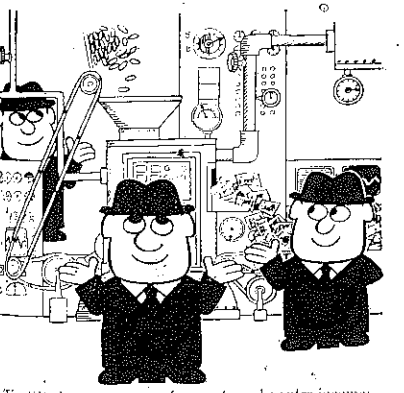

Pensman takes you Behind the Spotlight

WHAT THE URBANS
CONTRIBUTE

The eighth annual meeting of the South-Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation will be held in Clonmel on the last Friday of this month.
The financial report to the meeting contains a list of contributions made by rate striking local authorities within the region which includes seven urban areas. The largest urban in the region is Carrifrogan and its contribution to the Tourism Organisation in the year 1970/71 was £200 and the position in regard to the other six is as follows: Carrick-on-Suir—Nil; Cashel, £75; Tipperary £100; Dungarvan £175; Enniscorthy, £40; and New Ross £168.

This shows that the contribution by the Dungarvan Urban Council puts it well in second place in the list and it even tops the contribution by Clonmel Corporation which is a far more wealthy town by almost £40.
The balance sheet shows that the Company's Accounts for the year ended April 5, 1971, had a deficit of £15,133 as against a deficit of £5,133 for the previous year but it points out that Bord Failte had given an undertaking that accumulated deficits up to April '71 will be cleared by them.
The following extract under the heading "Visitor Complaints" appears in the report: "The number and seriousness of the writing complaints lodged with the Company by visitors gives rise to very serious concern. Criticism of hotels, guesthouses and unlicensed accommodation, business premises and cafes was vociferous. Carelessness in the delivery of mail order items, lack of variety and imagination in food, excessive charging and poor sign-posting were singled out. There is a discernible undertone of head towards reduced standards of civility, courtesy and pleasantness among those who meet the public across a counter or wait on them at meal time."
"The national scandal of our public toilets—both availability and maintenance standards—continues without improvement. They continue to attract the greatest number and the most severe criticism accurately summed up by one visitor's comment "unfit for humans." Urgent and radical action is long overdue to put an end to this distasteful deficiency.
"Carelessness and untidiness are again primarily at fault for the deterioration in cleanliness on our beaches. Even those cleaned daily have

I believe that this extract from the report is rather naive as it attempts to understate the reason for the "reduction of sales," suffered by the Company during the year. The reason goes deeper than this and the matter is one which should be given urgent attention to ensure that there is not a further "reduction of sales" in the coming season, which should it occur, would indeed be a great loss.

Closing of Garda Stations—There is no word of saying that the closure of Garda Stations throughout the country and the depletion of the Defence Forces was not a retrograde step by the Government or the Department responsible.

The Patrol Car is no answer to the crime and the local station. Firstly there are not enough Patrol Cars and secondly they are not used apart. People felt secure in their homes when they knew that a Garda station was a local station and the sight of a Garda in uniform gave confidence.

A Patrol Car may be based fifteen to twenty miles away and then when alerted may be another half hour to reach the time is lost in having an investigation carried out. Not so with the Garda as a local station. He can be at the scene in a few minutes.

Take a look at our Defence Forces. The strength of the Defence Forces today is roughly 8,000 to 9,000 men. It includes officers, NCO's and men. Granted we have the FCA but in the Garda as a local station they would take some time to mobilise. Some one said "external vigilance is a matter of liberty"—and indeed we as a nation are not paying much heed to that saying today.

The Department of Defence must be the Cinderella of all Government Departments. The Army should be brought to full strength immediately and supplied with the most modern weapons. Our United Nations troops in Cyprus should be withdrawn, for as far as we can see the United Nations have let us down and it is a ridiculous situation for our troops to be upholding the reputation of Cyprus whilst our men, women and children in the North of Ireland are butchered and tortured by a fellow member of the United Nations.

In this country during the emergency years from 1939 to 1940 we had an army of from 150,000 to 200,000 as well as the A.D.F. Granted we do not want an army of that strength today but in more than times as they were then, with everything in short supply due to the war we maintained that force for six years.

We are on the brink of an emergency at the present time and our Government should not be like the ostrich burying their heads in the sand.

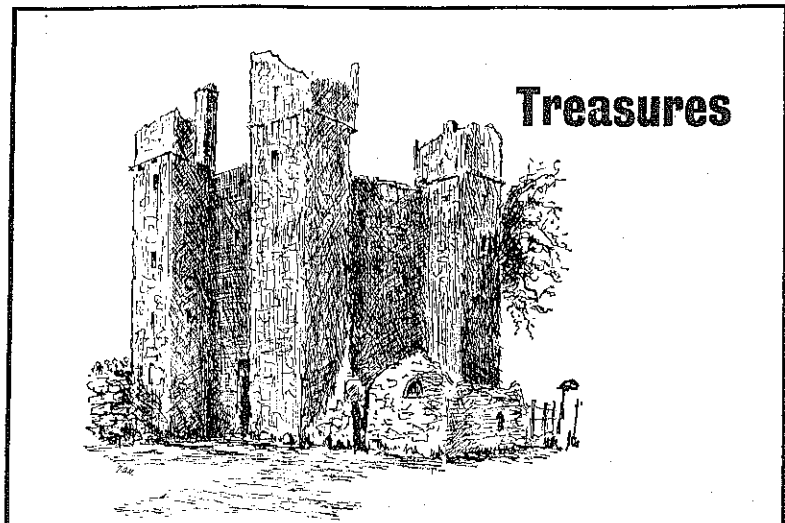

The Gaelic order of society with its body of laws "A Feinneachas" (The Law of the people or Brehon Law), as it broke down gradually after the Norman invasion with its English brand of Feudalism and ceased to function after Cath Cionn Uaile.

It is a time of crisis which calls for a national government with men from all parties prepared to rise above the pettiness of party politics to serve the country in the time of need.
