Dungarvan Win Meeting Local Derby

GOALKEEPER HAYES THWARTS EIRE OGE.

Dungarvan 6-3; Eire Oge 3-5.

The lightning reflexes of goalkeeper Peter Hayes, the tenacious second half hurling of Eddie Sheehan, the superb second half display of Timmy Healy and Michael Norris and finally, the "golden" opportunism of "four goal" Jim Walsh were the highlights in the final analysis, forced Eire Oge to capitulate in their local junior hurling derby with Dungarvan at the Fraher Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday last.

Tension was high and the excitement intense in this clash which was fought in a clean and sporting manner. The club depended on the outcome and for this reason alone they threw everything they had into a game which lived up to all pre-match expectations.

Eire Oge too lost nothing in defeat and in fact gained considerable prestige in a game they might have won, had they met a goalkeeper of a lesser calibre than Dungarvan's Peter Hayes.

Dungarvan got off to a brilliant start and were 2-1 up after ten minutes and were 3-1 to 0-1 to the good after the first quarter. But then Tom Mulcahy and Martin Walsh won undisputed control for Eire Oge in the centre of the field and the men in green began dictating the pace.

Two minutes later Thomas Walsh shot their second goal and Francis Woods pointed a free to leave them trailing 3-1 to 2-2 at the break.

The sides swapped points early in the second half before Timmy Healy's pointed to leave Dungarvan a goal clear. But then came Eire Oge's third goal when Matt Hayes after being knocked to the ground somehow managed to get the ball into the Dungarvan net. They were level for the first time in the game and within a few minutes Eire Oge shot in front when Francis Woods pointed a free.

Within minutes Woods was again on the mark from a placed ball and Eire Oge were two points ahead.
