGHT NAPPING

It was the day of the election of the Vice-Chairman and the Chairman of the County Council last night in Dungarvan that even the members of the Council themselves found themselves caught napping.

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intrigued by a claim made by a Ballygouli man, reported in one of last Sunday's national papers, that 1,000 salmon would be the return from the harbour in certain circumstances in a season. Willie Carey who has had a lifetime of experience in this line of fishing says that the greatest season ever known in the salmon netting records of the harbour was away back in 1932 when over a 64 month period, he and his colleagues had a total catch of around 600 fish. CELEBRATING THE TRUCE
July 11, 1921 was a day of prolonged and warm sunshine much as those we have been enjoying for the past week. But it was more than that for it marked the end of the hostilities in the Anglo-Irish War which brought to an end an era of fear and terror.

The I.R.A. columns were disbanded and the men who served in them were rapturously welcomed home as heroes. It was a delicious time, that day, which it was thought, brought freedom to the people and took the fear and terror from their lives.

The weeks passed by and as negotiations between representatives of Ireland and Britain were arranged, hopes of an enduring peace between the two countries did not diminish.

Then came the Treaty and its adoption by a majority in Dail Eireann. The British forces were evacuated and the Tricolour replaced the Union Jack over barracks and public buildings throughout the country. But then came the split with those for and against the Treaty taking sides and the sun that rose so gloriously on July 11, 1921, sank in blood, the blood of brother Irishmen who killed each other in the cruel civil war which followed.

Thus did the Truce bring death and destruction in its wake and a division amongst the Irish people which has belittled the onward progress of this country to this very day. This was the Truce, the 50th anniversary of which the Government celebrated last weekend. Surely it was not an occasion which called for such a national demonstration seeing that it was but a prelude to a civil war, one of the greatest scourges which can afflict any country.

NO CHANGE IN ELECTIONS AT COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

There were no upsets at the annual meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Tuesday and the outgoing Chairman and Vice-Chairman, both Fianna Fail party members, were again re-elected with comfortable majorities.

The re-election of Mr. K. O'Ryan (F.F.) as Chairman was proposed by Mr. S. Whelan and seconded by Mr. C. Curran and although Fine Gael could only muster 4 as against Fianna Fail's 9 they put forward Mr. M. Harty for the post, proposed by Mr. N. Walsh and seconded by Mr. G. Heskin. Mr. O'Ryan was re-elected by 9 votes to 4.

The same pattern followed in the next election when Mr. John Keane (F.F.) the outgoing Vice-Chairman was re-elected in his absence by a similar vote.

RESIGNED
Miss Mary Scanlon, Ballinwillin, Lismore tendered her resignation as temporary Farm Home Management Adviser. She will take up a similar post in a permanent capacity in Co. Cavan on September 1. It was agreed to advertise for a temporary replacement and to fill the vacancy at next meeting.

New Road Markings At Tarr's Bridge

FILLING STATION OWNER PROTESTS TO COUNCIL

That new markings placed on the roads at the junction of Tarr's Bridge and the main Dungarvan/Waterford road about two miles from Dungarvan were going to interfere with the livelihood as they would keep people from coming on to his filling station for petrol was stated by Mr. Patrick Gordon when he staged a one-man protest at the meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr. Gordon who addressed the meeting said that he wished to formally protest against the double white lines on the road from Dungarvan which had been put down recently by the County Council for a very considerable distance along the road outside his house and business premises. He maintained that these lines should not have been put down as they would not facilitate motorists but cause a danger to the general public.

Mr. Gordon went on to say that he was always most concerned in general and in particular of his customers at this junction and he was sure that the necessity to erect a sign 500 yards on the Waterford side of this junction, if not a sign, he should apply for permission before erecting such a sign. He referred the matter to the Council's area engineer and agreed to remove the sign provided the Council erected one to safeguard the public.

On two occasions last year he left his sign in position and that stage he said that he saw that the day was coming when people would be killed and he could hold the Council responsible. He was sorry that his own customers and people had been killed there since.

€5,500 A YEAR PLUS TO EXTEND COUNTY SCAVENGING SERVICE

Council Approves New Schedule

At least twenty-one new centres are to have a public scavenging service in the near future following a decision at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday to extend the present domestic refuse collection in the County.

A report from the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, estimated the cost at an initial €5,500 a year, which would increase each year. A second truck would be required and this could not be secured before next January. If the extended service were to be introduced now it would cost €1,500 up to the end of the year.

He proposed that the collection be extended to include the following areas: Ailfane, Aglish, Ballynagool, Ring, Holvick, Ballyduff Lower, Ballyheny, Ballymacracky, Bonmahon, Annestown, Checkpoint, Clashmore, Stradbally, Piltown, Touraneena, Fenor, Leanybrann, Kils, Kilmacow and Kilmacow and the environs of both Dungarvan and Waterford City.

Mr. Hally said that the cost of the full service in a full year would now be to the order of €16,000.

Members of the Council approved the extension of the service and that the following districts be also included if they could be fitted in with the schedule submitted by the Co. Engineer: Ballysaggart, Tircubbin, Rathgormac, Grange and Ballinacoola.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TAX DEDUCTIONS

Dear Sir—As a result of complaints which I received about large deductions of income tax from workers' wages at the end of June I made representations in the matter to the Minister for Finance. The following is the reply which I received and will be of interest to your readers:

"I am not aware of any large lump sum deductions of income tax at the end of the June quarter as a result of a change in the income tax code announced in the Budget. Where additional liability to tax arises in any case as a result of the withdrawal of the reduced rate relief the increased weekly deduction could not be more than 22½p so that up to the end of the June quarter the maximum arrears could not exceed €2.93. If large deductions were made from some employees, there must have been factors involved other than the withdrawal of reduced rate relief.

If you are aware of any case in which hardship is complained of I shall be glad to have it examined."

County Council Chairman Loses Seat

UNEXPECTED UPSET AT ANNUAL MEETING

Mr. C. Curran who has been the Fianna Fáil Chairman of Waterford County Council for the past eleven years lost his position in a most unexpected manner at the Council's annual meeting in Dungarvan last Monday. The new Chairman is Mr. Norman Walsh (F.G.) who now holds the honour for the final year in the life of the present Council. Elections to elect a new Council are due to be held next June.

The election at last Monday's annual meeting of the Council looked as if it would be a foregone conclusion as Mr. Curran, who had a 13-11 majority on the Council had been ruling the roost in voting issues, especially since the last elections and Mr. Curran's return for the present Council's final year was accepted as a fait accompli.

The meeting, due to start at 2.30 p.m., was not called to order until 2.40 p.m. and prior to that all 12 members of the Fianna Fáil party seemed to have been accounted for. The first business of the meeting was the election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

When Mr. Curran presided called for nominations, his re-election was proposed by Mr. H. R. Dowd and seconded by Mr. W. K. Conneally, T.D.

Mr. Norman Walsh was then proposed by Mr. A. Deasy and seconded by Mr. M. Shaheen.

COULD NOT VOTE

A recorded vote was then taken by the Co. Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling who called the names of members in alphabetical order. When the name of Mr. D. Ahern (F.G.) was called he was stated to be absent and when the name of Mr. W. Dowd (F.G.) was called he was also stated to be absent and the taking of the vote continued. Before the vote had been completed Mr. Dowd entered the Council Chamber and this fact was drawn to the Chairman's notice by Mr. Deasy but Mr. Curran ruled that Mr. Dowd could not vote at that stage as he had been marked absent when his name was called and the vote had then been completed.

Mr. W. K. Conneally, T.D. supported the Chairman on this point despite protests from Mr. Deasy and Mr. P. Coffey.

Mr. K. O'Riyan (F.F.) then said that it would be a mean tactic in the circumstances not to allow Mr. Dowd to vote on the issue.

Pressed by several Fine Gael members the County Secretary agreed that there was no rule of regulation which laid down in what order members of the Council should vote and he agreed that in the circumstances Mr. Dowd was entitled to cast his vote.

The Chairman then said that Mr. Dowd could vote and the result was an 11 to 11 tie as follows:—

For Curran — Messrs. Curran, Conneally, P. Whelan, Foley, Henchy, O'Riyan, Dowd, Quirk, Cahill, Keane, Kennedy W. (all F.F.)—11.

For Walsh — Messrs. Deasy, Henchy, Coffey, Cusack, Healy, Walsh, Dunphy, Harnay, Shaheen, Dowd (all F.G.) and Kyne (Lab.)—11.

Mr. Dowling then announced that the procedure in the event of an equality of votes was to decide the matter by lot or a draw from a hat.

The names of the two candidates were then placed in a hat and it was agreed that the first name drawn should be the Chairman. Mr. T. Cunningham, Staff Officer drew the draw and drew Mr. Walsh's name from the hat and he was then declared Chairman for the coming year.

Mr. Walsh, thanking those who had supported him said that his election had come as a real surprise.

Shortly after Mr. Ahern arrived at the meeting. He said that he had been in the Council chamber before the meeting started and had gone out to the nearby motor taxation office intending to be back in time.

HINTS TO SAFE SWIMMING

It is greatly regretted that every summer this country is plagued with an appalling number of drownings involving swimmers. Tragic accidents, many of which could be avoided, have occurred for a few simple precautions had been observed. The lack of a sufficient number of swimming pools, combined with a climate which restricts outdoor swimming to a few months in the year, generally means that swimmers and bathers in this country are not well served in the scene of water-safety and leisure. The danger of a swimmer who seeks recreation in the water should, at least, be kept in mind and the basic water-safety rules, thereby guaranteeing personal safety while swimming or bathing. The following Golden Rules for swimmers and bathers, while not exhaustive, should be followed by those who wish to swim and bathe safely:

WHEN TO SWIM

The best hours for swimming are the late morning and late afternoon. Night swimming, especially at dusk, should be definitely avoided. Do not enter the water for at least one to one and a half hours after a full meal or after over-tired from physical activity indulged in prior to the swim because of the danger of cramp and exhaustion are increased.

WHERE TO SWIM

One should never swim alone from lonely, unfrequented and unfamiliar parts of a beach. The advice of Beach-Guards and other reliable people should be sought as to the best time and place to swim. Also, signs, notices and flags, giving warning of dangers and hazards that are not obvious should be obeyed implicitly. Feet should be held away from the shore; thereby being within easy reach of safety. Never swim outside the limit of a Beach-Guard's patrol.

HOW LONG TO SWIM

Weather and swimming conditions usually determine the length of the swim period. Ordinarily a 15 to 20 minutes session is considered long enough for the average swimmer. Length of the period can be extended if one becomes more familiar with the water, but never to the point where fatigue or cold becomes pronounced.

IF YOU GET INTO DIFFICULTY

If you call and do not panic. Panic is the most dangerous and overwhelming fear which attacks people in the face of real or fancied danger. In swimming panic increases the danger a hundred fold. It ramps up exhaustion attacks and may lead to drowning or changing the swimming stroke and heading towards the shore. Once safety is reached dry yourself well and do not venture forth into the water for the remainder of the day. When a swimmer is caught in a current and is unable to reach the beach he should conserve his strength by drifting with it and shout and wave an arm to summon assistance from the shore. There are always certain hazards and risks to be taken by any child who goes swimming. These hazards and risks need not give rise to danger when they are guarded against but tragedy will often result if they are ignored.

N.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

MACRA-N.F.A. CALLS FOR JOINT MEETING WITH MINISTER FOR FINANCE

Macra na Feirme and the National Farmers' Association have requested a joint meeting with the Minister for Finance to discuss the proposed changes in estate duty legislation outlined by Mr. Colley in his budget.

This was announced by Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the N.F.A. who said that his Association was under strong pressure from members to resist the proposed changes.

Mr. Maher stated: "While some changes were intimated in the Budget Speech of the Minister for Finance it was generally believed at the time that Mr. Colley was mainly concerned with closing tax avoidance loop holes in existing legislation.

"However, in subsequent Dail debates it has transpired that not alone was the Minister endeavouring to close loop holes, he was, in fact, introducing penal clauses and amendments to do so.

"The effects of the proposed amendments on farm families at times of deaths and marriages and in relation to the future development of agriculture in general, are, in our view, both anti-social and if I may use the term anti-progress.

"The complete exemption from estate duty of gifts on marriage, available to everyone, was a very useful incentive to have, especially in rural Ireland where marriages are all too few in number.

"The introduction of market value for estates sold within six years of the death of the owner, will simply mean that any widow or other person inheriting such a farm and not interested in farming, will now merely hold on to it for the expiration of this period, thus leaving the land derelict or semi-derelict for a fully exploited by a new owner.

"In light of the very grave unrest that the proposed changes are causing in farming circles and the serious consequences we see in them for the future of our agricultural industry, Mr. Deelan Martin, President, Macra na Feirme and I are now requesting a joint meeting with Mr. Colley.

"We would hope to convince the Minister to amend his proposals so that they cannot be regarded as anti-social or of hindering the normal development of our major industry."

CREAMERY MILK PRICES MUST BE INCREASED

There is now an irrefutable case for a substantial increase in creamery milk prices and the complete abolition of the tiered system of payment for creamery milk.

This was stated by Mr. Tom Cleary, Chairman of the N.F.A. National Dairy Committee, at a meeting in Dublin last week.

He said that retaining any form of tiered payment for creamery milk at this time was crazy since it would have to be completely abolished in eighteen months, at the time of our likely entry into the E.E.C.

CATTLE AND BEEF TRADE DISCUSSED

The present position and future prospects of the cattle and beef trade were discussed at a meeting in Dublin by representatives of the U.K. Farmers' Unions and the N.F.A. last week.

The meeting was regarded as establishing more frequent and regular consultations between these organisations in the context of applications of the United Kingdom and Ireland to join the E.E.C.

The discussions covered all the main aspects of the cattle and beef trade, with special reference to production systems, transport facilities and marketing arrangements.

It is envisaged that future meetings will rotate between the various countries.

LIQUID MILK PRODUCERS WANT PRICE INCREASE

Liquid milk producers outside the controlled areas of Dublin and Cork are becoming very irate because of the delay by their bottlers paying an increase for quota milk. The price of liquid milk in the controlled areas went up by one new penny per gallon on May 1st and since then producers throughout the rest of the country have been seeking a similar increase, but without success.

Seamus McCann, Secretary of the N.F.A. National Liquid Milk Group, stated:

He said: "In recent years prices in the controlled areas have been used as a guideline for all other areas. In fact on a number of occasions when price increases were sought by individual associations, they were told that as soon as the prices in the controlled areas were increased they would follow suit. These promises were not now being honoured."

He added: "I hope that the bottlers can see their way to pay the increase immediately, otherwise a conflict could develop in the near future."

N.F.A. MOVES ON DAIRY DISPOSAL BOARD STRIKE

The National Farmers' Association has requested a meeting with the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union and representatives of the Dairy Disposal Board to discuss the strike of Assistant Creamery Managers at the Dairy Disposal Board plants.

The Assistant Creamery Managers are members of the I.T. & G.W.U.

COURT REFERENCE TO BURNING OF DANCE MARQUEE

Reference to the burning of a dance marquee erected last month at Killeen (Pike) was made at Dungarvan Court on Wednesday when an application for a further injunction was made by Mr. Michael Kent, Killeen.

In reply to his solicitor, Mr. E. P. King, the applicant stated that at the last Court a licence for a number of dances to be held in July was granted. No dances were in fact held in the marquee as it was burned down.

Mr. Kent said that a claim for malicious injury had been lodged as a result of this. He added that the present application was for nine dances between August 15 and September 14 to be held on the following dates August 15, 18, 22, 25, 29, September 1, 5, 8 and 14. Applicant gave an assurance that the fire regulations and sanitary conditions laid down by the authorities would be adhered to.

Mr. M. J. Lavan, Solicitor, said that he represented Mr. John Power and Mr. and Mrs. M. Cheasty of the Pike who were objecting to the dances on the ground of insufficient stewarding, noise and general nuisance caused by them to the people living in the neighbourhood.

District Justice Carroll said that while the dances might cause a certain amount of upset in the locality all people do suffer to some extent. He did not think it would be unreasonable to grant the 9 dances applied for in the present application and he did not think that they would seriously inconvenience the local residents. The licence the local residents and sanitary arrangements would be added have to be fully carried out.
