### Pensman takes you Behind the Spotlight

#### THE SECRECY OF THE BALLOT

It was often argued during election time that the ballot was not truly a secret process when the presiding officers at the polling stations placed the number of a voter on the counterfoil before handing over a voting paper. It was a point which I always subscribed to myself but it was the law and unless the ballot paper counterfoil contained the voter's number as it appeared on the register of electors it could be declared invalid.

Now all this is to be changed. In a ruling handed down from the Supreme Court on Monday last, numbers on ballot papers will no longer be allowed. The judges have declared that the part of the Electoral Acts which required this to be done in the past was against the constitutional insistence on the secrecy of the ballot.

The Supreme Court took the decision because of the possibility that the way a person voted could afterwards be traced because of the number written on the counterfoil, from now on all voting papers will have to be completely anonymous, consistent with the constitutional provision that everyone's vote is absolutely secret.

New legislation will now have to be enacted to take cognisance of the Supreme Court ruling but the draughtsmen will be faced with fresh difficulties not the least of which will be the maintenance of absolute secrecy while ensuring that fake voting cards afterwards be checked and offenders prosecuted.

#### DEATH OF SEAN O RIADA

I had the privilege of knowing Sean O Riada and first met him many years ago at a time when he still had not won the fame that his music was to gain for him a few years later. It was in the heart of the Gaeltacht of Connemara not far from Carna where many interested in imeachtaí na Gaeltachta all over the country had gathered to compare notes. It was a night of music, song and story in the best Gaelic tradition, an occasion which was always dear to the heart of Sean.

Sean O Riada is best known as composer of the scores for such films as "Mise Eire," "Saoirse" and "The Playboy of the Western World" which won him international renown. As I write these few inadequate words his orchestral arrangement of that great song "Mo Róisín Dubh," which whenever I hear it surges over me like the waves of the Atlantic breaking on the bleak rocky promontories of the western seaboard, is echoing through my mind.

A native of Cork County he returned to live in Galway in the local parish church his requiem was sung on Wednesday by the choir which he trained, to sing the beautiful hymns for the Mass which he composed himself. His love for the Irish language was deep and passionate and was surpassed only by his love for the music and songs of Ireland. His genius as a musician did much to bring the latter part of our culture back to the forefront in recent years. His death at the age of a mere two score years, in the full blossom of his manhood, is a tragedy not only for his wife and family of four sons and three daughters but for the nation and for Irish culture. In truth can it be said as the O'Leanech said: "Ni bheith o leitheid ann arís."

It was not a noble pile, Of some ancient lunger style. No wealth of architecture met the eye In the village school at home. Without regard to date, While I studied in the happy days gone by.

"My schoolmates were as they were when I used to play. Skipping homework when the evening sun was low. Some jests are just like me. Exiled far across the sea. Ever thinking of the happy time I spent in the village schoolroom of Kilbrien.

Where the Mauma's breezes blow, And some are in a foreign land to go. But few are still today in the hills far away.

None will write the village schoolroom of Kilbrien. If you travelled up and down, From old Galts to Derry town, You could not find in all St. Patrick's Isle. Another to compare with our master anywhere. As he traced the road to knowledge with a smile. A gifted son of Jove. He taught languages so low. Through he never spoke to me in mine. PROVISIONAL APPROVAL FOR £63,681 EXPENDITURE ON COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SCHEMES FOR 1972/73

MOVE TO APPOINT ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTOR

By unanimous agreement the members of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture provisionally approved the expenditure of a total of £63,688 for the year 1972/73 at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

The list of provisional allocations detailed the principal items of expenditure as follows: Instruction in Agriculture £27,610 (up £997) to which an additional £2,000 was later added when the Committee agreed to the appointment of an additional Instructor in Agriculture at this juncture.

Mr. G. Heskin thought that it was a tremendous investment in agriculture before they entered the Common Market.

Mr. C. Dodgson added that the intensity of agricultural instruction per 1,000 farmers in the county was about the same as other counties in the south but he said that from the happenings in the county it was apparent that a lot of thinking was going on and there was a general acceptance amongst farmers to accept new ideas which would help to make agriculture a more viable industry.

Mr. G. Heskin pointed out that the increase under the heading "Instruction in Agriculture" was due to incremental increases in the salaries of instructors; the additional expenditure on pig breeding was due to an increase in price from £38 to £45 and the new arrangement that extra old id would be required to bring their total demand on the County Council to 264 old price.

Under existing regulations they could go to a maximum of 27 old price and he suggested that the Committee take the extra £4 to provide for the appointment of an extra old id instructor.

Outlining the intensive advisory service and the educational programme planned for the coming year, Mr. Frost said that the existing staff would be completely stretched to the limit to deal with it.

The Chairman, Mr. O'Ryan, said that the ratemakers were also stretched to the limit to meet their rate demands. He added that there was a rates doomsday fast approaching in this country the way costs were operating.

Mr. Cusack said that while he was generally opposed to rate increases he thought that it would be money well spent to get an extra instructor and he proposed that they agree to the maximum demand of 27d.

TEN PER CENT INCREASE In reply to the Chairman, the C.A.O. stated that at present the Committee employed a staff of 8 Agricultural Instructors, 3 Horticultural Instructors, 2 Farm Home Management Advisers and 1 Poultry Instructor.

Mr. Frost went on to say that under the new programme he did not think that an increase of 10 per cent in farm incomes in the county was an unreasonable estimate. This would mean a cash increase of about £900,000 in the production of beef, milk and pigs.
