## Pensman takes you Behind the Spotlight

### A DISMAL SHOW

Dungarvan's effort in the 1971 Tidy Towns Competition has been described as a dismal show and rightly so. The team finished fifth last in its category and in their report, the adjudicators stated that there was little evidence of any community effort and the overall impression which they got on their visit was "disappointing".

I think that the adjudicators were letting us off the hook lightly when they described their impressions merely as "disappointing". Had they seen the streets of the town as I saw them last Sunday evening week, they could not have been less than disgusted. I have travelled a good deal through the county in recent months and have seen in many towns here, here and everywhere. Of them all I must regretfully admit that Dungarvan was the dirtiest.

We seem to have a litter problem in this town of a magnitude greater than practically any other town of which I am aware. Our streets nearly always have an unkempt, litter strewn appearance. As I say when I arrived into the town on last Sunday evening week (at around 5 p.m.) the square was literally covered with waste papers of all descriptions while O'Connell Street, Main Street and Main Street were almost equally as bad. It struck me in a most unfavourable light and I just had to think what a visitor coming into the town for a first time would think.

I feel that the time has come when there will have to be a "gloves off" effort to combat this growing litter problem. We have been talking about it for a long time without making any practical moves. It would appear that the blame rests with the people and also with the Urban Council who are not being able to cope adequately with the problem of keeping the streets clean.

Perhaps if a Tidy Towns Committee was formed it would prove helpful although goodness knows we already have more than enough committees and societies in the town. However, it is blatantly obvious that without the co-operation of the town traders and the general public and this includes outsiders coming into the town as well as residents, little or no success can be achieved.

If this could be managed it is not just good enough to use the streets for the disposal of litter—people should see to it that wrappers, cartons, paper bags, newspapers, etc. are not thrown about indiscriminately. If this could be managed it would be a good first step. Then the Urban Council would have to see to it that their arrangements for street cleaning are stepped up and made more efficient. The present method leaves much to be desired in the last couple of years the cost of the town scavenging service has risen steeply—a new truck was purchased and some extra men were employed—but the end result has shown little improvement, indeed if anything it is the other way around. Things have got worse. During the past couple of weeks the regular scavenging truck which cost something around £6,000 has disappeared from the streets and this has been replaced by an ordinary open truck which is being used for the collection of household refuse. It carries no back-board and as it moves along much of what is collected is inclined to drop off. It is a most unsatisfactory system and adds much to the street litter problem.

As I have said, the problem here now reached, the stage where something, almost of a drastic nature, is called for. Dungarvan has much to offer but this pollution of the

benefit is to go up by 45p for a man and 30p for a wife but nothing for the children. Big deal! There are some men who just can't get a job and are not on the dole for the love of it. I believe a married man with 3 kids gets £10.10p per week. How on earth can you feed a family of 5 on that? It's disgraceful in this day and age and if you look for any help you are made to feel like a beggar.

It's time the government woke up and helped those people. They should spare a thought for the little children when they sit down to their breakfasts of bacon and eggs. They gave an increase of 15/- but this wouldn't cover one-quarter of the things that have gone up since the budget. In regard to the matter of price increases I think the only thing for anyone who has a complaint to make and who has evidence to substantiate it is to get in touch with the Prices Section of the Department of Industry and Commerce. Where the other matters raised in the letter are concerned (i.e. the question of medical cards and the condition of the dispensary premises) I think the only avenue open here is to inform some member of the local Urban Council or of the County Council who can take these matters up with officials of the Health Authority which is the body in charge of these services.

Of course turning the spotlight of publicity on these complaints can also achieve some results and this is the prime reason why I referred in the first instance to the position last week and why I now publish this letter from "Disgusted Housewife".

1971 YOUNG DRIVER OF THE YEAR WILL BE NAMED THIS WEEK-END

This week-end will see the concluding stage of the 1971 Young Driver of the Year Competition, and by Monday (October 4th) a new name should be added to the comparatively short but enviable list of Young Driver winners.

Twenty seven of the country's best young drivers will assemble at U.C.D. Grounds, Belfield, Dublin, on Saturday, October 2nd and put to the test their own individual skill in Car Handling, against a set course designed to earn for the winner the right to be called "The Young Driver of the Year."

The course which takes some twenty minutes to complete, includes tests in - (1) Parking; (2) Braking; (3) Reversing; (4) Signalling; (5) General Car Handling. In fact most functions that the everyday motorist is expected to know when in charge of a car.

Each Competitor will be called on to display his or her special accuracy and competence in the interpretation of the tests, but what is important, however, is that speed is not a deciding factor. Competitors in fact, are encouraged to be as deliberate as possible when completing the course.

All of next Saturday's (October 2nd) competitors will have qualified for this final stage by being successful in the competition's previous two eliminatory stages, i.e. (1) A Written Test, held throughout the country on September 4th, which examined knowledge on Rules of the Road, as set out in a booklet issued by the Department of Local Government. (ii) A Car Handling Test, similar in design and layout to Saturday's final.

COURT SEQUEL TO INCIDENTS IN VILLERSTOWN

Incidents in Villerstown on the night of June 27 when it was alleged that attempts were made to burst in the door of a licensed premises, were recalled before District Justice B. J. Carroll at Cappoquin Court last Thursday.

Before the court were Michael Smith, The Commons, Villerstown; William Merrin and Eddie Walsh, Ballinagow, do, and Michael Morris, Villerstown. They all pleaded not guilty to causing malicious damage to a window valued £2.50 the property of Thomas Lyons, Villerstown, and which conduct calculated to lead to a breach of the peace.

Mr. Lyons told the court that around 1 a.m. he heard loud kicking at his front door. When he asked who was there he recognised Smith's voice and he shouted "If you don't let us in I'll have your way in." Witness said he went upstairs and looked out the window and saw the four defendants. About twenty minutes later he heard the sound of breaking glass at the rear of his house.

Most Frightening Replying to Mr. A. R. Farrell, Lyons denied that he was running a "shebeen." He admitted he was on good terms with the defendants and had gone to the Gardaí subsequently to try and have the charges withdrawn against them.

Michael Duggan, publican, Villerstown, said he was in bed on the same night when he met with the most frightening experience. He heard people trying to burst in the front door of his licensed premises and when he went to his bedroom window he heard one man shout "open up or we'll burst your way in." He couldn't recognise the men but thought the voice was Smith's. The men seemed to be very drunk and they created a terrible racket.

Trouble Maker Garda T. Brennan said he investigated the incidents but Smith was the only defendant to make a statement. From his inquiries Smith seemed to have been the troublemaker.

In evidence all four defendants denied breaking Mr. Lyons' window or kicking his door or the door of the licensed premises. Dismissing the malicious damage charge, the District Justice said there was no definite evidence to substantiate it. He refused applications to bind the defendants and he proposed that monetary penalties be imposed on both clubs. If they investigated the incidents they would, he said, suspend players who deserved it, but in so doing they would also have to impose suspensions on players who did not deserve it.

NEW VENUE FOR CAPPOQUIN COURT SESSIONS

Following representations to Waterford County Council, alternative accommodation for the holding of courts in Cappoquin has been made available.

District Justice B. J. Carroll was informed at the usual sitting of the Court in Cappoquin last Thursday.

Mr. N. Walsh, M.C.C., told the Justice that the County Council was prepared to make the ground floor of the Carnegie Hall at Main Street available.

Later the District Justice, Supt. M. English and members of the legal profession inspected the alternative premises.

The old Court-house in Cappoquin frequently came in for favourable comment.

Western Board Investigates Incidents Which Followed Football Game

BROUGHT ASSOCIATION INTO DISREPUTE

Incidents which occurred following the Nire v. Emmetts (Cappoquin) intermediate football championship game played at Cappoquin on Sunday, September 12th were investigated by the Western C.A.A. Board in Dungarvan on Thursday night of last week.

Following the taking of evidence from members of both clubs and from others present at the game, the Officers of the Board examined the statements privately.

As a result, two players involved (one from each side) have been summoned to a meeting of the Officers Board on this Friday night in Dungarvan.

Subsequently a special open meeting of the Western Board will be held at which the Officers will make their recommendations. The Officers will also recommend to the meeting that both clubs be fined.

At the outset, the Chairman, Kieran O'Riordan read the report of referee Vincent Muligan (Abbeyside/Ballinacorney) who stated that the incidents occurred as he was leaving the field. He did not know what caused them as they were beyond his view and he didn't investigate.

The chairman told the meeting that it was the intention of the Board to deal with the clubs under Rule 88 for bringing the Association into disrepute. They would, he said, have evidence from members of both teams, officials and umpires who were at the game, and with the consent of the Board the Officers would then deal with it.

Conflict of Evidence J. Murphy, Dungarvan, said he brought there should be no investigation because there would be a complete conflict of evidence. It was obvious, he said, that something did happen after the termination of the game and both clubs should be held responsible for bringing the Association into disrepute and he proposed that monetary penalties be imposed on both clubs. If they investigated the incidents they would, he said, suspend players who deserved it, but in so doing they would also have to impose suspensions on players who did not deserve it.

CLATTER OF FIST

Their club had evidence, he said, that when the final whistle went, their full-forward turned to shake hands with the Collihan full-back. While he was

turning he (full-forward) got a clatter of a fist as a result of which his jaw was broken.

Continuing he said he saw a Collihan supporter kicking one of their supporters in the head while he was on the ground. Their players should, he said, be exonerated. They did not hit anyone but tried to break up the incidents.

Donal Connelly, Emmetts said he didn't see the incident which sparked off the trouble. He said that the incident was really sparked off by something which occurred during the game when the Nire full-forward knocked out a Collihan corner-back.

When the game was over a fight occurred between two players. He was on his way out when the incident occurred. He went back down and he saw one of their corner-backs facing towards him. A Nire supporter struck the Collihan corner-back and knocked him to the ground.

Most of the players he said were trying to prevent the fight and it was a pity that spectators from both sides got involved as this only added to the confusion.

KNEE IN STOMACH

Jimmy Moran, Kilgobnet, said he was an umpire at the game. He said that 30 minutes before the end of the game the Nire full forward and one of the Collihan corner backs went for a high looking ball. The Nire full forward jumped higher into the air and his knee went into the Collihan man's stomach. After the incident the Nire full forward went back up the Collihan full back and he (Moran) heard the Collihan goalkeeper say "don't forget that." He didn't know to whom he was speaking.

When the whistle blew, Mr. Moran said, he bent down to pick up the flag. When he looked up he saw the referee on the ground. He asked the second umpire what happened and all he said was "he

struck him." The Nire player looked dazed and amazed and seemed to be saying "why did you do it."

After walking about ten yards up the Nire man recovered and he tore into the Collihan full back. Some Collihan and Nire players held them back. The Collihan full back didn't move but stayed there and then the Nire full forward kicked him. The Collihan man retaliated, but not much.

Continuing, Mr. Moran said that at this stage the crowd realised that there was a fight on and they came back. There was no real incidence of a row, fellows were "squaring" out but they weren't fighting, they were trying to separate each other.

He said that he himself moved further up the field and when he got to the half way mark he saw a Collihan man lying on the ground. When he asked what happened the Collihan man replied "he struck me for nothing," pointing to a man in a white shirt.

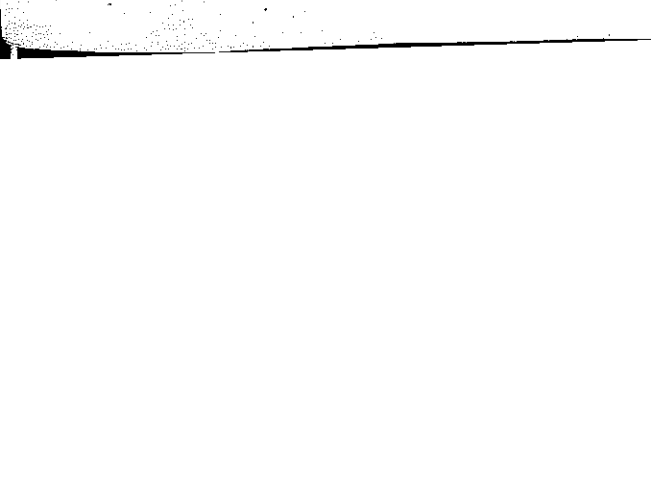
Seamus O'Brien said that while he was approaching the row he saw man in a white shirt jumping into a crowd and hitting somebody. He could not see who had been hit. He said the man was a brother of the Nire full forward and he had been told that this man had not got into the sideline through the wire.

Further observations were made by other people before the matter was handed over to the Officers for investigation.

He refused to go off and he (the referee) then had to get the assistance of the Valley Rovers captain to get him to go to the line.

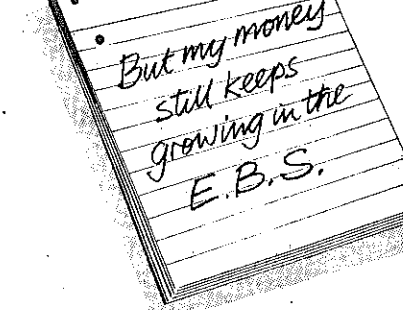
