SLIPPING AND SLIDING

At a time when the country should have a strong united government to face the multitude of problems which are of present besetting the welfare of the nation as a whole, it is almost beyond comprehension that party politics should be proving of greater importance to practically all our politicians.

While the country is slipping and sliding from one crisis to another the government party wrangle on the question of leadership and the policy to be followed in regard to the assurance of Sinn Fein that they will contest seats in the next election, the fragmentation of the traditional republican vote will be greater than ever.

What then would be the outcome of the event of an early general election and who would hold the balance of power?

Despite the fact that the taoiseach managed to weather yet another storm within the Fianna Fail Party this week, this does not mean that the party is not split. It simply means that those within who have high aims are prepared to remain on in the hope that they will be able to bid for the leadership at a later time. The gaps in the party are being plastered over by such naive assurances as that the party is more important than the individual. But it all boils down to a waiting game in the bid for leadership of the party and in the meantime the country is slipping and sliding from one political crisis to another.

This is not good enough at a time when the nation is going through one of the most serious periods in the past fifty years. We want a strong united government which will have the very best brains to look after the welfare of the country. It is a time of crisis which calls for a national government with men from all parties prepared to rise above the pettiness of party politics to serve the country in her time of need.

DUNGARVAN LADY REACHES 100 YEARS

Last Thursday, November 11 was a red letter day for Mrs. Margaret Curran, formerly of 16, Keating Street, Dungarvan, for that day marked her 100th birthday.

IT WAS A GREAT DAY

It was a great day and a most memorable occasion for the centenarian who will perhaps be better known to many of the older generation in Dungarvan as Maggie Dower.

For a few years now Mrs. Curran has been a patient in St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan, since she injured her hip and it was there in the hospital that she was toasted and feted and congratulated on last Thursday by a steady stream of callers.

The morning of the great day was of special significance as Mrs. Curran was visited by Very Rev. J. Canon Gurry, P.P., Dungarvan, who formally presented her with the traditional 'President's' cheque which has now been increased to £50. Accompanying the Parish Priest was Rev. J. Murphy, C.C. and there to welcome them in the ward where Mrs. Curran is a patient was the Matron, Sr. M. Francis, Sister M. Gertrude and Nurses Stokes, McGrath, Walsh, Curran, Whelan and O'Sullivan of the hospital nursing staff.

The group also included Mr. Murphy, Social Welfare Officer, Dungarvan. While the press photographers flashed their cameras the presentation was made and there was plenty of good cheer tastefully laid out on a table beside Mrs. Curran's bed with which the company drank her good health. Centre piece of the table was a special icing cake with the inscription "Congratulate Mrs. Curran on your 100th birthday." It had ten candles, one for every decade, on it.

It goes without saying that Mrs. Curran must now be Dungarvan's oldest citizen. In her time she has seen many changes in the Old Boro' from the time when the town was concentrated mainly along the quayside and Boreenra and around the seafaring parts of Abbeyside to its development of the present time.

When I visited Mrs. Curran on her great birthday I thought she looked more like 75 than 100. She still possesses practically all her faculties and as Sister Francis truly said "she is really a wonderful person." When I asked her what she attributed her long life to, Mrs. Curran, who through her life conducted a small shop, replied "hard work, it never killed anyone."

THE ODDS OF REACHING THE CENTURY

While life prospects are growing and the period of three score and ten is no longer accepted as the average allotted span in

modern times, the odds of a person in Ireland reaching 100 years was a topic which I heard discussed at Mrs. Curran's birthday party.

After going through certain calculations the odds quoted were 3,500 to 1. I cannot vouch for this figure nor am I really bothered because I certainly feel that it is one race in which I will never compete.

ABBEYSIDE CHURCH

I paid a visit to Abbeyside Parish Church on Tuesday morning last to see how the renovations were progressing. I did so because I have had a number of inquiries since the work started as to what stage had now been reached.

I did not realize that the job was such a big one; the old building had to be completely stripped with only the fabric of the four walls left standing. The new roof, set on modern steel girders, has now been almost completed except for a very small section on the west side of the tower. As one of the erectors on the job remarked to me "that is a job for all time now."

The retaining walls have all been stripped down and a big steel girder which will be the mainstay of the new organ loft has been placed in position. A good deal of work has been done, reconstruction jobs are always slow at this stage, but a great deal of work still remains to be done and I think it will be many months before the new building will begin to take shape.

The job is being carried out by the well-known local firm of E. O'Brien & Sons, Building Contractors.

The exhibition, dealing with careers for young people, will be the showpiece of a project which has been underway since last February during which over 350 students in

various schools in Dungarvan and several parts of County Waterford have been interviewed.

The object of the project is to provide, as far as is possible, signposts to the future for our young boys and girls who are at present completing their Leaving Certificate course and who have not so far made up their minds as to what career, in life they will choose.

The exhibition will take place at the Town Hall, Dungarvan, on the 21st and 25th of this month and I hope to be able to give fuller details of what it will entail in my column next week.

GARDA COMMENT ON TAXATION OFFICE WAS UNFAIR SAYS COUNTY ACCOUNTANT

In the course of a discussion at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan on a proposal for the creation of an additional post of clerical officer in the Motor Taxation Department, the County Accountant, Mr. J. O'Leary said that such an appointment was necessary because work in the office was increasing. He pointed out that the amount of motor tax collected last year was £225,000; the number of current driving licenses was 10,556 (800 more than last year) and the number of vehicles currently taxed in the County was 9,633 (an increase of 256). Mr. O'Leary added that an average of 100 new vehicles were being taxed every month.

Mr. T. Foley referred to a report of Court proceedings in a Waterford City paper in which a Garda stated that he found it impossible to obtain information which he needed from the taxation office to pursue his prosecutions.

Mr. O'Leary said that such a statement was absolutely untrue. Such information required by the Garda was always supplied and the staff of the motor tax office was as efficient as anyone would expect.

Mr. S. Whelan, Vice-chairman, who presided at the meeting in the absence of the Chairman, Mr. N. Walsh, said that the remark made by the Garda concerned was very unfair comment.

On the proposal of Mr. T. Kyne, seconded by Mr. W. Kennedy, the Council unanimously agreed to the creation of the new post.

PRISON SENTENCE FOR STEALING F.C.A. GUNS

D.J.'s COMMENTS ON ARMS ROBBERY
The larceny of 2 Bren machine guns, 4 magazines and 4 22 rifles from the F.C.A. Hall at Youghal Road, Dungarvan on February 19, 1970 was recalled at Dungarvan Court before District Justice B. J. Carroll on Wednesday when Michael Montanin, Pearce Place, Carrigrohilly, Co. Cork, proprietor of a garage at Middleton, appeared before the court charged with breaking and entering the F.C.A. Hall on the occasion and stealing the arms which were valued at £96.

Superintendent M. English, Dungarvan prosecuted and Mr. Gerald Goldberg, Solicitor, Cork, appeared for the defendant.

Quartermaster-Sergeant Maurice O'Connor gave evidence of going to the F.C.A. Hall on the morning of February 20. He said that he had been on leave during the previous week. When he got to the hall on the morning in question he found both doors had been forced open. The locks on the strong room door had also been forced and on checking he found that 4 rifles and 2 machine guns were missing. A window at the back of the hall had been broken and he took it that entrance had been made through this. He also found a side door forced open through which the getaway must have been effected.

Comdt. P. Russell, Collins Barracks, Cork gave evidence of the value of the arms stolen. The 22 rifle purpose been guns were valued at £30 each, the 4 magazines £2 each and the 4 22 rifles £8 each, a total of £96.

Comdt. D. Madden, Collins Barracks, said that he visited the F.C.A. Hall within a few days of the incident and estimated the cost of repairing the damage done at £16.64.

Sgt. M. Bowen in evidence said that he was stationed in Dungarvan at the time of the break-in and carried out an investigation at 10.20 a.m. on the morning of February 20. He found the broken window and a ladder lying outside the rear wall which had been stolen and a nearby building site and which had been used to gain access to the hall. With Detective/Garda Fleming, Waterford, he removed the broken window.

Detective/Garda Fleming stated that he had been trained in the taking of finger prints. He saw finger marks left on the inside upper portion of the window. He cut out the glass with these marks and on February 23 he took them to the finger print section of the Garda Technical Bureau in Dublin. He now produced these glass cuts in court.

William O'Keefe, Prison Officer, Limerick Jail, gave evidence of taking the finger prints of Michael Montanin in Limerick prison on March 19, 1971, and said he sent these by post to the Garda Technical Bureau.

SAME PRINTS
Detective/Sergeant McDonagh in evidence said that he was attached to the finger print department, Garda Technical Bureau, Dublin. On February 23, 1970 he received 2 pieces of glass from Detective/Garda Fleming which bore finger marks. He had these photographed. He also received finger prints from Limerick Prison and compared these with those which had been photographed from the glass and he said that he was satisfied beyond doubt that the finger mark on one of the pieces of glass was the same as the left index finger mark taken from Michael Montanin.

Cross-examined by Mr. Goldberg, witness said that his evidence was not based on an opinion but on fact and he disagreed that finger print evidence submitted in the Garda Fallon murder trial had been rejected by the jury.

In reply to the Justice, witness said that he had found 12 points of similarity between the prints. Between 6 and 8 points of similarity were enough to satisfy him beyond doubt but in this country they would not go into court with less than 12.

Detective/Garda M. O'Reilly, Official Photographer Garda Bureau, proved photographs of the finger prints which he had taken.

Evidence of holding the keys to the strong room between February 14 and February 20 was given by Cpl. A. Daly and Cpl. Ryan both attached to the Dungarvan F.C.A. Hall.

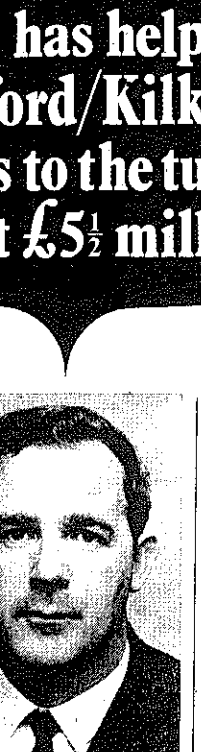
