LIAM LYNCH COMMEMORATION

The Annual General Liam Lynch Commemoration will take place on Sunday the 12th of September at Fermoy. It is now 30 years since a meeting of the Executive of the Irish Republican Army representing the Brigade of the First Southern Division met at Fermoy and decided to yearly honour General Liam Lynch.

As usual the Parade will assemble at Fitzgerald Memorial Park at 2.30 pm. It will march in procession to Kilmurphy where a wreath will be laid on his grave, and a service of Requiem Mass will be celebrated. The parade will be in charge of the Parade Committee. NEW AND IMPROVED C.I.E. BUS SERVICES

With the introduction of C.I.E.'s Winter Timetable on September 13th, new services are being introduced in the South-East Area and some slight alterations are being made in others. Of particular interest to workers and students will be a 07.45 service from Dungarvan to Waterford which will arrive in the city at 08.50. There will be a Return Service at 16.30 and workers and others can also, of course, return to Dungarvan on the 18.05 ex Waterford. There are strong indications that this service will be of particular benefit to people engaged in employment and training in the Industrial Estate as indeed will be alteration in the Fermoy-on-Sea service which, from the commencement of the timetable, will leave Fermoy-on-Sea at 07.25 and arrive in Waterford at 08.50. This service will return at the normal time of 17.45 hours to Fermoy-on-Sea. There will be a connecting service Monday to Friday from Waterford Quay to the Regional Technical College and the Waterford Industrial Estate.

To facilitate students attending schools in Dungarvan the week-day service from Clonmel will depart 10 minutes earlier and arrive in Dungarvan at 08.50. The return service will operate at 16.25 hours. The Dungarvan/Clonmel Tuesday Only Service will be altered to depart at 10.00 hours instead of 09.00 hours and will run correspondingly later throughout.

In response to a number of requests from residents on the route the Dungarvan/Waterford Service via Coast Road will now operate on Mondays and Fridays. The Dungarvan/Clonmel Friday Service has been cancelled as well as the 9.00 a.m. Service ex Dungarvan to Fermoy on Thursdays. The normal Saturday Service on this route will continue to operate as usual.

Ballyconnell Wins Tidy Towns Competition

THIRD CAVAN CENTRE TO WIN NATIONAL AWARD

The tidiest town in Ireland this year, Ballyconnell, Co. Cavan, Ballyconnell (population 523) is the third Cavan Centre to win the National Award in Bord Fáilte's Tidy Towns Competition.

The event was won by Virginia in 1964 and 1965 and Ballyconnell in 1966 and 1967. Last year Ballyconnell tied with Trim, Co. Meath, as runner-up to Mullin, Co. Donegal. This year's result brings the title back to the Midland Region. In fact winners have come from this region on eight consecutive occasions. This year the region had seven category winners in all, more than any other Region. Tourism Organisation, Ballyconnell, received 140 marks out of a possible 150 equalling last year's record total, the highest since the inception of the competition in 1962.

Second place went to Mullin, last year's winner with Trim, Co. Meath, third and Cullinhill, Co. Laois and Ceanannas Mor, Co. Meath joint fourth. Entries totalled a record 630. Of these 105 were new competitors.

CONGRATULATIONS

In a telegram of congratulations to Mr. John Scantlan, Secretary, Ballyconnell Tidy Towns Committee, Mr. Eamonn Conroy, Director General Bord Fáilte said: "Congratulations on your success and on bringing the honour of being Ireland's tidiest town back to the Midlands. In the history of the competition has been running, the standard of appearance of our leading villages has shown a marked improvement so that to win this competition now demands sustained community effort over a long period. You, your committee and the townspeople of Ballyconnell are deserving of the warmest commendation for this notable performance. The category awards went to Mullin (not exceeding 200 population) 138 marks, Tyrrelpass (200-500 population) 132, Ballyconnell (500-1,000 population) 140, Ceanannas Mor (1,500-3,000 population) 134, Middleton (3,000-5,000 population) 130, Monaghan (5,000-25,000 population) 122. In addition there were prizes for the best centre in each midlands region, the best new entrants, the best seaside resorts, the best village or rivers (Shannon and Harrow and the Grand Canal), the Kilkenny Park Award and the most commendable effort. Six additional prizes were donated by commercial firms.

CONSISTENT EFFORT

Commenting on Ballyconnell the judges said that the town won the award "mainly on account of the consistently sustained and consistent effort by all sections of the community in all parts of the town and its approaches. Even beyond the recognised limits of the town, one is aware on all main approaches of something important in story and is not disappointed. The town has interpreted the true intent and purpose of the competition faithfully and has not been content merely to create a pretty piece of street scenery but has carried out a programme of development into almost all back and side areas. Special mention must be made of the excellent way in which the river banks, so much neglected in the majority of towns, but have been cleaned up and integrated with the townscape and the courageous use of whitewash and even tar to brighten up drab corners which would not otherwise have merited any more sophisticated attention. Even the well-painted street fronts, colorful though many of them are, lay considerable emphasis on traditional black and white treatment which is highly effective. Mr. Harry Lynch, Acting Mayor, Lakeland-Midland Regional Tourism Organisation, commended the townspeople of Ballyconnell for their perseverance. "In most years they concentrate close to winning the National Award that they might have been excused for allowing their focus to slip. However, they kept at it, improving the town every year and it is a tribute to their tenacity and consistency that their great efforts have paid off."

The Award will be presented at Ballyconnell on September 16 by the Chairman of Bord Fáilte, Mr. Eamonn O'Regan.

BALLYCONNELL BACKGROUND

Ballyconnell spans the Woodford River near the border. It is in the midst of some of the most beautiful scenery in the country and it is a prominent and handsome village centre. Mr. Curran warned that it would be a very bad day for the country if people had no public representatives to go to for the entering of their needs. "We are on the verge of a bureaucratic takeover in this country," he added.
