ROAD SLAUGHTER CONTINUES

Within a couple of hours of the publication of last week's *Leader* the headline paragraph "Slaughter on Sunday" was headed "Slaughter on Sunday" a harrowing, shockingly shocking accident which cost four lives on the Leamy road about 8 miles on the west side of Dungarvan. It was one of the worst road accidents to occur in the locality and one of the main topics of discussion over the holiday weekend.

The weekend itself also brought further news of tragedies from parts of the country with a total of more fatal accidents on roads. It was a black weekend because of these losses and the trend shows a step on the slaughter that goes on.

Most of the fatalities have been road accidents, the breaking of a wheel, excessive speed and an absence of road traffic signs. While I have disagreed with the placing of several of the latter signs in the past, the road remains that as long as they are in such positions by the County Council so long must they be observed, even though they are not.

Over the weekend I discussed signs in general with two men who know a good deal about road traffic control and one of the suggestions which came up was the use of a "yield" sign. I have found myself in entire agreement with a "yield" sign which is completely dispensed with and the one replaced where necessary by "stop" signs. The point is, I think, that a "yield" sign leaves too much to the motorist to go on. It is a judgment of a situation which is not clear and is faced with a "yield" sign is usually and he should take a chance that he should have remained stationary if he had done so. It is not only for himself or for others but also for the safety of any other vehicle which might collide.

A "stop" sign carries a clear, unambiguous message for a motorist. As I say, a "yield" sign is either one thing or the other.

The County Council should consider this point which, if it is a judgment of a situation in the overall number of road signs, would also mean a reduction in the multiplicity of which at junctions has the effect of causing drivers rather than of saving them on guard.

It Was A Wet And "Black" Weekend

RAIN AND THUNDERSTORMS IN SEVERAL AREAS

The August Holiday of last weekend which was expected to be almost a complete wash-out from the point of outdoor activities and developed into another "black" weekend with five people killed in road accidents and scores injured up and down the country.

Rain fell in most areas practically all through the weekend and on Friday night and Saturday thunderstorms hit several districts. The torrential rain caused widespread flooding and there was much damage caused to crops now almost harvest ripe.

FATAL ACCIDENTS

Amongst those killed in road accidents was Miss Mary Haney (48) of Ballymore, Whitegate, Co. Cork, who was on a party on a day's outing to Shannon Airport.

At about 10.15 p.m. on Sunday night she was crossing the Permy-Mitchellstown road near the Glomacorta Inn, Kilworth, to board the special tour bus which was taking the party back to Cork when she was struck by a car.

Some time after the accident and while the injured woman was receiving attention, a car coming from the Fermoy direction drove into a large crowd which had gathered at the scene, injuring about 10. Three of whom was stated to be in a critical condition, were removed to St. Colman's Hospital, Mallow. Ambulances from Fermoy, Cork and Mallow were called to the scene to remove the injured.

OTHER VICTIMS

The other victims of the weekend road accidents included 49-year-old Jeremiah Hickey, who was killed while cycling on the Kanture-Newmarket road when he was in collision with another vehicle. Brian Henry (77), Abbey Street, Caher, who died following an accident at a karting meeting in Thomastown; John Rochford, Ballyhenry, Co. Wexford, who died from injuries he received when the car he was driving on Friday night ran over a horse on the New Ross road and a 6-year-old Georgia Cusack, Barker Street, Waterford, who died in Ardsheen Hospital after having been knocked down by a car while playing at Ballybricken.

CORK TRAINING CENTRE HURK MENTALLY HANDICAPPED

To the Editor *Dungarvan Leader* (Dear Editor, The Cork Branch of the Building Companies have undertaken to provide an adult training centre and accommodation for mentally handicapped children who when they reach the age of 18 must leave the care of the Sagasse School. This project, which is being supported by the Department of Health and Local Health Board, was proposed by Mr. Gallagher, seconded by Mr. Crofty and agreed.

"That the suggestion of the Chairman be accepted to defer consideration of the level of allowances under Section 10 to give time to gain experience of the commitments of the existing holders of the office of Chairman and Vice-Chairman and if necessary to make a case in reply to the Department's letter in due course."

The Department's letter referred to above stated that the Minister for Health would be prepared to approve payment of allowances in any case where the total granted to the holder did not exceed £200 a year. Before making any decision in this matter, the Board agreed to wait and see how the existing holders of the office will get on and what demands there might be on them.
